LEND YOUR SUPPORT

A great season is ahead for Texas Tech athletics.

Track and tennis will be resumed next spring with competition with other colleges and universities. This fall a drive will be made to sell student activity tickets. The Toreador believes that every student returning this fall should consider buying an activity as part of his registration fee. A ticket saves money, time and trouble, and surely every student will want to see every contest on the local athletic field.

The Toreador suggests, however, that a better plan than the one used now might be devised for selling tickets. We suggest that there be three tickets, one for each term. INVESTIGATE FIRST
Prices charged by boarding houses in the college district

Prices charged by boarding houses in the college district must be reduced.

The Toreador, after a careful investigation of food costs, announces that it will champion the students' rights in battling the local food profiteers.

For example, a local grocer told the Toreador investigator that food prices have been reduced about 35 per cent on the wholesale market. This reduction has not affected prices to such an extent that all canned goods in the ten cent class two years ago are now selling from one to three cents cheaper while in the high priced line reductions have been met similar cuts.

From products such as eggs, fresh vegetables, and milk are now down to rock bottom prices. This, however, does not mean that Tech students are getting any benefit from the reductions. The average boarding house keeper can supply eggs at breakfast for her entire table of twenty for as little as twenty-five cents.

Watermelon, at twenty to thirty cents each, beans, peas, corn, and similar vegetables are so cheap that a dollar will purchase sufficient to feed twenty hungry students. Meat also, has been placed into the cheap class selling from eight to sixteen cents a pound.

A pencil, two pieces of paper, and a grocery store ad given a few minutes of attention will show beyond the slightest doubt that Texas Tech students are paying too much when they pay more than \$20 a month for board of three meals each day.

The Toreador advises the thousands of returning students to investigate the various eating houses and refuse to pay more than food prices today warrant. Many of the places listed this week in The Toreador have reudeed their rates. The wise student will investigate these places before he locates this fall.




