Defense Bond Sales Must Stay On Voluntary Basis

PRESIDENT Roosevelt's recent statement that the purchase of war bonds and stamps would be kept on a voluntary basis as long as possible, is not only a statement of his faith in democracy, but it is also a definite proof that he intends to keep alive the traditions for which we are fighting even in the most trying of times.

Compulsory purchase of bonds and stamps would be a direct contradiction of the principle for which we are fighting, the right to live and worship as your heart dictates. If Americans do not consider their freedom valuable enough to protect it with all their might, uncoersed by a bill of congress, then they have no right to enjoy the Bill of Rights.

As we understand it, this war is being fought with Germany and the little Slant Eyes, not to eradicate them from the face of the earth, but to protect the American way of life.

Roosevelt, however, sees advantages beyond victory in the purchase of these "Jap hunting licenses." To quote the commander-in-chief, he says, "To keep the cost of living from spiraling upward, we must encourage all citizens to contribute to the cost of winning this war by purchasing war bonds with their earnings instead of using those earnings to buy articles which are not essential." Realizing that an extreme case of inflation during the post-war period would be disastrous to the nation as a whole, he is trying to keep the cost of living from spiraling upward, we must discourage credit and installment buying, and encourage the paying off of debts, mortgages, and other obligations; for this promotes savings, retards excessive buying and adds to the amount available to the creditors for the purchase of war bonds." Not wanting to see our country be a financial rocket, first in blazing heights and a year or so later in bankruptcy, he is trying to put the nation on a financially stable basis.


