White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater told reporters that Bush

rather than stating a position. Bush, on a campaign trip in South, was asked repeatedly about the matter, but turned away the questions with wisecracks.
He was asked as he jogged during a
break in St. Petersburg, Fla., if he break in St. Petersburg, Fla., if he
would care to clear up the confusion.
