SUB Fee Support Passed by Senate

Legislation permitting levy of a compulsory student fee to support Tech's new Student Union Build-ing passed the Texas senate Mon-lay with little objection.

The bill, which now goes to the House to be voted on, would allow the Tech board of directors to levy a maximum fee of \$5 per student per long semester for support of the Union building and activities. The maximum fee for summer students would be \$2.50 per semester.



In the fifth annual sophomore livestock judging contest, all students are eligible who have enrolled in or completed A. H. 231 but have not enrolled in A. H. 312 or 313 and whose scholastic classification is less than junior.

Additional Judging Officials

Officials for the sophomore contest will be the same as for the former event except Prof. R. C. Mowery and Prof. Nathan J. Allen Jr. will be added to the judging staff.

Classes in the sophomore con-test will be Aberdeen-Angus heif-ers, Hereford cows, Holstein cows, Jersey cows, Poland-China gilts, Hampshire barrows, Hampshire ewes, quarter horses, Rambouillet ewes and Southdown ewes.

High individual in the contest will receive a one-year subscription to a livestock publication of his choice. The person winning first place in each of the divisions—beef cattle, dairy cattle, hogs, sheep, and quarter horses—will receive a one-year subscription to a breed journal of the particular kind of livestock in which he won.

Participation Eligibility
All students who have completed or are enrolled in A.H. 131 but who have not enrolled for A.H. 231 and who are below junior standing are eligible to enter the 27th annual freshman livestock judging contest. Officials will be be the same as for the preceding contests. Aberdeen-Angus steers, Hereford heifers, Holstein cows, Jersey cows, Hampshire ewes, fat lambs, fat barrows, Hampshire gilts and quarter horses will all be judged by the freshmen.
A gold medal will go to the high individual, with a silver and a bronze medal going to the second and third place winner respectively. Awards will be made by the Tech Chapter of Block and Bridle.




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
