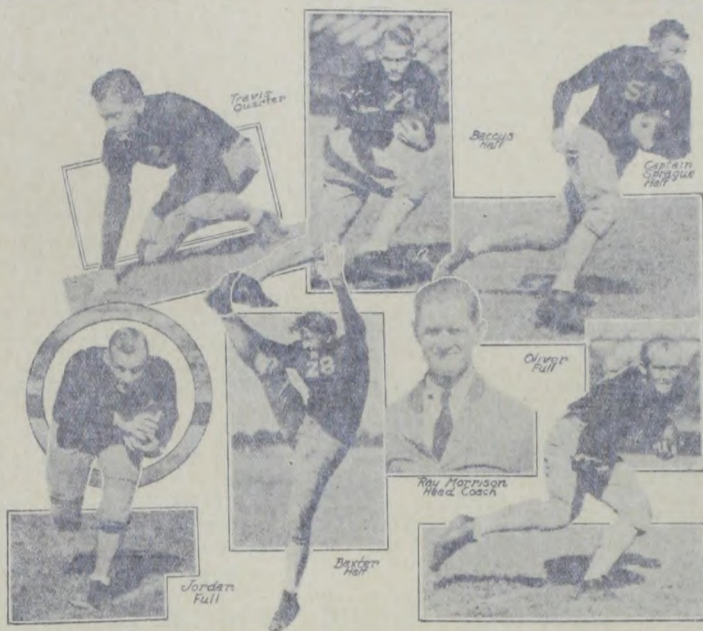
Professor Root holds his M. B. A. from Harvard and is a graduate of Baylor University in Waco. During his undergraduate days he was a football star in that institution.

Night Class In Chem. Is Given

Extension Department Has A Night Chemistry Course For Industrial Workers And Students

The first extension course in freshman chemistry to be offered in Tech will start Monday night, October 3, in room F of the Chemistry building.

This course is the regular first year college course in chemistry. It carries 12 term hours credit and meets one year of the science requirement for a degree, and one year pre-med requirement. According to Mr. Connell, graduate assistant in the chemistry department, the course is offered for the benefit of those who work during the day but desire to do some college work at night. Any Tech student who desires freshman chemistry but cannot get into his regular schedule may enroll for this night course provided he gets the permission of his dea.

The course is valuable for its application in industrial work. Four people from a local dyeing and cleaning company and one from a creamery have already enrolled. Information concerning the fees charged and the time of regular class meeting may be had through the Extension department or the Chemistry department.

The two classes in freshman foods which they are instructing opened September 6, in regular session with all the city schools.

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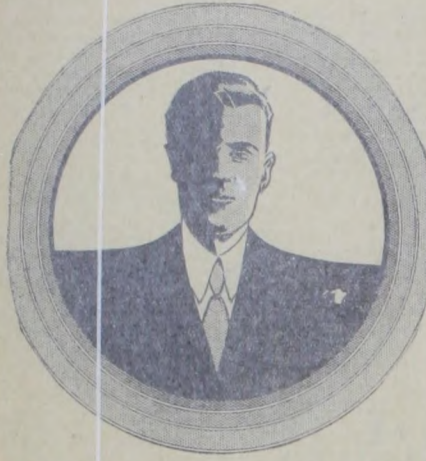
