# **Classes Every Hour** Of Day Set For Fall

# **Every Classroom** To Be Utilized For Fall Term

Utilization of every classroom on e Texas Tech campus every hour the day, with some night classes samble, will be necessary to meet a noreased 50 per cent over the pring semester, Tech officials we annunced

an enrollment next fall expected to be increased 50 per cent over the spring semester. Tech officials have announced Taboratory periods will be set for the morning, as well as the after-noon daily, and lecture classes will be scheduled for each period from 8 a m. until 5 p. m. Prof. W. M. Slagle, chairman of the schedule committee, has announced. In pre-vious terms little laboratory work was done before noon by students, mornings generally being assigned to lectures and afternoons to "labs" all divisions of the college. "Records show each classroom was used 90 per cent of every day during the morning and 1 p. m. class periods Mondays, Wednes-days and Fridays last spring." Prof. Slagle said. Rapier, junior architect at Tech, proposes that the housing project be placed on field No. 1, just south of the Aggie building. A similar plan to the one adopted by Tech's cooperative is being carried out at Texas A&M.

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


