Local Cagers Hope To Avenge Defeat

Albuquerque Quint Winners Of Only Game This Season

COACH POLK Robison will take his Texas Tech Red Raider basketball team on one of their last road trips of the season next week-end, when they journey to Albuquerque, New Mexico, with high hopes of obtaining a victory from the New Mexico University Lobos, and attaining revenge for a 44-56 defeat handed them by that quint last Saturday night in Tech gym.

The youthful Raiders will meet the Canines in a two game series next Friday and Saturday nights, Feb. 4 and 5, in what may close their road season for 1944.

On Feb. 9 the local cagers will either make a trip to Amarillo for a game with the Bombers of that base, or play the Childress Officers' club in the local gym. Either game should prove tough competition for Robison's men, and especially so if the Childress five comes to Lubbock. This team boasts of being one of the finest in the South, and have had little trouble from opponents so far this season.

On Feb. 12 the Raiders play hosts to the Tech Engineers from across the campus, and hope to establish their superiority over this section of Lubbock basketball. The Engineers boast of a fine team, and have dropped few games to date.

Tech Quint Drops 56 To 44 Decision

Visiting Sailors Have Easy Win From Local Cage Team

SPARKED by rangy Don Grove the Texas Tech Red Raiders fought valiantly but to no avail last Saturday night as the New Mexico university Lobos downed the locals in a fast-moving fray, 56 to 44.

The Raiders trailed the victors during the entire game as the Albuquerque team was avenging three defeats handed them by last season's Tech five. The visitors won the battle walking away, with the younger Techsians threatening their lead but once during the fray.

Grove, a Monument, New Mexico lad who showed no pity on his fellow-statemens, copped high scoring honors for the night's work with 18 points to his credit. It was due mostly to his spectacular playing that the Raiders made the showing they did against their veteran foes.

The Lobos, made powerful by the Naval training program at that school, stacked up an early 17 to 9 lead on the Red Raiders during the opening minutes of play. But Hubert Bechtel and Grove suddenly brought the hosts to life with a brilliant rally to bring the score to 16 points for Tech, while the Lobos scored no goals during this brief spurt to maintain a scant one point lead. This was the last time the Raiders threatened the visitors' lead.

Kay Hafen paced the Lobo attack with 15 points amassed to his credit. He held a scant margin over his teammate Charles Underwood who had 14 points, while Bechtel of Tech was tied with Underwood for third place in the evening's race for individual honors.

The halftime score was 32 to 23 as the veteran New Mexico boys settled down to the business of getting the revenge they came to Texas Tech to get. The Red Raiders played them almost even during the last half, but the first half lead was too much for the youngsters to overcome.

In the curtain raiser on the program the South Plains Army Air Field cagers won from the Tech Drug Independents, composed mostly of ex-Tech basketballers, in a game that found the high scoring cagers of the air field greatly slowed by the hustling Independents, but the service five came through to take a close one from the weary Druggists, 34 to 27.

It was the 26th of May, 1943.

To you, it was a heavenly Spring day that just had to be celebrated in some way. Besides, you were so bored with all the talk and headlines of war.

To our men on Attu, it was the fifteenth day of incessant fighting. That is, to those who had not been killed, or put out of action with wounds or frozen feet.

They hadn't slept for days; their sun-burned faces ached; their heads and beards and wool-covered bodies itched; their feet were never dry. The dead lay all about them in the fog and snow—an occasional Jap, twisted grotesquely in death, over the body of an American.

But the biggest push of the battle was just ahead.

They had to attack a Jap-held plateau called the Bench, which meant scaling a steep cliff, in the face of continuous gunfire from the Japs, smugly entrenched on top. The final 25 yards were so steep, the soldiers had to drag themselves up by plunging their rifle butts into the snow.

The Japs lay quietly in wait, until our men were almost to the summit. Then, without rising from their fox holes, they rolled grenades down on them. Three times new groups of Americans scaled up the cliff to be blown to eternity.

And suddenly—one American stood alone on the Bench. With his rifle pointed down, he walked deliberately from one fox hole to another, shooting into them with deadly accuracy. Impervious to the Jap grenades all about him, he went on, finally using his gun butt to bash the Japs as they trembled in their holes.

He was still bashing away when our troops finally reached him.

Asked later how he did it, he explained his best friend had been killed as they started up the slope and he didn't remember anything after that.

Asked by his Colonel what he wanted, he said since he'd been a Corporal so long, Sergeant's stripes would be nice.

He got his stripes and he's mighty gratified. He did not get an invitation to your party, but that's all right—he was too busy to attend.

Did you have a good time?
