The present differences between Cairo and Jerusalem are less important than their common threat of Communist penetration from the North and Islamic counter-revolution against modernization all the way from Lebanon through of the oil basin of the Persian Gulf to Pakistan.

AT LEAST this is the way Washington tends to see the
problem of the Middle East. It problem of the Middle East. It is thinking in world strategic terms, and particularly in terms of its own security and
the security of the rest of the Free World, of which Israel is an important part.
Specifically, officials here are concerned that the major
oil supplies of the world are not oil supplies of the world are not
controlled by the Soviet Union, controlled by the Soviet Union,
in which case Moscow could strangle the industrial nations by cutting off their supply of
fuel at the source, and thus transform the military balance of power in the world to Moscow's advantage.
ISRAEL IS not indifferent to
these thes, these themes, and is probably more aware of the Islamic counter-revolution in Iran and elsewhere than anybody in Washington, but it is not surprising that it is preoccupied
with its immediate quarrels with Egypt, and is furious with the Carter administration for breaking the "special relationship", between Jerusalem and Washington in
favor, as it thinks, of Sadat and favor, as it thinks, of Sadat and the other Arab leader But these problems are not
