

Election Statutes Violations Claimed

Twelve candidates for Student Council representative positions were disqualified in committee action last night because they failed to turn in an expense account by 5 p.m. yesterday.

Six candidates running for the Arts and Sciences pos-ition were disqualified. They are Johnanna Zournas, Caro-line Wood, Judy Harris, Donna Abraham, Ann Graves and Kay Adkins.

Cheerleader candidates Monita Apple, Jay Johnson and Joe Naylor were disqualified.

In the race for Home Economics representative, Sam-mie Fowler failed to meet the election regulations.

Two engineering candidates to the Student Council, Tom Shamburger and Don Spencer, were also disqualified.

"Decision Not Easy"-Committee

"This decision was not an easy one to make, but a mimeographed sheet of election regulations was made avail-able to each of the candidates, along with notification in the Toreador," stated a report made by the election com-mittee. "We want it clearly understood that no personalities were involved in the decision.'

"As I see it, no one is to blame for this situation but the candidates themselves," said Student Association Presi-dent Wallace Wilson. "If they cannot take care of the re-sponsibilities of a candidate, how then can they assume the responsibility of representing the student body's best inter-ests on the Student Council?" he added.

"It is an unfortunate situation when for some hown reasons these 12 candidates were disqualified but my question is "how else can an organization function properly if its rules and regulations are not enforced?" Wilson concluded.

The six-member committee disqualified the 12 candidates without knowing the names or number of violators.

Candidates Invited To Submit Excuses

Disqualified candidates have been invited to appear before the committee and submit any reasons they might have for not obeying the regulations.

These 12 students were violating the rule in the mime-ographed regulation sheet which read: April 8—"An item-ized expense account must be turned in to the Student Council office by 5 p.m. If the materials in your campaign were of no expense or were given to you, please estimate those costs. leaders. Before voting we hope that Techsans will care-fully examine the qualifications of the candidates, not only to secure good council members, but to prevent some *inqualified* candidates from getting elected strictly on their popularity, club affiliations and by "block voting." This year there has been a general lack of interest in the election. Some students may think campus af-fairs are dominated by the college administrative and faculty interests, and adopt a "well, what can we do about it" attitude; others may lose interest because candidates are not personally known to them; or it may be that they care nothing at all about student government.

government. We believe there is not one student on the campus who has been satisfied with all conditions at Tech this year. Instead of complaining from day to day, which does little good at all, we suggest that they go to the polls tomorrow and elect qualified students to champon their interests and intercede for them in times of

trouble. If all students demand of their candidates the furtherance of their own ideas in student government there will be a more satisfactory relationship between students and the administration. We hope that Techsans will show enough interest in tomorrow's election to go to the polls and elect only qualified students to represent them next year. Failure to take advantage of this opportunity will only increase student difficulties. -Wayne Jam.-Wayne Jame

CUSSING 'N DISCUSSING ...

It is commonplace on the Tech campus to hear students cussing and discussing certain aspects of campus life which they think should be improved —

campus life which they think should be improved — for instance, the parking problem. But this seems to be as far as it goes — cussing and discussing, mainly cussing! A prime example of the apathy which blights our campus was furnish-ed last Tuesday evening at a panel discussion, "No Parking On Campus For Students," held in the Stu-dent Union to let students air their opinions and try to arrive at possible solutions to the parking situation. Though well advertised by placards across cam-pus and a story in the Toreador only 27 students at-tended the discussion. Consider the percentage: 27 people out of better than 6,000, of which number the vast majority contends with the problem daily! With the second largest campus in America, Tech

people out of better than 6,000, of which number the vast majority contends with the problem daily!
With the second largest campus in America, Tech has one of the worst traffic and parking situations in the nation. And added to this is a \$3.50 parking permit required of all students from the sophomore level up — a price which is \$2.50 higher than the two other colleges in Texas, that have parking fees. It doesn't take a genius to know that something is wrong with this, and that such a situation deserves attention, should be remedied. Yet only 27 students will concern themselves enough to go to a meeting designed to make at least a start in solving the problem.
It seems to us that something is drastically wrong when thousands of students sit around complaining about a situation, yet will not muster the energy required to walk a few blocks, sit for an hour and listen to a discussion of the problem.
Apparently we aren't as concerned as we would like to have ourselves think. We just want to lean back and cuss something. We don't want to do anything about a tit. That would be too much trouble!

ble! And this attitude doesn't concern just parking. This is only one example. The apathy is characteris-tic of all issues on campus. From dormitory issues to school spirit in athletic events, Tech is drifting along in a deliciously apashetic, let-someone-else-do-it dream world which can have but one result — grad-ual downfall of the school. Coming up this week are student elections. The overwhelming odds are that the elections, as every-thing else, will be but another demonstration of our apachy. More than likely only a small per cent of students will vote, leaving a small minority elect-ing student government leaders; and thus, in turn, causing a minority rule. No institution — as no person — is any better than its spirit. John Q. Techsan, get up off it!
