Late Campaigning May Boost Voter Turnout

By GARTH JONES Associated Press Writer Last-minute campaigns for and against the 10 proposed state constitution changes brought boosted estimates of voter turnboosted estimates of voter turnout in Tuesday's voting.
Robert J. Johnson, head of the
Texas Election Bureau, Texas Election Bureau, said the final efforts, particularly on a
plan to give Texas governors and statewide officials four-year terms, might push the tour-year terms, might push the total vote
as high as 400,000 . Earlier he predicted it would be about 300,predic
000 .
Only 220,000 voters, out of the state's 1.97 million eligible, turned out for a Sept. 7 election on one proposed constitution change. The proposal, to increase the Senate from 31 to 39 members, failed by 50,500 votes.

A check by The Associated Press over the state showed that officials in metropolitan areas expect a larger vote Tuesday than in September-but only slightly larger in many areas.
Political observers have predicted that a light vote would result in defeat of some, and maybe
all, the 10 proposals. They conall, the 10 proposals. They conin September likely will be back at the polls Tuesday in the same frame of mind
However, recent past history ndicates little likeliha history 10 amendments roing down in defeat at the same time. In 1962, a total of 10 amendments were approved and four failed. In 1963, one was approved and three failed.
"It would be a public disgrace for the light vote in the last election to be repeated on Nov. 2," Gov. John Connally saia in support of the four-year term for state officials and several other amendments. He officially granted the more than 46,000 state employes a half holiday beginning at noon Tuesday to be sure they have a chance to vote.

## The Fraternity View

CRITICS WHO COMPLAIN about the disappearanc of o'd-fashioned social organization in the huge but impersonal higher educational institutions are failing to recognize the virtues of the American college fraternities

This charge was made by Fred H. Turner, dean of students at the University of Illinois. Dean Turner sees a strong trend among many elements for a return to the fundamental philosophies upon which the fraternity organizations were founded.
"Curiously enough, fraternities have one characteristic which is under such severe attack by those who seems to despise them so," writes Dean Turner. "Thase persons who are attacking today's higher education, and taking a few pot shots at frate:zities in passing, deplore the impersonality of their borrowed term 'multiversities.'

Even one of the most severe critics of fraternities in recent years has conceded that, while they do not always accomplish the objective, fraternities do or can provide the ideal type of student organization where the individual tudent may relate himself in an intimate fashion with a small group dedicated to high ideals and assuring the student a close relationship with others who are congenial like-minded, and interested in the welfare and progress of the individual himself.'

Dean Turner sees attacks on the American fraternity ystem as a continuing process, but only as one of many attacks on higher education in general. But, he feels, the attacks are beginning to go too far and there are those who are asking if it isn't time for a return to personal integrity and a devotion to law instead of rebellion, defiance, and ignoring of laws.

He points out that fraternities which pattern their operations during the next few years on their time-tested principles and maintain their existence academically, financially, and in line with the honest objectives of their institutions will find themselves doing the precise things demanded by people in general.

Dean Turner is critical of the harshness suffered by fraternities through half-truths, sly remarks, instigators of dissension among fraternity organizations, and creators of distrust and suspicion of motives of members.

He feels, however, fraternities can combat these techniques through an observance of their own principles of friendship, integrity, loyalty, respect of others, and the very fundamental desire to choose one's own intimate friends.

The day that Lubbock gets trans-continental jet service will be a day for dancing in the streets.

Now, about the only way a traveler can get from Lubbock to any other large, distant city by jet is leave Texas by the front door (Dallas-Fort Worth) or by one of the side doors (El Paso or Houston).

This fact was brought out by a recent journalism trip to San Francisco. The Tech delegates had to catch a flight to Midland, board a jet there and go to El Paso, where we could finally get a more direct flight to the West Coast.

The same was also true coming back into the state. However, this time we got as far as Albuquerque by plane before boarding a turbo-prop to Lubbock.

The city fathers have long been trying to get such jet facilities here, but as yet their schedule for accomplishment lies a few years in the future.

ments around the campus.

But even at Reese, the big C-141 Starlifter transport we traveled on was a novelty. It was as large as the most modern airliner, alalthough the surroundings were a bit austere.

However, there was no doubt that the big plane was well qualified to accomplish its mission-to be the future backbone of the Military Air Transporation Service (MATS).

The C-141 has a tremendous cargo capacity and can carry as many as 154 combat troops in jet-smooth comfort.

But last weak, the mission of the Starlifter was to carry the Tech elegation to Tinker, an impressive base just outside of Oklahoma city. And for the C-141, this was but a short hop, covering approximately 36 minutes of air time each way

This is quite a change from a $\overline{5}-6$ hour car ride or an hour-and-a half ride by conventional aircraft.

Tinker AFB itself is a training base for MATS pilots, primarily using the new C-141, but also utilizing the old reliable C-124.

The Tech delegation was allowed to tour many of the interior workings of the base, including an assembly line repair shop more than a mile long, the operations center of the base, the maintenance shops and the flight simulators, among other things.

A "ride" in the simulators is more like being in a real airplane in flight than the actual flight itself. The simulator consists of an elaborate cockpit with a special panel of instruments at the back where the instructor sits.

At the intricate and tricky panel, the instructor can create any imaginable situation a pilot might encounter. And whatever situation he creates, the pilot and his crew re expected to overcome it.

It is all very frighteningly realistic, especially when motor noise and yibration are added to the scene, as well as the actual movements controlled by delicate hydraulic lifts responding to the cockpit instruments.
