A WRITER of Biblical passages looks into eternity and describes the separation of the "sheep" from the "goats". Such a classification could have been made, during registration Monday and Tuesday for the spring semester. Although this may seem a far-fetched illustration, the terms of application to two groups seems quite appropriate after you have diagnosed the situation and grasped the facts of the situation.

Often this year while the Matador band was parading at a football game or an athletic event, students have remarked in disgust, "Gee, what a sloppy looking college musical organization." This theme has centered some of your conversations or genuine "bull" sessions. You have felt such a distasteful but true assertion falling on your ears from the lips of Lubbock citizens and other visitors on the campus. BUT you are not the only one that has realized the Matador band is in dire need for classy and snappy uniforms. Student leaders, the capable and interested director, D. O. Wiley, Administration and faculty members realize that the time has come to remedy that condition. At a conference last week in President Knapp's office, representatives of these groups laid their cards on the table and pulled out an ace.

This week, as enrollees passed through the east wing of the Administration building enroute to pay their fees at the business office, an opportunity knocked with the privilege and duty of purchasing a ticket to a Matador band concert March 10. Money derived from the sale of these ducats forms a fund. Receipts pay for attractive uniforms, made in school colors, already in the process of manufacture.

From the place of sales passed the two groups rightfully called "sheep" and "goats" in the first paragraph. The "goats" listened attentively to the plea for support in the drive. After refusal to make purse, the "goat" crumpled a dollar bill in his hand like a miser, and went his way to continue criticizing the band's appearance never realizing he had missed a golden chance to aid the institution in more ways than one by spending the small sum.

The total enrollment at Texas Tech for the long session of 1935-36 was 17.8 percent above that of 1932-33, or an increase from 2,332 to 2,748?
The increase in enrollment in 1935-36 over 1932-33 in the Division of Agricultire was 54.1 percent, or an increase from 205 students to 316 students, and we already have this fall 328 students in that division?









