## Friday Set As Opening Date For Annual Engineers Show

Engineers will come into their own Friday when the annual Engineers Show opens today. Exhibits will be open for viewing from 8 a. m. to 10 p. m. in various campus buildings.

Opening of the instrumentation laboratory, which is the first in the state, will be featured by the chemical engineers in the show.

Over \$6,000 of equipment has been installed by the senior chemical engineers this year to enable students to gain first-hand information about the instruments which automatically control the operation of many chemical plants.

Also in operation will be the unit operations laboratory where the individual steps which make up the processes by which chemicals are made may be studied in detail.

### Chemistry

The chemistry department will display equipment used in chemical analysis, organic chemistry, physical chemistry, spectrographic analysis, and other phases of chemical work in different rooms of the Chemistry Building.

"There will also be a chromatography display and the annual magic show," announces W. W. Slagle, sponsor of the American Chemical Society.

### Physics

"The physics department's con-

tribution to the Show will be sponsored by the student chapter of the American Institute of Physics," states Dr. C. C. Schmidt, department head.

The displays will be shown in the various physics labs of the new Science Building for the first time.

A jet racer, using dry ice for fuel, will be shown. Experiments on spectroscopes and a scaler which measures radio activity will be exhibited. There will also be displays of discharge tubes showing properties of electrons when an electrical current goes through an evacuated tube.

### Geology

The geology department will have a Geology Show as its part in the Engineers Show.

"The Geology Show will be in the north wing of the Science Building on the main and basement floors," says Bill Bales, manager.

There will be mineralogy, petrology, historical geology, paleontology, stratigraphy and meteorology exhibits. Aerial and structural photos will also be shown. Other displays include oil and gas reservoirs, a steam table and a geyser.

### Petroleum Engineering

Petroleum engineering will exhibit all types of drilling equipment in scale models. Several servicing units from area contractors will be located outside the Petroleum Engineering Building.

### Civil Engineers

The civil engineers display will feature a model of the type turbine used at Boulder Dam. The model turbine transforms water power into electricity which in turn will operate a rock crusher and a separator. Also displayed will be specimens of water from Buffalo Lakes containing algae and other organisms. A model of an earth dam will also be shown.

### Architecture

The architecture department will show scale models done as thesis problems by fifth-year students. Drawings will also be shown.

### ROTC

The Infantry and Engineer branches of the Army ROTC will present army equipment displays. These displays will be inside and in front of X10.

The Infantry will display types of weapons such as an M1 rifle, M2 carbine, 60 and 81 mm mortars, 75 mm recoilless rifles, and several machine guns.

The ROTC Engineers will show both anti-tank and anti-personnel mines and mine detectors. They will have various types of bridge models such as the timber trestle and pontoon, and rafts, water purification units and tool kits.

### Textile Engineering

Textile engineers will have open house for the Textile Engineering Building, as is usually done. Visitors will be shown how cloth is made, from spinning the thread to actual weaving of the cloth.

### Others Represented

Departments which will be represented in the Show, but whose programs were unavailable at presstime, are electrical engineering, commercial art, biology, and industrial engineering.

Cokes, candy bars, and souvenirs will be sold.

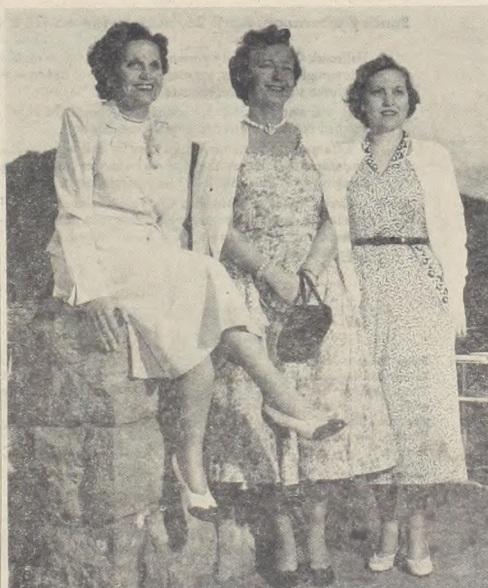

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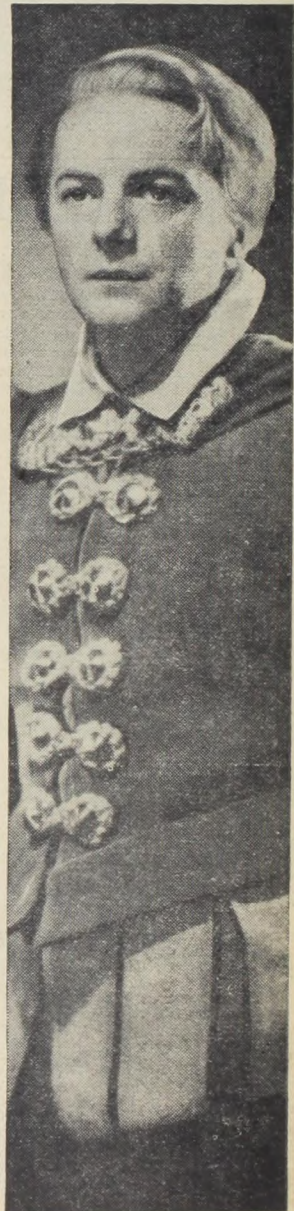
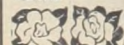

# Raider Fin Men Trounce New Mexico Military Again

Tech's swim team lashed New Mexico Military Institute to the tune of 57-27 in a dual meet at the Lubbock Boys Club Friday afternoon.

Three dual meet records were smashed by Raider fin men, as the Tech crew shifted into high gear to coast to their fifth victory and stage their best showing of the season.

### New Records

New records were set in the 200-yard relay, the 50-yard free style, and in the 100-yard free style. Brooks Akins, who scored double victories and swam with the winning 200-yard relay team, led the Raiders in points scored with 11 1/2. Bob Kain also chalked up double wins to grab second place honors with 10 points.

The Raider 200-yard relay team sliced more than a half minute off the old 200-yard relay record held by Tech. Bob Shackelford, Malcolm Daniel, Akins, and Don Davis raced over the 200-yards in 1:50.7 to shatter the old record of 2:25.9. This new record was within eight seconds of the unofficial Border Conference mark.

### Akins At His Best

Akins, who was at his best Friday, accounted for the remaining two broken records. He flashed through the 50-yard free style in :26 to break the old mark of :27.4 which was held by New Mexico Military's Mike McBee. His new mark came within .17 seconds of the Border Conference record of :24.3.

Akins also set another dual meet record in the 100-yard free style, swimming the distance in 1:00.4, to better the old mark of 1:03 set by Tech's Lotfin Witcher last year.

Shackelford came close to the Border Conference record of 2:55 when he raced the 200-yard breast stroke in 2:57.1. It was the first time that the event had been included in Tech-NMMI meets.

Mike McBee, who took one of the two first places the Cadets captured, placed in three events to lead the visitors in scoring with 9 points.

The victory was Tech's second over New Mexico Military. The Raiders had previously defeated the Cadets 61-19 in Roswell April 11.

### Sports Briefs . . .

Two Southeastern Conference schools will be met by Texas Tech's basketball team next season.

The Red Raiders will meet the University of Tennessee in Knoxville December 3 and Vanderbilt in Nashville December 5, according to Coach Polk Robison. It will be the first meeting in history between Tech and Tennessee. Vanderbilt defeated the Raiders, 55-49, at Nashville in 1951.

The Raiders will probably play other games on the same tour. A similar tour has been taken by the Techs for the past several years to get the Raiders ready for the grinding Border Conference race. . . .

The Region One track and field meet will be held on the Tech campus Saturday, with many records expected to fall.

Competition in golf and tennis will also be held, beginning Friday. Tournaments for all three conferences, AA, A, and B, will be held in golf and track. A and B will be combined in tennis.

## Raider Linksmen Lose To H-SU

Tech golfers were downed, 4-2, in a practice match with Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene last Thursday.

Victories by G. W. Warden and Jimmy Baker accounted for the two Tech tallies.

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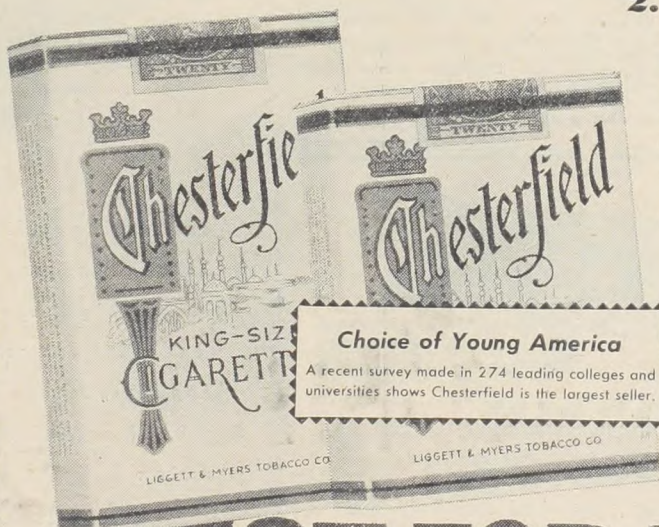
