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Voluntary Attendance Plan For College Students Is Successful

THERE is some questioning as to whether a growing college like ours should ac-cept a voluntary attendance plan of edu-cation such as that which has proven, after six years of operation, to be successful at the University of Chicago. A four-year course has been completed by some students of that school in one year. Others have finished their work in two years and the majority students there now receive their degrees in less than four years.

years. Under the University's plan students pass examinations and finish courses as rapidly as they can. Rules require, how-ever, that they must know more than the text books or lectures impart in order to pass the tests. Examinations are being streamlined or modernized in order to test the students' thinking processes and pow-ers rather than to determine his ability to memorize. memorize.

"But the plan has a drawback," says Dr. Hutchins when, after it was adopted, class attendance increased. "This indicates a sla-vish servility on the part of students that I deplore.

I deplore." Students are advised under the pro-gram not to let their university schedule interfere with their education. Dr. Hutchins recently advised the students with, "If you feel you can get an education superior to that the faculty can give you, go to the aquarium, take a trip around the world or deposit yourself with the encyclopedia."

Circuit Court Upholds Athletic Tax Protest

Athletic Tax Protest Fish New Orleans (ACP)—The University overnment has no right to collect protection of the per cent admission tax to football games or other athletic outball games are to be the collection of attack. 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
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
