In conducting the election, members of the coun-cil should remember that they are interested in the elec-tion solely insofar as carrying on the election in an im-partial and just manner is concerned; not personally. It is imperative that next year's editor and business manager be men capable of publishing a paper which will meet the needs of the whole campus and not be controlled by any clique for aelfish purposes. The opening of Tech under the new semester plan next fall will find a large group of Tech students won-dering what the new value of their college work will be. Those who have picked three-hour courses for a momen-tary attraction have no idea what effect the change will have on themselves. Much of the confusion now pend-ing the transfer of term to semester hours could have been avoided several years ago. In older schools, high school students, merely glanc-ing through a catalogue, are informed what their major work will be for each of the four years. It is definitely outlined, and theer is no shifting around, no substitution or blundering. Freshmen register for first year work, sophomores for second year subjects. Seniors are not given credit for freshman courses, and the plan works ideally.

WOMEN'S SELF GOVERNMENT With the growth of Tech's co-educational element, comes the question of the amount of power such a group should be granted. Increased membership should bring increased strength. The time has come for the women to decide whether they shall remain wholly dependent, only partially so, or become independent. A titular change of the Association of Women Stu-dents to the Women's Self-Government Association would also cause a decided change of the organization's func-tions. What is now an activity, a means of socialization, would become in addition a judiciary, with power to find and settle case of conduct and disregarded regulations. Student organizations should expand with the school that fosters them. Scholastic growth needs parallel recognition of activities. The Toreador believes self-government for women cause greater participation of the co-eds in campus affairs, call for stronger leaders among them and eventually benefit the whole school. A sudden, drastic change is certainly not necessary, but a trial sys-tem with gradual strengthening would surely do no harm.


