# Jet crash kills two in Arabia

An Air Force jet crashed Wednesday in Saudi Arabia, killing both crew members, while relatives of U.S. servicemen in the Persian Gulf urged President Bush to pledge he will not order offensive military action.

The jet fighter was the fourth U.S. military aircraft involved in an accident in the gulf region. In all, 24 servicemen have died since the United States began deploying forces in the gulf region. Eight are missing and presumed dead.

Meanwhile, 400 Americans and other foreign captives in Kuwait and Iraq signed up for the first U.S.-chartered evacuation flight from Iraq and Kuwait since Sept. 22. The flight was to leave from Baghdad later Wednesday. Most were being evacuated from Kuwait and were taken by bus to the Iraqi port city of Basra. From there,

they left on an Iraqi Airways Boeing 747 for the Iraqi capital.

The more than two-month-old gulf crisis continued to bring bad news for the U.S. economy. Oil prices rose briefly to a record \$41.15 a barrel Wednesday on the New York Exchange, before falling back to \$40.88 in early trading.

On Tuesday, oil closed at \$40.40, the previous record high.

Saddam announced Tuesday that Iraq had added another missile to its arsenal and said it could be launched "against the targets of evil when the day of reckoning comes."

He made it clear he was referring to Israel and the U.S.-led forces sent to Saudi Arabia after Iragi invaded Kuwait on Aug. 2. About 170,000 U.S. forces are deployed in Saudi Arabia and on warships in the gulf region.

In a news conference in Washington, two members of Congress, religious leaders and family members of U.S. service personnel expressed their concern about the military deployment in Saudi Arabia.

"The Persian Gulf crisis is not just a constitutional, a military or an economic crisis. It is a family crisis," seven families wrote in an open letter to Bush. "All across the country families are facing the possible death of loved ones in a military offensive they do not support."

They urged Bush to pledge no offensive action and to make the U.S. forces part of a "truly multinational and purely defensive peacekeeping force" under U.N. leadership.

Although the United States has so far taken no military action in the gulf, at least 24 servicemen have died in training or other accidents.



The Democratic candidate for justice of the peace, precinct 6, said he left the Republican Party in January because new boundaries limited his precinct to a Democratic district.



I do not find the LISD dress code to be one of the more poignant issues to our time. However, many of the letters concerning that subject, that have appeared on this page, were so bereft of reason that I felt compelled Larry Pyeatt and Patrick Russell in their acrimonious attacks have disturbing implications that extend far beyond the dress code. Their arguments make commentary on the philosophy du jour that has left the human spirit in such destitution.

The main premise of both letters seems to be the right of the individual to the free and unfettered expression of his or her individuality. 'This being true, they are incredulous that the school board has the audacity to attempt to impose limits. If you carry out their logic ad infinitum you bring the concept of individual license to the point of pathology.

that I will come to school wearing a dead animal around my neck? Would Messrs. Pyeatt and Russell approve? By their own reasoning they can do no

other than to admit that my behavior is acceptable since I am expressing my individuality. However, I doubt that, in practice, they would object if someone prohibited me from wearing the dead animal. If Messrs. Pyeatt and Russell find this illustration ineffective we could extend it to myriad situations and at some point they would find my conduct so egregious that they would say stop. At that point they would also have to say that there are limits on human liberty.

Their argument inherently denies the concept of a higher good and denigrates the ideals of community, societal standards and a natural morality. Reason is dead and all that is left us is our individual proclivities. The most that we can say about another's behavior is that it is different from our own. The human spirit is left adrift in an expansive

void without direction. If Messrs. Pyeatt and Russell want to argue that the LISD dress code is inequitable and capricious because it allows one to wear a cross but not a star of David, fine, I will stand with Let me illustrate. 

# **Supreme Soviet** adopts limits on weapon testing

MOSCOW - The Soviet legislature on Tuesday followed the lead of the U.S. Senate by unanimously adopting limits on nuclear weapons testing embodied in two treaties from the 1970s.

The Supreme Soviet went beyond the Senate, appealing to parliaments around the world to ban nuclear testing and repeating the Kremlin proposal for "global nuclear disarmament."

The significance of the treaties has waned since the 1970s. Today, the superpowers are preparing to seal one pact to cut their nuclear arsenals and another to scale back conventional forces in Europe.

Additionally, environmental protests might force the Soviets to unilaterally suspend nuclear testing.

Earlier this year, public pressure forced the Soviet government to suspend testing at its main site, Semipalatinsk, in Kazakhstan.

# Tech moves to 18-1 after disposing A&M [CLASSIFIED]

The No. 12 Texas Tech volleyball team improved its Southwest Conference record to 2-1 Wednesday night as they beat Texas A&M at College Station in a four-game match 15-10, 11-15, 17-15, 15-10.

The Red Raiders, now 18-1 on the year, detoured the Aggies to a 7-12 record overall and a 1-2 conference mark.

Freshman middle blocker Erica Ruegg paced Tech in the decisive fourth game, as she earned three of her seven kills on the evening. Ruegg also had three blocks in the final game.

Middle blocker Lisa Clark and outside hitter Sabrina Zenon blocked Aggie outside hitter Elizabeth Edmiston for the final point to give the Raiders their second consecutive conference win.

Tech took an early 7-1 lead in the fourth game before A&M came

back to tie the match 7-7. The Raiders, led in part by Ruegg, rallied to win the match.

"Erica Ruegg was the difference in the match," coach Mike Jones said. "We told Erica it was her job

to block those players in the middle and she did that late in the match."

After trading points and side-outs in the third game, the Aggies etched the lead 15-14. Following a kill by Zenon and a block by outside hitter Kristen Sparks, Ruegg blocked A&M's middle blocker Amy Cumings' kill attempt to win the game 17-15.

In the second game of the match, Tech held a sound 10-3 lead before the Aggies tallied eight unanswered points and went ahead 11-10. A&M won the game 15-11.

"A&M played great," Jones said. "They were aggressive and they could have won the match just as easily as they lost it. We really had to work hard for this win."

The Aggies were just the sixth opponent to have pushed the Raiders

past the three-game minimum so far this season.

Offensively, Tech had trouble throughout the match as they hit a low .137 hitting percentage. A&M had a team hitting percentage just below that at .115.

Setter Sheila Solomon had a season high of 50 assists. Solomon also contributed 15 digs and six total blocks.




