Baker III talked by telephone with Soviet Foreign Minister Alexander Bessmertnykh.

Senate votes on ballot questions

The Student Senate voted Thursday to include two questions on the ballot in the March 6 general election at Texas Tech.

The first question will ask for students' opinions about whether or not a student regent position should be added to the boards of regents of each Texas college and university.

The second question will ask student opinion about whether or not funding should be increased for faculty salaries and for libraries at all public higher education institutions.

The Student Senate recommended that the results of these questions be reported to the 72nd Texas State Legislature for consideration.

The Student Senate heard a report from Peggy Williams, faculty senate liaison, about the Get Smart Research Agency. The agency is a Lubbock business which researches topics for student speeches, essays and research papers. Williams sought the opinion of the student senators in regard to the agency.

"A concern of the faculty is that it would make research dishonest," Williams said. "The problem lies in that it is free enterprise, so the business can't be stopped."

Williams said student use of the agency is being discussed in a Faculty Senate committee.



Mobil offers \$2 million for students in Gulf

As the Persian Gulf war escalates, concern for the 85 Texas Tech students fighting in the war continues.

Mobil Corp. has established a \$2 million scholarship fund for servicemen and women or their dependents. The oil company offered the scholarships to 20 U.S. universities because Mobil employees hope the servicemen and women will return to school after the war, said Maury Devine, a Mobil spokeswoman.

Mobil offered eight Texas universities, including Tech, \$100,000

the University of Texas, Baylor University, Rice University, Southern Methodist University, the University of Houston, Texas A&M University and Texas Christian University.

"Texas Tech was choosen as a recipient because of the quality of the academic program, the school's ablity to communicate with the community and the number of people serving in the operation from the Lubbock area," Devine said.

When the war ends, the universities will be able to distribute the money to the students.

"It is up to the universities to


Choir to present Handel's 'Messiah'

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
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TP&WD fighting uphill battle to stop detrimental use of lead shot

Everyone has heard of the problems with using lead shot versus steel shot.

The situation is similar to any muscular tissue. other detrimental problem that pertains to our environment today. You never realize the actual problems until you have seen them or are confronted with them.

Late last month, the problem became a reality for two Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists.

The two biologists were recording water levels west of the Murphee

Wildlife Management Area in Jefferson County when they came across a site that will probably stick in their minds for quite some time.

Approximately 200 snow/blue geese were found dead Jan. 30. The birds that were still living were found severely emaciated and some of the birds suffered from muscle atrophy, which is the wasting away of bodily parts, or in this case,

When five of the birds were sent to the Texas A&M University Veterinary Diagnostic Center in College Station, tests showed each of the birds had five to seven lead pellets lodged in their gizzards.

Bob Jessen, waterfowl program leader for TP&WD said the use of lead shot has been illegal since 1980 in Jefferson County. He said closing Jefferson County to the use of lead

has not controlled the problem and it is very frustrating for him and TP&WD.

Jessen said there is a large amount of lead left over from past seasons when lead shot was legal. When the waterfowl species injest the lead, the ensuing result is a dieoff of the birds.

Some of the circumstances that added to the problem was the dry fall, a wet winter and the controlled burn of coastal grasses in the area. Jessen said he did not want to

bad-mouth controlled burning, but the burn, coupled with the amount of water on high ground, helped create the problem. With the water so high, the birds would dig down and pull out the lead pellets that had been deposited over the years.


Jessen said no other waterfowl species has contracted similar problems in the area.

This occurrence might not seem to be much of problem for people outside the Jefferson County area. Personally, I wish it was.

Instead of fighting against the use of steel shot for performance reasons, maybe waterfowl hunters should realize the problems that have developed and spend their energy doing something about

As Jessen said, it is frustrating because it has been illegal to hunt in Jefferson County with lead shot for more than 10 years. Now, we are feeling the effects of past abuse.

Now we have to look into the future to ensure the survival of the waterfowl. Ten years down the road...will it be 2,000 dead birds. instead?

Walton will also compete in the NCAA Indoor Championships on March 8-9 at the Hoosierdome in Indianapolis, Ind.

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
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
