Classes will begin at $8 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. and continue through 10 p.m. Sixty-five night classes will be open this fall; consequently there will be no distinction between day classes and night classes. Students may take either
"There will be enough class space for all students," Miss Evelyn Clewell, asst. registrar, said, "but they may not be able to get the hour they want."

As a sample of the number of freshman courses to be opened this fall there will be 85 sections of freshman English, 10 sections of advanced composition, and more than 30 sections each of botany, zoology, chemistry and geology. Beginning French, German and Spanish have become four hour courses and each will have a lab hour each week. Tech is leading other Texas colleges in this respect, Miss Clewell added.

A surge of requests for specialized teachers is being felt at Texas Tech's Placement Service

The requests for mathematics, science and foreign language teachers have been pouring into the office from every corner of the United States, according to Mrs Jean Jenkins, Placement Service director.

She emphasized that the requests are for places to be filled by this September.
Her files reveals that the Tech office has received 117 requests or mathematies and combination science teachers, but only 27 of the Tech graduates in her files were qualified and available to fill the position.

The science teachers' picture is Mrs. Jenkins thinks that this much more alarming. ## Tech Readies

 Parking Lots, Adds SpacesThe addition of two parking ots and a reshuffling of present space allotments will result in parking for 6,000 cars on campus this fall, Tech officials say.
The coliseum lot, closed to Tech students most of last year, will be available for upperclassman parking. All but four rows, reserved for use of the coliseum, may be used.
Bill Daniels, chief of TrafficSecurity, urges on-campus stu-
dents "to leave their cars in the dorm areas during registration to help ease the big problem of crowded lots.'
As in the past, the dirt lot east of Jones stadium and the dorm ots will be open to freshmen The reserved lot behind the Chem istry Bldg., which formerly gave upperclassmen preference in selling spaces, will be open on a first come-first-served basis. The rate per space will be $\$ 30$, which in cludes vehicle registration. Students who decide not to use the lot next spring may get a $\$ 15$ re fund.
Those who reserve parking spaces will not be allowed to park anywhere else on campus, except in the 10 -minute post office spaces The process of giving tickets to illegally parked cars will remain the same. Three tickets accumlated in a twelve-month period will result in a car being restricted.
"I want to caution students about getting tickets at the beginning of the semester, so they won have them hanging over their heads all year," Lewis N. Jones, dean of men, said
To avoid that situation Daniels suggested that students "read the rules well. The ticket is given on the car, not the student." Most tickets, he added, are given to cars that have been loaned to an other student and illegally parked.
