## AN EDITORIAL <br> "Help Wanted"

As classes swung into the first full week of the new school year, cries for help went out from several worthwhile extra-currioular activities.

At least one such activity is something completely new on the campus - an orchestra. In a college long noted for its exceptionally fine band, and highly regarded all over the country for its entire music department, the lack of an orchestra is to be deplored. Even a modest orchestra would add much to Tech's musical and cultural side. Thase who are taking the lead in developing such a group deserve the support of the entire student body and not just the interest of a few who play instruments.
On the other side of the ledger, a lack of staff members presents a rather dim picture to those in charge of the chool publications, La Ventana and The Toreador.

La Ventana, perennially short of help, is in the same shape once again. Work on the annual comes all at once, and this year the crucial period will begin around the middle of November. A large turnout of willing workers would solve many problems then, and practically assure the student body of getting the annual on time next spring.

The Toreador is in much worse condition staff-wise than in several years. Relying almost entirely on journalism tudents for its reporting and editing staff, the paper has been crippled by a smaller-than-usual enrollment in those classes. Help, even though untrained, would aid greatly in insuring coverage of many worthwhile groups and events the campus.

Of course, it is up to the student himself as to the sort of extra-curricular activities he takes part in during college. But the student who answers the call of a really worthy enterprise not only helps that enterprise exist, he opens the door to self-improvement.
