Mitchell was arrested Friday afternoon by the FBI on suspicion of making threatening Joseph Hogsett.





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

The red ribbon campaign began as a result of the murder of federal drug agent Enrique Camarena by drug traffickers in 1985.

The red ribbon became a symbol of the nation's war against drugs just as the yellow ribbon symbolized the hostages in Iran and the POWs in Viet-

Arkell said this year's campaign is unique in that participation of the sororities and fraternities has increased 100 percent.

"We have provided these organizations with ribbons and pledge cards," she said.

Tech will face the Texas A&M Lady Aggies at 7 p.m. Wednesday at the Lubbock Municipal Coliseum.

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


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
