John Watson, a landscape illuminator from Dallas, will speak on "Garden Lighting" at 4 p.m. today in the Architecture Auditoriunn. He will illustrate his talk with slides.

According to Don J. Johnson, park management instructor, Watson is virtually the only person actively employed in this field. The popularity of modern architecture has created a need for artistic use of lights in gardens, landscapes and parks, Jonmson explyle, he said is the result of try slyle to bring meaning out of darking to bring meaning out of dark-
ness.
Watson recently has been featured in Readers' Digest, Time, Suburbia Today, and House and field. Among his accomplishments are the illumination for Six Flags Over Texas and for Queen Victoria Park, Canada.
Time quoted him as saying, "The important thing is to achieve an understanding of light-subtle and restful." He demonstrates his theories in his own backyard in Dallas. His $50 \times 50$ foot Japanese garden contains 100 lighting fix tures and four miles of wire. It operated with 179 switches.
