Reigning track champion quits after meet here

WACO (AP)—Ronnie Allen, Baylor's two-time Southwest Conference 220-yard dash champion, has quit the Bear track team, Coach Clyde Hart announced Monday.

The announcement came after Allen refused to run on Baylor's mile relay team in a triangular meet at Lubbock last Saturday.

"After an hour in conference with Ronnie Sunday, it was obvious he no longer wanted to participate on our team," Hart said.

Allen, a junior physical education major from Hughes Springs, suffered a leg injury early in the fall and later developed a sore knee. Allen had expressed concern over the knee problem.

"There's no question Ronnie had a muscle pull early and then a sore knee," Hart said. "However, we sent him to orthopedic surgeons to be examined and treated and there are no symptoms of an injury that should keep him from running," Hart said.

Allen confirmed that he had quit the team adding only that the decision was not a quick one.

Hart said Allen told him Sunday that the pressure was too great and he had worked hard for three weeks to see how he would do in Lubbock. "He told me Sunday, if he didn't win in Lubbock he had planned to quit."

Tennis team begins play Thursday in tournament

The Raider tennis team is traveling south today to play in the Rice Collegiate Tennis Tournament Thursday, Friday and Saturday in Houston.

It will be the second big tournament for Tech, after finishing in the semifinals of the consolation bracket in the Corpus Christi Invitational last month.

THERE WILL be 16 colleges entering teams in the meet, including all eight Southwest Conference schools and some other top teams from the South.

"The teams entered in this tournament are the best in this part of the country," said tennis coach George Philbrick, referring to the likes of Trinity University, Pan American, Brigham Young University, and Rice University.

Other non-conference teams to be reckoned with are Houston, Oklahoma, Utah University, Lamar Tech, Oklahoma City University, and Wichita State.

There will be two separate divisions in the tournament, one for the top four players from each team, and a second division for the bottom four. This will in essence amount to two separate

tournaments, with winners in each being awarded separately.

TECH'S TOP FOUR players in the first division will be Rusty Powell, Joe Williams, Robbie Sargent, and Warren Craig. Craig, a three year letterman, is just coming around to his old form after being hampered with a pulled muscle in his playing arm.

"Warren did a good job against West Texas last week," said Philbrick. "So his arm must be getting better."

The first division will number 64 players with the top four from all 16 teams entered.

PHILBRICK IS only entering two Raider Netters in the second division, Joe Ben Whittenburg and Mike Nye. "I feel that having this second division is a good idea, because the bottom four players would not go very far in the other division, and this will give them some good experience," Philbrick commented.

Tech will have two doubles teams entered, as will all the other teams. One team will be made up of Powell and Williams, while Whittenburg and Sargent

compose the second doubles duo.

Philbrick cited a gradual improvement in the Tech team with each meet. After three losses to West Texas State earlier in the year, the Raiders finally beat the Bulldogs in a tournament last weekend in Canyon.

Philbrick said that the meet is scheduled to run until Saturday, but due to the large number of teams and the quality of competition, he thinks that the final matches may not be played until Sunday.

Spring training begins Monday

Monday marks the on-the-field beginning of the Jim Carlen regime in Tech football, as the Raiders officially begin spring training.

The workouts will continue until May 2, when the spring intrasquad game will be held at Jones Stadium. The Raiders are allotted 20 practice sessions during this time under Southwest Conference regulations.

This will be Carlen's first official work with the football players since he took over the helm as head coach.

Tech cindermen rank high in SWC

The Tech track team ranked in five of 16 events in times recorded from the three SWC triangular track meets, Saturday.

The teams met in Lubbock, College Station and Dallas, divided into groups of three, including North Texas State in the College Station meeting.

Tech, the University of Texas and Baylor met locally; Texas A&M, North Texas and Rice in College Station and TCU, SMU and Arkansas in Dallas. The Longhorns, A&M and TCU captured the team titles and Tech, North Texas and SMU placed second. Baylor, Rice and Arkansas were swept into the cellar although each team ranked a few individual participants in the top three places.

ZANE REEVES won the high spot in the 100 yard dash with 9.5, shattering Tech's record in that event. Carl Johnson of Texas raced just behind with 9.6. Marvin Mills and Rockie Woods of A&M and James Lester of TCU all recorded 9.7, tying for third place. Mills and Lester took first in their respective meets and Woods was second.

The top three marks in the broad jump were set in Lubbock. Raider Ken Ford's leap of 24-2 1/2 was only two inches short of Texas' Danny Brabnum. Ford's consistency in his jumps was praised by sportswriters and coaches alike.

Raider Ronald Grigsby ran

second in the 120-yard hurdles with 14.6, first place in the local meet but short of the winning time set by Larry McBride of TCU. McBride ran 14.1.

Dave Roberts soared 16-2 in the pole vault, 5-1/4 inches higher than Tech's Bob Blain. Blain was first in the Lubbock meet and set a new school record. In Dallas the highest mark was set by Tebby Thames from Lubbock Monterey High School with a jump of 13-6. Thames' vault was lower than the fourth ranking vaulter in both of the other meets.

TECH'S 440-YARD relay team took the local honors but came in third overall. A&M and North Texas recorded times of 40.1 and 40.4 respectively, ahead of the Raiders' 41.1 time.
