

Domestic dispute ends in crash

A domestic dispute is believed to be the impetus for a two-car accident shortly after midnight Thursday that left a Muleshoe couple hospitalized and the intersection of American Boulevard and Highway 214 without traffic lights.

Jose Ramirez, 23, and his wife Jina Ramirez, 19, were transported by ambulance to Muleshoe Area Hospital, where they were listed in fair condition Friday afternoon. There were no passengers in either vehicle.

Driving a 1984 Chevrolet pickup, Jose Ramirez is believed to have been pursuing the 1984 Isuzu compact car driven by his wife at a high rate of speed east on American Boulevard. The pickup slammed into the car and both vehicles careened into the Town & Country parking lot,

knocking down a traffic light stanchion and a sign, according to Muleshoe Police Chief Jay Livingston.

Muleshoe police found beer in the pickup driven by Jose Ramirez. He was given a bloodalcohol test at the hospital. It will be several weeks before police learn the results.

Jina Ramirez' car came to rest between two rows of gas pumps, 94 feet from the point of impact.

The pickup struck the bottomportion of the lighted Town & Country sign, sheered off the traffic signal post at its base before coming to rest in the middle of Highway 214, nearly 167 feet from the point of first impact.

"He must have had one helluva ride," Livingston said as he surveyed the damage, which included the shattered

The Longhorns played Texico, N.M. Friday in the championship semifinals. The Wolverines edged the Plainview JV 52-50 in an earlier game.

LHS (7-1) sports four players taller than 6-1, including 6-7, 260-pound junior Jason Thomas.

Thomas finished with a quiet

8 points, but 6-1 senior Justin St. Clair (21 points) and 6-2 junior Chris Smith (15 points) took over the scoring load. Israel Lopez, a 6-3 senior, added 12 points and did plenty of damage on the boards.

"The thing I like is we're balanced," Lazbuddie coach Gary Grahn said. "You can't just come out and sag on us because we can hit the outside

St. Clair and Smith each had a pair of 3-pointers.

Grahn was wary of Dora's quickness but the Coyotes never got its running and pressing game going.

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Ag News

Ag imports up 12 percent for '96

U.S. agricultural exports are running 12 percent higher this year, already surpassing a record of \$54.1 billion, the Associated Press reports.

Exports in August totaled \$4.6 billion, up 5 percent from 1995, increasing the total for the marketing year that began Oct. 1, 1995, to \$55.4 billion.

Agricultural imports were valued at \$2.7 billion in August and \$29.8 billion for the 11 months.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture estimated that beef exports for the 11-month period were 5 percent higher than 1995, at \$2.4 billion. Poultry meat exports in 1996 are up 26 percent, to \$2.2 billion.

MHS crumbles in second half

Muleshoe coach Jim Gruhlkey was hoping for a case of collective amnesia Tuesday after a forgettable second-half performance that led to a 48-35 loss to Farwell at WJHS gym.

"I told them after the game this is just one we have to forget," Gruhlkey said.

Instead, Gruhlkey wants the Lady Mules (3-10) to focus on their District 1-3A season opener at Sanford-Fritch Friday.

"I hate to say it, but we have just as good a chance at winning the district as anybody," Gruhlkev said. "Well, River Road might have a slight advantage because of their size."

But Muleshoe will have to correct the silly turnovers and poor shooting that resurfaced in the second half of Tuesday's

The Lady Blue opened the third quarter with a 10-0 run, then ran at will in the fourth quarter when Muleshoe was forced to press in an attempt to get back into the game.

"I knew coming into the game we couldn't press them, but we had no choice," Gruhlkey said. "They're just too quick and handle the ball too well."

Class 1A Farwell (9-2) got balanced scoring as four players scored 8 points and two

more finished with 7 points.

Farwell, which does not have a senior on the team, starts five juniors.

"The girls just like to play basketball and get after it," Lady Blue coach Steve Scott said. "Anytime you beat a bigger school it's a plus. Especially one like Muleshoe that is so well coached."

Muleshoe senior Kristen Nichols led MHS with 10 points.

Muleshoe, which led by two at halftime, crept within 33-27 late in the third quarter on Nichols' 15-footer. But sub Chesli Woods (8 points) hit a 13-foot jump shot at the third quarter buzzer, then scored the first four points of the fourth quarter to stretch Farwell's lead back to 12, 40-28.

Muleshoe spent the rest of the quarter trying to chase down Candace Travis (8 points) and freshman Ashley Crawford in the press.

Playing well early, Muleshoe grabbed a 12-9 first-quarter lead on Brandi Harrison's short bank shot at the buzzer after grabbing a rebound kept alive by Heather Hooten.

Muleshoe took its biggest lead, 16-9, early in the second

Muleshoe feasts on Farwell early

Muleshoe went on a little R&R Tuesday, running and rampaging past Farwell 79-68 at WJHS gym.

MHS (8-3) rattled the Steers (9-2) early with full-court pressure and ravaged the offensive boards for 16 first-half points.

But more importantly, the Mules were running.

"They beat out press some, but as long as we're playing uptempo it's okay," Muleshoe coach Ralph Mason said.

Mason was happy with the way the Mules rebounded from their sometimes lackluster play in the Denver City Tournament last week.

"I feel good about it because the kids came back refocused Monday for practice," Mason said. "I think it was one of our best practices of the year."

The Mules were at their destructive best early, jumping out to a 21-10 lead on Corey Williams' 3-pointer with 1:24 left in the first quarter.

Muleshoe led by at least six points and more often double figures the rest of the way.

Muleshoe continued its assault on the offensive boards in a more workman-like second half, taking its biggest lead of the game, 71-52, on Alfonso Mendoza's 3-pointer a minute into the fourth quarter.

The pesky Steers shaved the

Mules' lead to six points with 29 seconds left, but it was too

MHS finished with 15 offensive rebounds and a 37-27 rebounding edge. The Mules also forced 20 turnovers and had 11 steals. Muleshoe shot 49 precent from the field and was 6 of 18 on 3-pointers.

Dustin Cleavinger led Muleshoe with 21 points (17 in the first half) and 9 rebounds. Matt McClanahan added 11 points and his usual heady floor game and Mendoza finished with 10 points and 9 rebounds.

"I think Dustin turned it up a notch," Mason said. "His role on the team is so important."

Cleavinger, still growing at 6-4, is averaging better than 16 points and 9 rebounds a game, but gets lackadaisical at times.

Lazbuddie (9-2) played Texico Friday in the championship semifinals. Texico beat the Farwell JV 58-36.







But the boy isn't satisfied, and he shouts back, "I know God loves me and that he'll take care of me, but right now I need somebody with skin on."

Our world did, too. And so God came "with skin on." Immanuel. God with us. God sharing fully in the human situation from the trauma of birth to the violence of death. God feeling everything a human being can feel.

Christmas assures me that the God I worship is no absentee landlord who lives a million miles off leaving the poor tenants to aimlessly "do their own thing."


Nor is our God an emotionless lawgiver, a heavenly bureacrat lost somewhere on a cloud shuffling paper and handing down rules to complicate a situation he knows nothing about.

God is not the sort of military officer who proposes brave and daring offensives but whose idea of "leading" the charge is sitting safe and warm in a command post moving markers and flags on a map.

Christmas assures me that God has been at the front. He's seen the blood. And the most precious of all

wondrous story of The Christmas is that with those stunned shepherds all the angels and the universe itself watched in utter amazement at the depth of God's love as he became what we needed most-Immanuel, a God with skin on.
