





Tech relying on balanced attack, new 3-4 set

Entering the 1991 season with one of the premier receiving units in the country, Texas Tech had the inside line in the Southwest Conference for the top passing game.

But two devastating losses in the season opener — senior Rodney Blackshear and sophomore Lloyd Hill — have forced the Red Raiders to redesign the offense, virtually eliminating big plays.

Tech is 1-1 through two games in 1991. The Raiders demolished Cal State Fullerton 41-7 and were per carry through the first two games, downed by Oregon 28-13.







The Texas Tech offensive line is confident in its dual role as run/ pass blockers but realizes it must execute for the offense to succeed.

With no apparent emphasis on either the rushing or passing games, the Raider line is forced to be versatile in blocking assignments. When the quarterback is receiving a great deal of pressure from opposing defenses, these linemen must take responsibility.

Junior offensive tackle Charlie Biggurs said Tech can compete with anyone on any Saturday.

"We've got in our minds the attitude that if we come off the ball together and work to execute on each play, we can contend with anyone we come up against,' Biggurs said.

Senior guard Jason Duvall said the whole offense had to take responsibility for the Raiders' inconsistency against Oregon.

"The line broke down a number of times and gave up a couple of sacks, and then there were some fumbles on some plays, so I guess you could say the whole offensive unit was at fault," Duvall said.

The Southwest Conference in 1991 has had few boastful wins in its non-conference games. Biggurs, Duvall and Elam all said Houston's defeat at the hands of the ever-dominant Miami Hurricanes and Mississippi State's shocking defeat of Texas have put the credibility of the conference at a low mark. But, Baylor's upset of then 12th-ranked Colorado was a booster shot for the SWC.

Backs ready for balanced, high-powered offense

Diversity is a word which means many things, and diversity is what the Texas Tech offensive backfield has, with players such as Anthony Lynn and Louis Sheffield.

The leader of these backs is senior quarterback Jamie Gill. Gill was injured for most of the season last year, but came back in the first game of this season to lead the Red Raiders to its third straight victory (dating back to the final two games of the 1990 season.)

Gill said the Tech attack is balanced between pass and run.

"We are just going to stay with the same thing, a balanced attack. We got guys that can run out of the backfield and guys that can catch it," Gill said last week before Saturday's game with Wyoming. "Anytime you have a balanced attack that is more of a threat toward the defense, it is tough for them."

Last year, Gill played in eight games and completed 63 passes in 127 attempts for 1,080 yards. Backing up Gill is Robert Hall, a sophomore quarterback from Dallas Carter.

The Raiders have extensive depth at fullback with Louis Sheffield, Byron "Bam" Morris and the return of Anthony McDowell. Sheffield won the starting job in the spring, and has performed well in the first two contests against the Titans and Oregon. McDowell is returning from academic ineligibility to help add more depth at the position ...

"They are great receivers," Gill said of the running back corps. "That is the big thing about our running backs. They not only run the ball well, they can catch and they can block. It is a big plus to your team."




