Tech's music department is in danger of losing its top faculty members and top students because of the facilities it occupies, according to Dr. Gene Hemmle, chairman of the music department.

The building was designed for use by 100 music majors with a maximum use by 400 students. That was 19 years ago. The music department now has 300 music majors and is used by 1,500 students.

Hemmle said the music department received promises five years ago of new facilities. At that time a \$30 million building program was started that built the new Business Administration Building, the new Biology Building, the new Architecture

It seems the biggest problem of housing is being compelled to live on campus. Barbie Jacobs, sophomore business major from Houston, and Mary Jane Stewart, sophomore interior interior design major from Corsicana, Tex., when asked what Tech's major problem was simply said, "Students can't live off campus."



### Astronomer speaks today

Sir Bernard Lovell, British astronomer who rose to international prominence with his space tracking of Sputnik I, will deliver a lecture under auspices of the University Speaker Series today.

Lovell will discuss exploration in outer space and its impact on the individual in his 7:15 p.m. address in Lubbock Municipal Auditorium. The lecture will be open to the public without charge.

Lovell holds the chair of radio astronomy at Manchester University and directs the Nuffield Radio Astronomy Laboratory at Jodrell Bank where a giant, steerable telescope tracks radio waves from remote parts of the universe.

Lady Lovell will accompany him to Lubbock.

He has become a popular lecturer in the U.S. because of his interest in communicating scientific ideas to laymen. As he sees it, scientists have a "paramount" duty to communicate with laymen because of the vast costs of science and its importance to our civilization.

### Editorial Parking needs changes

One major gripe brought up in nearly every discussion about the problems at Tech seems to be that of the parking situation.

Compared with several other colleges and universities in the U.S. Tech is far out of line with its policies regarding this situation.

At Tech it costs \$24 a year to rent a reserved place on the interior of the campus. Also it costs students \$13.50 for the school term to park in the dorm lots and \$9 per term for commuters to park in the coliseum lot. These prices are far above other schools contacted by this writer.

At the University of Denver parking stickers cost nothing and all parking is free. Also, if a student will report a parking ticket within 72 hours the fine is cut in half.


Wichita State U. considers the privilege of parking as part of the student services fee that is paid during registration.

At Kansas State College of Pittsburg the prices are set just high enough to take care of the expenses. It costs \$5 to park in the dorm lots, \$5 for faculty on the interior campus lots and \$3 for commuter students.

Recently a faculty member informed this writer that at one faculty meeting with President Murray a teacher asked where the \$24 for the parking lots was going and for what purpose it was used. Murray's only answer was that he was appalled that any of them should even ask. Evidently he had some reason for not answering directly.

Parking for faculty and students should be a service provided by Tech. Any charges should be just for the actual expense incurred and definitely should not be used as a source for additional revenue.

A secretary who works here for three years or less can benefit from the retirement plan, Tucker said. This plan has several clauses for life insurance and trust funds. For instance, if a Tech secretary died while in service, her children could be eligible for \$75 per month until they reach the age of 18, Tucker said. The retirement plan costs six per cent of the secretary's salary and the university pays six per cent.

Most of Tech's 378 secretaries and clerks are under 35. Each is assigned to a department rather than a professor, Tucker said.






