DEMOCRACY OR SNOBBERY? One of the things that has made Texas Technological College what it is today is the democratic spirit of the student body, the absence of any class distinction and es-pecially the absence of Greek letter organizations on the campus.

The late Dr. Paul W. Horn was opposed to any arti-ricial distinction among members of the student body. His idea is expressed in the following excerpt: "In a great democracy like our own, it stands to reason that demo-cracy of spirit among our student body makes possible the best preparation for a democratic citizenship."
