# Council Begins Class Officer Study

What do class officers at Texas Tech do?

Nothing—or so close to nothing that the Student Council has realized the problem and has begun action, it was learned Wednesday.

"A CLASS committee was organized to probe the possibilities of furthering class participation," said Gary Strickland, engineering representative from Amarillo. After careful study and preparation, a workable and solid foundation for a thorough questionaire was established.

THIS FORM was sent to more -

than 100 colleges and universities. "The results were startling," said Strickland, "we found that the larger the college, the larger the problem."

About a third of the forms

were returned. These revealed situations ranging from no officers at Minnesota to very active officers at Baylor, he explained.

"THE MAJORITY of the schools which answered have

done away with class officers as a waste of time, or they have quit trying to utilize the officers as a means to bring about college functions on the class level," Strickland said. Possible solutions to Tech's problem, Strickland indicated, will be presented to the Student Council at next Tuesday's meeting. These include:

1. Do away with class officers;
2. Make class officers members of the Student Council:

3. Abolish the class offices, but substitute officers from schools of the college;

4. Allocate Student Council funds to each class for its use.

Tech is not the only college facing this problem, but it is among the first to take action to solve it, officials said.

# Rivalry Erupts In Fisticuffs

AUSTIN (AP) — Historic school rivalry turned into a fist-slinging riot Tuesday night following a basketball game between Texas' two oldest state-supported schools, the University of Texas and Texas A&M College.

Two Texas athletes, including a starting outfielder on the baseball team, were injured. Also hurt in the 30-minute free-for-all were two A&M students.

The incident almost has become an annual event when A&M plays basketball in Austin.

It took city and campus police, the athletic directors of both schools and a few stanzas of the national anthem to halt the huge tussle, which broke out when about 2,000 students

crowded onto the basketball court as the game ended.

Two students were arrested but released without formal charge.

The injured included Michael E. Trash, 21, an outfielder from Denver and key figure in Texas' bid for national baseball recognition. He suffered a fractured hand.

Also hurt were Charles Buckalew, 21, of Channelview, Tex., a reserve on Texas' 1962 football team, fourth-ranked in the nation; James T. Trammel, 18, A&M student from Longview, Tex., and Karl Caillout, 19, of A&M.

Buckalew, Trammel and Caillout suffered facial lacerations.

Halting the melee—touched off as Texas students began to chant the traditional "Poor Aggie" yell — was made more difficult by the size of the crowd, 8,500, which packed the gymnasium.

"They just moved in masses. There was no way in the world you could have stopped them," said Darrell Royal, Texas' athletic director and head football coach.

Most of the basketball players already were in their dressing room when the fighting began.

Texas won the Southwest Conference game, 83-73, to remain undefeated and in first place in league standings.

# Fred Waring Appears Tonight

Fred Waring and the Pennsylvanians will appear in the Municipal Auditorium tonight.

One of the best-known maestros in America, Waring will present his "Wonderful World of Music" at 8 p.m. under the sponsorship of Civic Lubbock, Inc.

This concert tour marks 43 years of touring for Waring. This year he will visit nearly 100 cities with his new production.

"Fred Waring's Wonderful World of Music" came about through mass requests by Waring fans after he and the Pennsylvanians offered "The Unforgettables," a cavalcade of all-time pops, on NBC-TV last Christmas. The response was such that Waring created a new production based on the music with which he is most closely associated and considers his favorites.

During his time, Waring has played in almost all American cities and has remained popular from the ragtime era to that of rock 'n' roll. He started entertaining the public before the advent of the megaphone and is still going strong in the days of hi fi. And he has sold over 100,000,000 records.

Waring and the Pennsylvanians have entertained at inauguration ceremonies and at receptions in the nation's capital. During World War II, they appeared at bond rallies at military bases. They are well known on the nation's campuses; when they played at the University of Texas, there were 12,000 people at each of their two shows.

Tickets to "Fred Waring's Wonderful World of Music" are on sale in the box office of the Lubbock Auditorium. They are \$4, \$3.50, and \$3 for lower floor, and \$3, \$2.50 and \$2, for balcony. Student price is \$1.50.

"In testing for the co-efficient of kinetic friction, the deceleration experienced as the test vehicle went over the joints was disregarded as nearly as possible.

#### German Club Presents Film






