## Allgood retires after 29 years in Muleshoe

Dr. Homer Allgood, a fixture in Muleshoe's medical community for more than 29 years, has hung up his stethoscope.
Officially retired as of Nov. 30, Allgood will still be seen around his office for some time boxing up nearly 30 years of paperwork and memories.
Why retire now? He said his career had lasted long enough - a total of 53 years, counting his practice in Alabama before he came to Muleshoe. "My birth certificate is getting yellow around the edges," he said.
Besides, he has some important things to take care of now: putting his feet up and doing a lot of hunting and fishing.
He came to Muleshoe in June 1970 from Mobile, Ala. His medical degree is from the University of Alabama in 1946, when the university was still known as the Medical College of Alabama. He is a native of Fairfield, Ala.
He said he kept no tally on how many births he attended or how many patients he's seen, and "I have no pearls of wisdom" regarding specific cases.
What he did say is that "the next millennium is going to show a terrific amount of changes in medicine, all to the good - including great advances in gene research.
Allgood said he has thoroughly enjoyed his time in Muleshoe. The most memorable thing about it, he said, are the people who have been his patients.
He said the spirit of the people in the area is "fantastic," and as an example he cited the period when the local hospital was closed for a few years.
Allgood and Dr. Bruce Purdy sent patients to Amherst until townspeople were able to get the Muleshoe facility reopened, he said.
How did he manage to get to Muleshoe from Mobile? Life in the fast lane was getting to him he said, and he was looking for an escape from the "rat race" developing in the big cities at that

While the witnesses are not allowed to discuss their testimony while the trial is still in progress, as county judge Cox would have signed a search warrant to gather evidence from Rowton's car in an unre lated case involving the rape and beating of a New Mexico woman shortly

About that time, he said, Henry Malone - the pharmacist at the Muleshoe hospital, who had already "gravitated" to the High Plains - was visiting Mobile.
Allgood said Malone asked him if he knew anyone fresh from medical school who was looking to set up a practice in a small, quiet town.
After having a bad day commuting to work, Allgood said, he answered, "Well, hell Henry - I am.'

Shortly afterward, Allgood was invited to West Texas to take a look at the hospital facilities.
In a twist of fate, Allgood arrived in Muleshoe the day of an infamous tornado. He had spent the previous night in a

Lubbock motel, and soo earned that the motel was destroyed by the tornado.
He said he didn't take the tornado as an dark omen but rather as a positive sign: Sinc he was spared, Muleshoe must be the right place for him. When asked how his patients have reacted to his retirement, he said most of them have been supportive but some have threatened to go to his home for medical care.
Actually, his patients will have a choice of doctors. He isn't making specific referrals. Allgood said he doesn't re ally plan to keep up with the medical world, intending in stead to get adjusted to his free hours and lack of stress. He and his wife, Anita, will remain in Muleshoe.
