# Registration Procedure And Examinations Announced

### Engineering Division May Offer Machine Tool Work

The possibility of a training course for skilled and semi-skilled machine tool operators to be handled through the engineering division of Tech in cooperation with the State Board of Vocational education for national defense is now being considered by college officials, announced O. V. Adams, dean of engineering.

A representative of the State Board of Vocational education will confer with college officials to-

Engineering students of freshmen or sophomore standing, who will drop out of school for various reasons, such as those students not especially adapted to training for the engineering profession or for financial reasons, will be considered for this type of

The course is a practical shop training program of eighteen weeks which will enable selected students to become employable for national defense in the trade

James R. D. Eddy, director of industrial education, in correspondence with President Jones, has offered the following proposal to be considered today:

1. That the school of engineering survey those students who will drop out of school at midterm and determine their interest in pursuing an eighteen weeks shop course designed to fit them to enter employment as skilled

2. That, if fifteen or more students are interested, provision be made to use the college machine shop for training purposes in hours outside of the present regular classes.

3. That a course of study be established, not carrying any college credit, but designed to assist the young man in becoming employable. The courses would cover approximately 30 hours of instruction per week.

Dean Adams has asked that students interested in such a course make inquiries at his office.

The plan, according to Moore, provides a means for promoting an enterprise which will be of financial aid to the whole division and the property of the pr

Formerly, fees received from lifetime memberships went to build up the loan fund surplus of the society. At present, because of a decided increase in enrollment in the engineering division, new equipment would facilitate the handling of classes and laboratories. Engineering alumni, recognizing the need of the division, are cooperating with the society in their plan to increase the equipment inventory value.


