TECH NEEDS A FLAG

Tech does not have a flag for its flag pole. There is something wrong here. There should be a flag hoisted every morning.

The military training in the school should take charge of the daily activities on the Campus and raise the flag.

It has been learned that the department of military training would be glad to have an armed guard perform the ceremony every morning of raising the flag and every afternoon of lowering it. The only thing that is needed is the flag.

What could be more impressive than an armed guard raising the colors every morning. This ceremony doesn't mean that the students should turn out each morning for the affair. Such a case would be foolishness. The flag is hoisted before most of the students are out of bed, but the fact remains that the student body should be greeted every morning, rain or shine, by the colors flying on the pole on Tech campus.

There is only one flag to be found on the campus now and it is in such a sad state that when hoisted, it looks like a bunch of shredded pennants tied to a pole. It has been used in all kinds of weather, but its day is past.

If we could have a banner for every kind of weather, what could be nicer. There is the garrison flag, 20x38 feet, the post flag, 10 x 19 feet, and the storm flag, 5 x 9.6 feet. Each of these flags have their own occasions for usage. All should be made out of wool so that they could better stand the duty that they have to fill. They must be made out of the best material that can be found for the purpose and one of them should be on the pole every morning.

Let's see if we can't get a flag for Tech.

CAMPUS CLEANLINESS

Have you ever looked about you during the day and noticed how much trash and refuse is thrown on the campus and in the buildings? What do you think about it? Looks pretty bad. Of course it does. Paper, empty cigarette packages, cigarette butts, candy wrappers, all of this stuff thrown in the halls, on the grounds make Tech look more like a dump heap rather than one of the largest schools in the state. We are growing each year in enrollment. This evidently means that there just that many more people here to litter up the buildings. It shouldn't! The more students we have here, the cleaner the place should look. There would be more hands to pick up things.

Then, there are the tobacco-chewers who wait until they are in the buildings to think that they must have some place to rid themselves of the surplus spittle that is collected in their mouths. What do they do? They merely seek some convenient corner and then, they are at ease again.

Let's keep Tech clean. Not only for ourselves but for visitors who might happen to drop in. They may have some friends or relatives who are planning to come out

here, and certainly we want to impress them the best we can.

How about starting a campaign for a neater and cleaner Tech.

There will be rallies all during the season. Lets see the Gym packed for the rest of them. Don't let the faculty point you out as one of those who had to be led. We must stick together and fight. The Matadors are doing it, why can't we.

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Matadors Defeat SMU Mustangs 6-0 In Mud, Rain

Score Is Result Of End-Around Play By Sophomore End; 5,000 Howling Fans See Ponies Lose

Mustang Line Outweighs Tech Matadors Twenty Pounds To The Man; Clark's Punting Is Feature Of Game

Texas Tech's Matadors rose with all their might Saturday night and defeated S. M. U.'s Mustangs by a score of 6 to 0 in one of the hardest fought games ever seen on the Matador field. It was a game featured by great blocking, hard tackling and great goal line stand in first quarter by Texas Tech's forward wall which was outweighed twenty pounds to the man by S. M. U. line. Tech's blocking coupled with Clark's excellent punting were the deciding factors in Tech's favor. Clark's kicking was little short of sensational considering the fact that the ball was water logged and slick in driving S. M. U. Tech accomplished one of the things they have been trying to do since the school was founded.

S. M. U. won the toss and chose to receive and defend the south goal. Clark kicked off 50 yards with Travis receiving the ball on his own 30 yard line. He returned the ball 16 yards to his own 35 yard line before being tackled. Travis hit right tackle for two yards. Sprague hit left tackle for three yards. Baxter kicked to Tech's 3 yard line. The punt traveling 60 yards, Clark returned the kick behind beautiful blocking to his own 28 yard line. McCommis hit the line for no gain. McElroy went in for McCommis. McKeever circled left end for 2 yards. Clark kicked out of bounds on S. M. U.'s 28 yard line. McNutt hit center for no gain second down ten to go. Baxter hit center for no gain. Baxter punted the Tech 33 yard line and Clark returned 11 yards to his 44. On a spin play, McKeever hit right tackle for 6 yards. McKeever carried the ball over left tackle for two yards. McKeever hit right tackle for one yard. On fourth down with inches to go, Clark punted out of bounds on the S. M. U. 18 yard line. Time out S. M. U. Travis hit right tackle for four yards. Second and six to go. McNutt hit left tackle for no gain. Travis kicked to Clark on the Tech 34 yard line. Clark returned 17 yards to the S. M. U. 49 yard line, behind skilful blocking from his team mates. McElroy hit left tackle for 2 yards. Time out Tech. McElroy hit right guard for two yards. McKeever passed to Luper but it was knocked down by an S. M. U. back. Clark kicked out of bounds on the S. M. U. 15 yard line. Travis circled right end for 5 yards. Travis hit right guard for no gain. The Tech forwards line piled the play up. Nearly every man in the line was in the play. Baxter kicked over Clark to the Tech 34 yard line but the speedy safety man gathered the ball in and carried it back 15 yards to the Tech 49 yard line. McElroy gained 9 yards on a play around right end, falling out of bounds as he was tackled. The S. M. U. left end was sucked in on the play. Nichols made it a first down on a play through the center of the line. This is the initial first down of the game by either team. McElroy hit right guard for three yards. On a spin play Nichols was was thrown for a yard loss. On the next play the ball was thrown out of bounds. At this time DeLombard was substituted for McLeod, the S. M. U. center. Clark kicked over the

punt caught Travis, the SMU safety man, sound asleep. Clark kicked to Baxter on the Tech 23 yard line. SMU was offside on the play and drew a five yard penalty. On the next play Clark kicked to Travis. Walker picked up five yards on a punt that was good for 34 yards. Travis made a nice return of 12 yards to the Tech 48 yard line. McNutt carried the ball out of bounds for no gain and Tech was penalized 15 yards for unnecessary roughness. Travis passed to Hawn but the ball was knocked down by Crites. Travis passed to Baxter incomplete and the ball was called back SMU being penalized five yards. Tech substitution, Tribble for Barton. On a punt formation Travis failed to gain around right end. Baxter kicked and the ball was partially blocked by Greer. Dowell picking it up on the Tech 30 yard line and returning eight yards to his own 38 yard line. Dowell made 5 yards around right end. Clark kicked to Travis who was downed on his own 13 yard line. Travis hit center 3 yards as the gun sounded ending the half. Score 0-0.

During the half a light rain began falling but the crowd refused to leave. Third quarter. Opening the third quarter, McLeod kicked off for SMU with Oliver holding the ball. Crites received the ball on his 25 yard line returning 12 yards to his 37 yard line. Dowell made 9 yards around left end. Crites made it a first down through the center of the line. Clark hit center for about half a yard. Clark kicked to the SMU 15 yard line with Tribble tackling Travis for no gain. SMU substitution, McNutt for Oliver. On a spin play, Travis hit center for no gain. Baxter kicked to SMU 36 yard line to Dowell who fumbled with Hawn recovering for SMU. Baxter hit center for no gain. SMU was penalized five yards for being offside on the play. First down 13 yards to go. Baxter's kick was partially blocked by Greer and Crites, getting the ball on the SMU 35 yard line, and returned 15 yards to the SMU 20 yard line. Crites hit right tackle for 3 yards but the ball was called back. SMU drawing a five yard penalty for being offside. First down five to go on SMU's 15 yard line. Crites got the ball and went over right tackle for four yards. Second down, one yard to go. Dowell made 2 yards and a first down on the SMU 9 yard line. Crites made 2 yards through the center of the line. Clark was thrown for a 5 yard loss. Third down and 12 yards to go for a touchdown. Moffett was substituted for Crites. Clark lost 2 more yards. Moffett was thrown for a 4 yard loss. The ball went over to SMU on their own 22 yard line. McCommis for Nichols. Solls for McAdams. Tech substitutes. Baxter falls to gain. SMU punted out of bounds on their own 32 yard line. Moffett was thrown for a 2 yard loss. Clark lost 17 yards on an end run. Clark punted out of bounds on the SMU 4 yard line. Baxter punted to his own 35 yard line. McElroy for Moffett, Williams for Baker. SMU drew a five yard penalty for being offside on the next play. Solls picked up 5 yards on a spin play. McElroy made a first down on the SMU 22 yard line. Time out for the Mustangs. On an end around play Malcolm Martin scored standing up. McAdams went in for Solls. Clark failed to convert. Walker for McAdams. Clark kicked to Hawn who received on his 35 yard line and returned 9 yards to his 44 yard line. Travis falls to gain at center. Travis fumbled and Hitchcock recovered for the Matadors. Turner and Harris went in for Greer and Ayres. On a spin play, Walker made eight yards.

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
