

New Parking Lots Are Now Ready

A LONG STRIDE forward was made recently in the Tech parking situation, with the opening of a new lot west of the Journalism Building for off-campus students.

The lot, which can be reached through the new "Engineers Lane" from Sixth street, will add 414 park-ing spaces to the Tech parking area.

The new lot is strategically placed, especially for students with classes in the nearby Library, Science, Chemistry, Journalism, Petroleum Engineering and Electrical Engineering buildings. A word of warning should be given, though. Tech Security Patrol will be cracking down more strenuously on parking regulation violators now that more adequate parking space is being provided. Another word of warning: this lot is not for dorm residents. Parking lots are provided at each of the dorms for these students. The parking picture isn't as rosy as it seems, however, with the destruction of the lot back of the Journalism Building planned for the near future. This will be necessary because of the construction of a new ultra-modern class building. But, considering everything, the parking situation is in relatively good shape. And if the Tech personnel involved keep up the good work, it promises to im-prove.


