A large delegation of legislators, possibly accompanied by Gov. John Connally, will visit Lubbock and the Texas Tech campus Thursday, State Sen. H. J. (Doc) Blanchard announced Friday.

As many as 20 legislators, including members of the House Appropriations Committee, will arrive in Lubbock in time to see the Tech-A&M game, Sen. Blanchard said.

In a Lubbock press conference also attended by Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, Sen. Blanchard said the delegation is interested in learning more about the college and the area.

Both Smith and Blanchard told reporters there was little chance of any kind of college and university systems proposal being passed by the legislature this session.

'Little Support'

"As far as systems are concerned, we might as well forget it at this time. As far as I can tell there is very little support in the legislature for any kind of system at this time," Lt. Gov. Smith said.

He added, "The governor hasn't even introduced his bill."

Sen. Blanchard, commenting on rumors that efforts were being made to destroy Tech, said, "There has not been a concerted attack on Texas Tech. There's not anybody mad at Tech.

"In talking with the governor, he says he recognizes Texas Tech as a multi-purpose university."

When asked what would happen if the governor pressed his systems proposal, Blanchard declared, "There would be the dangest fight if they try to place Tech with A&M."

Expresses Views

Expressing his view on the higher education coordinating board approved by the legislature, Sen. Blanchard said he was concerned about the power the board had to tell each school what curriculum it should have.

"It was a little unfair to the Senate by running it over Senate amendments," he commented about action of the bill's proponents.

When asked about the status of his name-change bill (Texas Tech University) Blanchard remarked that it was in committee but added, "I've got a medical school, law school and other things more important, in my opinion."

He said the name-change bill was not a local bill and it was of interest to others.

Blanchard said Friday Tech has the highest priority for a law school from the Commission on Higher Education. He said the Commission strongly recommends a new law school for Texas and one to be located at Tech.

On the medical school proposal, he commented, "I have requested a hearing before the Education Committee March 8 or 9."

One reporter asked Sen. Blanchard what was his reaction to Tech's ineligibility to compete for the Southwest Conference basketball championship. He said, "I was with a large number of legislators (when he received the news) and there was kind of a shock."

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



He also discussed U.S. intervention in South Viet Nam as an attempt to "strengthen a non-Communist country to handle their own affairs."

Only Wednesday, MacVane said, U.N. Secretary-General U Thant made public his desire to set up a dialogue between the U.S., Communist China and North Viet Nam; thus illustrating the interest and effect of the U.N. in today's critical affairs.

Too Important

"The U.N. is too important to disintegrate," he said. "It is functioning today all over the world to raise social and economic standards, to provide educational opportunities and to combat disease."

He said that of the 23,000 U.N. officials, only 2,500 are working on political matters reaching the front pages of the newspapers everyday. while the other 20,500 are out trying to better the standards of the world.

Viewing the work of the U.N. and its success or failure, MacVane said, "I am neither a cynic nor an optimist."

He described the growth of the organization from its beginning as "exciting; somewhat like watching the growth of a child."

He then added, "We may owe our lives to the 19 years of the U.N. and its influence."



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
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IM Softball Meetings Set

Intramural softball and slow pitch softball organizational meet ings have been scheduled Monda and Tuesday according to intra mural director Edsel Buchanan.


