IS COLLEGE WORTH WHILE?

The question as to the worth of college and a college education has been discussed pro and con by many prominent men of the world in the last few months and nothing has resulted from their arguments yet.

There is no question about the worth of college. It helps to develop the young mind, even though a certain time of the four years are spent in what might seem to older persons as idleness and foolishness. Statistics and records of the big businesses show that college men are gaining more headway in the world than those who do not have a college deducation.

One of the best articles on the subject of the worth of college is presented in the May issue of the American Magazine by William S. Dutton about Dr. William H. P. Faunce, president of Brown University. Dr. Faunce, one of the foremost educators of the nation has spent much of his life in colleges and college work. He is considered an authority on the subject.

"Money, opportunity, and the mere ability to obtain an entrance certificate or pass an entrance examination are not tests of college fitness," deciares Doctor Faunce; "for is the desire of a parent for a college-trained son any evidence of the son's fitness. Colleges do not confer degrees for athletic prowess. Their aim is not to grant badges of social and commercial prestige. They do not create capacity for understanding, but demand it. They are not designed for the purely practical-minded, nor for the youth who desire merely to do, rather than to think and comprehend.

"As 1 told our Brown students a few

"As 1 told our Brown students a few years ago, the young man who enters college should come seeking two main things: First, horizon, and, second, mastery. These two things the college eneavors to give.

"Most of us enter college with an experience that is real but extremely limited. We have lived in our own back yard and seldom loked over the fence. To enlarge that horizon until it covers all lands and centuries, until it covers the great domains of literature, science, history, philosophy, and art, is the first object of college training. To know something of everything!

"The other main object is to give the stu-

"The other main object is to give the student mastery of some one subject. Breadth of horizon is not enough—a man may be so broad that he is flat. There is no intellectual joy quite so great as the sense of having mastered some one corner of the world's knowledge. To know everything of something, and so master it, ought to be the second great aim of college training."

His father didn't mind his shiny coat, nor his mother her indifferent clothes. They too asted of the way they managed to give the boy his chance. They gloried in their sacrifice.

Now everyone knows the price of an education. And I made a mental calculation that over half of the small income of that couple was spent on the boy. I knew they had it figured so fine that whatever allowance they made him for spending money it was about their last nickel.

Any extra requests from him meant their necessities. Yet here the mother, her face beaming with soft joy, in spite of the shadow of wonder I thought I saw there. What more could she do without to make up for it at home?

What the boy should have had at this psychological moment was a sharp pull-up on the reins instead of more money. Children have to be taught unselfishness. The best of them will make door-mats of their parents if allowed to grow up accustomed to having their own way. It is a matter of training, largely, unselfishness is.

If parents wish to live on insufficient food and in a house that is never quite warm, that is their business. What concerns society is the parents' right to ruin a good citizen.

Another thing. Children should be grateful for an education without the modern expensive by-products. The by-products are taken too much for granted. They often cost more than the education itself.—O. B. Barton in Dallas Dispatch.

Abraham Lincoln was considered an outcast from society, yet he lead an undivided nation back to peace and unification. Social affiliation should be the last thing in judging the qualifications of a man for the office.

Casting aside the social rating, this would place such officers in the association who would really take their work as serious and try to accomplish something; co-operation could be developed more and more action and attention could be given to the student activities. Clubs, societies, and such should be replaced by more activities of a student association caliber; otherwise some students pass through school with a limited chance.

It is no little thing to hold the position of student officer; a student body will act to the limit under proper stimuli, and it takes thought and action to hold more than 1500 students together for one purpose. The officers must be capable as any other student of the student body. If you have one in mind don't fail to try to get the idea across that he would make a good leader for the student body as the man selected will be their leader. No qualifications outside of leadership should be considered a
