THE INSTRUCTORS VIEY-POINT

Your editorial in last week's issue on "Independence Thought" is, from the instructors standpoint, worthy

of Thought" is, from the instructors standpoint, worthy of comment.

We realize that there are a few instructors who object to "independent thinking". We do not believe, however, that there are as many as the student is wont to believe there are, Furthermore, we believe that they are restricted to two classes: (a) the inexperienced instructor and (b) the non-progressive type.

In the school of engineering, (and we believe the other schools take the same position) we consider it the major part of our task to teach the student to "think". We have long since passed the time when the method of teaching was to cram into the student's head so many abstract facts and expect him to give these back to us, just like a photograph. Our idea is to teach him a few fundamentals and to get him to apply these to get something more comprehensive. How can he do this unless he thinks?"

There is a difference between an argument, used to bring out information, and one used to "stall off" a recitation or to disturb one. The instructor is generally able to discover which is the intent of the student. Any one who is able to present a new idea is usually tactful amough to "get the idea across" without incurring the ill will of his instructor.

The student must realize that an instructor has so much work to cover in a recitation and that the fact, that he is not willing to spend the entire time on what he may consider to be a minor point, should not be constru-

ed as his unwillingness to listen to new ideas. The student will always find the instructor glad to listen to him, in his office, or after class, and no doubt, if the student has an idea that is good, the instructor will be glad to present it to the class, or to have the student do so, at a convenient time and the student will be given credit for it.

Too often, however, we have given the time of the class to discuss a point, hardly worth while, simply because we have been too anxious to get the student to develop the habit of making a full analysis of the problem at hand and of considering all points affecting its solution.




