Staff changes in THE DAILY TOREADOR were announced Friday by Charles Richards, newly appointed editor.

Max Jennings will fill the managing editor's position left vacant Thursday by Richards' promotion to editor.

Gayle Machen will be assistant managing editor and Lew Bullion the new copy editor.

SDX Extravaganza Reveals Top Tech Beauties Tonight

If you are familiar with space age terminology, you might say it's countdown time.

For 32 of Texas Tech's most curvaceous, best-looking coeds seeking the title of Miss Mademoiselle the next few hours will probably slip by a mite too fast.

Because when the bell tolls the eighth hour tonight, it will be curtain time for the 1963 La Ventana Extravaganza — the time when the beauties will change from typical Techsians to beautiful women of grace and poise.

After the program some coed will reign as Miss Mademoiselle — Tech's most beautiful woman — and another will wear the title of Miss Playmate.

Municipal Auditorium is the site of the contest, and admission prices are \$1 per person or \$1.50 per couple.

The candidates for Miss Mademoiselle — narrowed from a list of 182 in preliminary judging a week ago — will appear in both swim suits and formals as they parade before a panel of five judges. Miss Playmate contestants will be presented in swim suits, although judging in this contest will be based solely on 8x10 pictures previously submitted.

The coed named Miss Playmate will be featured in a three-page foldout in the Playboy section of the 1963 La Ventana, and Miss Mademoiselle will be pictured on the cover of the Mademoiselle section. In addition, Miss Playmate and the 10 finalists in the Miss Mademoiselle contest will receive an all-expense paid ski trip to Ruidoso during spring vacation.

With entertainment carrying out the theme of "Caravan," while the contestants change from swim suits to formals, along with the built-in humor of Lubbock radio deejay and emcee Gene Price, the show will be more than a beauty contest.

Nancy Bacon, who sang during halftime of the Tech-Arkansas game here Tuesday, will open the program with a Jewish chant known as "Havah Nagilah."

Mildred Mall, a native of India, will do an Indian dance, and a group of modern dancers will also perform. Providing organ music throughout the evening will be Robert Brown.

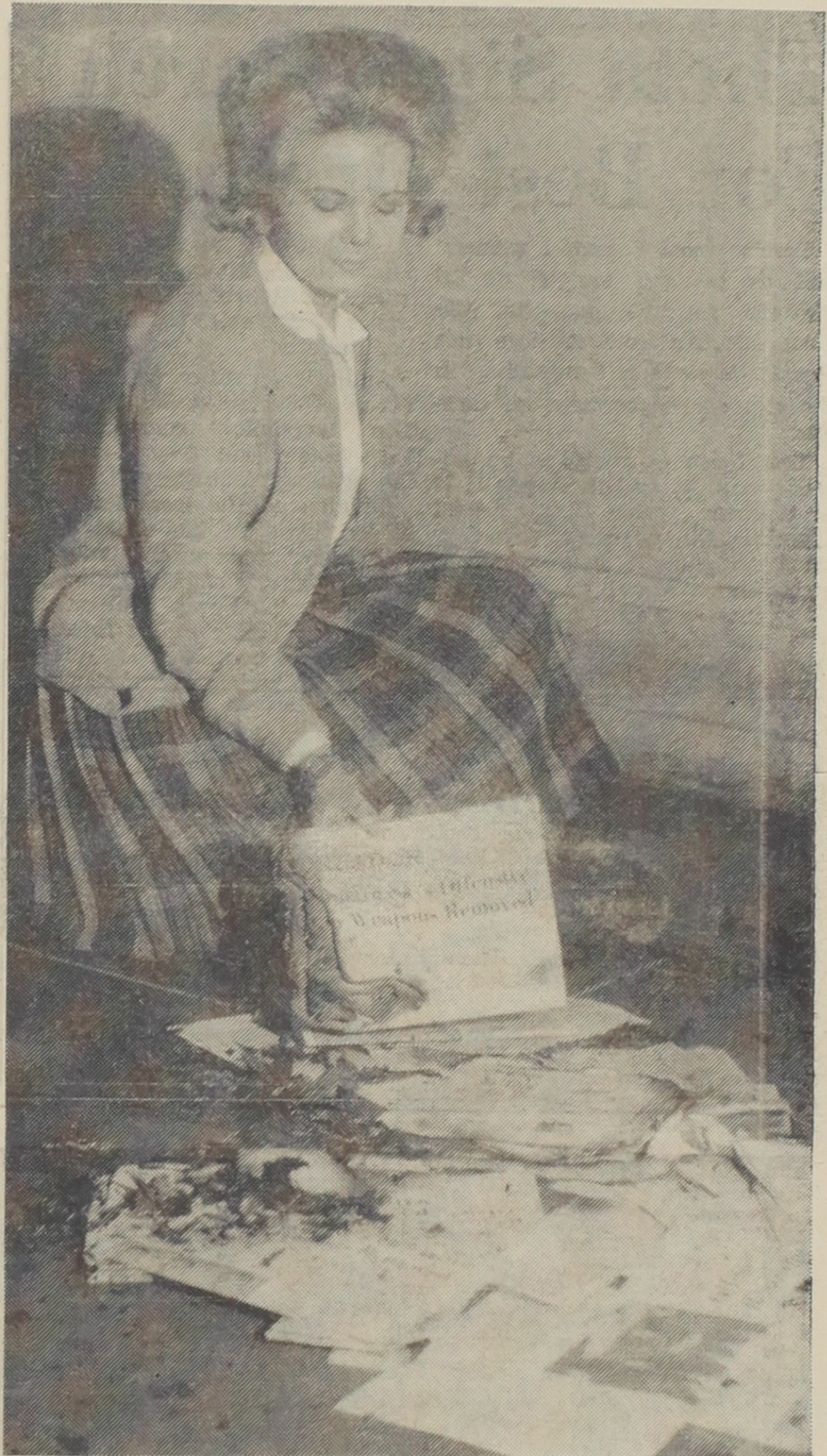

Tech hosted 29 Plainview High School students Friday in the second phase of a recruiting program for honor students.

This was the second of three such groups brought to the campus this spring by the Academic Recruiting Committee.

The students, members of the National Honor Society, were welcomed in Tech Union.

The group toured the Library and Tech Union, then each student visited the department that he or she is considering entering.

Two student speakers addressed the 24 girls and five boys at a luncheon in the Union. Speakers were James Cole, BSO president, and Steve Magee, Honors Council president.

Dr. Floyd Boze, Tech registrar, explained entrance requirements to the prospective Techsians.

The students also inspected science laboratories and toured Knapp Hall.

The last tour stop was Tech Bookstore.

Ginger Butler, Dallas senior, and Pam White, Richardson senior, are co-chairmen of the recruiting committee. Ronnie Botkin, Hereford sophomore, is in charge of bringing the students to the campus.

Botkin stated that the program appears to be very successful.

"On the last tour, we had 45 students from Odessa and Hereford. I don't know about Odessa, but 10 Hereford students that visited the campus cancelled applications for admission to other schools," he said.

The ex-student office is responsible for coordinating activities of all ex-student chapters, besides publishing a newspaper four times yearly and a magazine eight times yearly.



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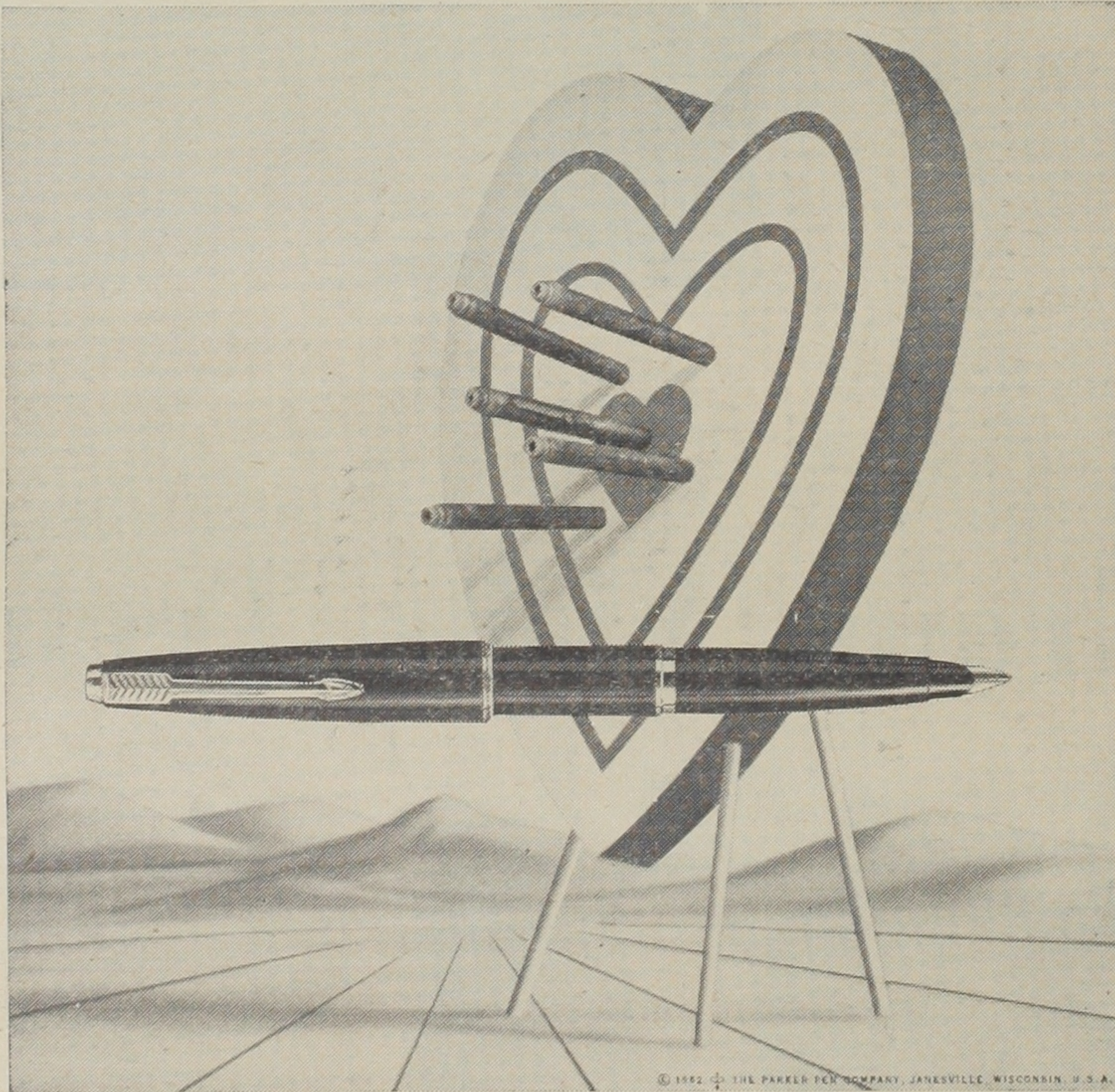

The school includes learning of dialogues and general conversation of a practical nature.


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Applications Available For Sorority Awards

After a parade through downtown Tucson, the "Sabre Flight" will attend a luncheon where General Jimmy Doolittle will be guest speaker.

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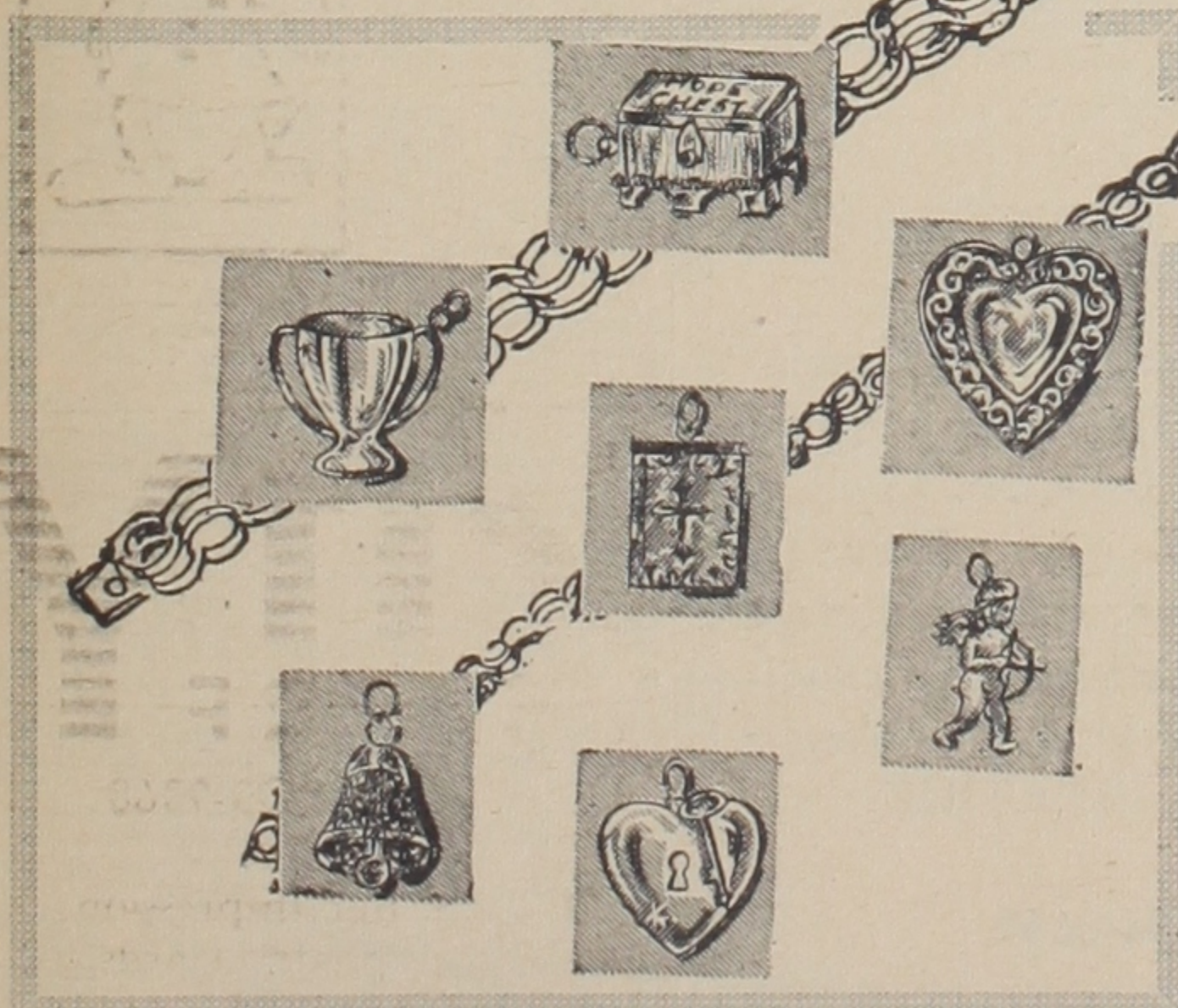
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Tech Challenges Rice

With two straight victories clutched tightly in their hands, the Texas Tech Red Raiders invade the nest of the Rice Owls at 8 p.m. tonight seeking to fulfill a twofold desire.

One part of the desire is to continue their sudden winning streak and the other is to push Rice, number two in the conference, out of their high spot.

To accomplish these ends Tech will probably field the starting

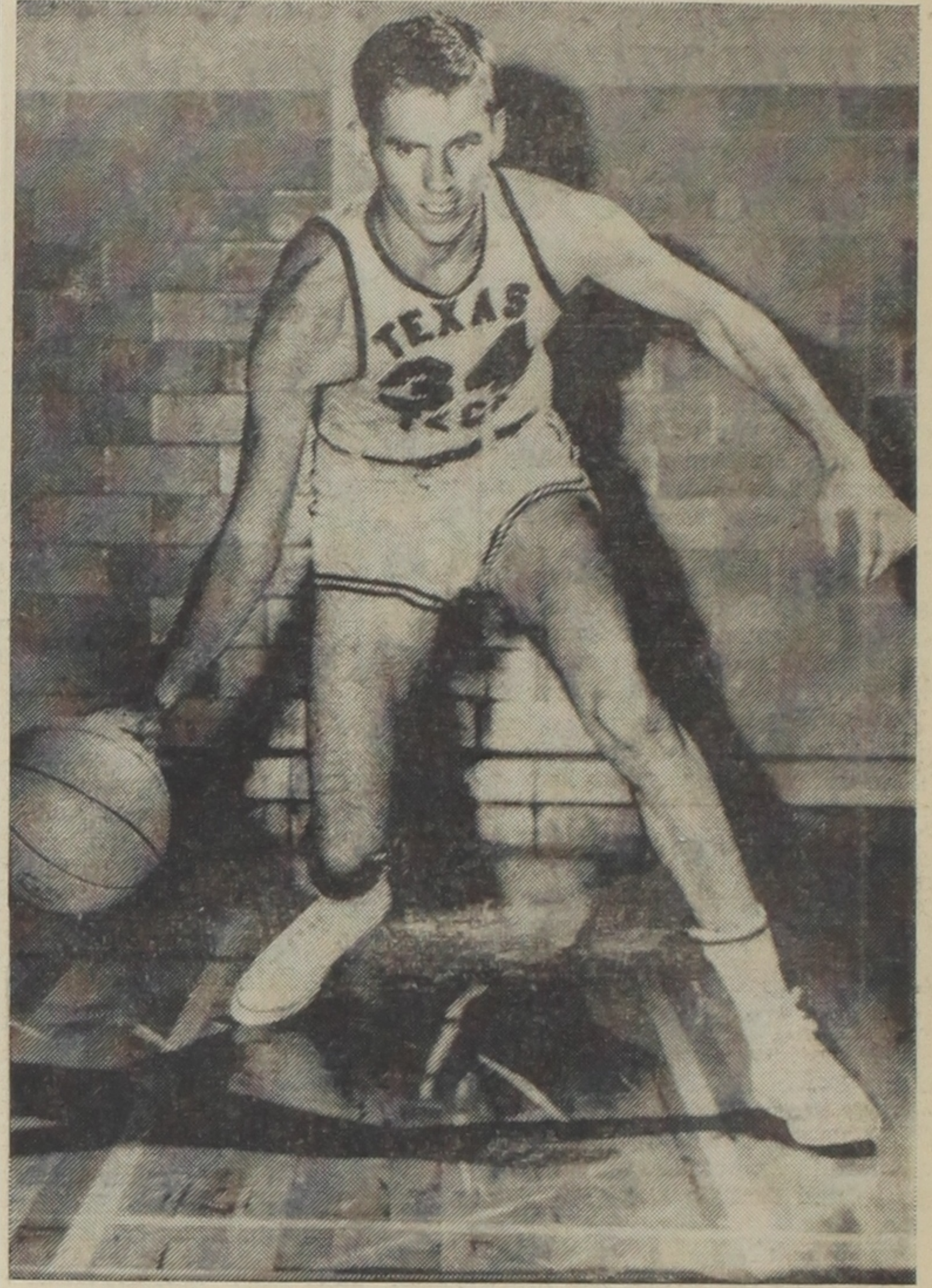
line-up of Harold Denney at center, Tom Patty and Mike Farley at guards and Bobby Gindorf and Glen Hallum at forwards. Sid Wall and Mike Gooden, usual starters, are both injured and may not see action tonight.

Coach John Frankie will send his usual five Owls out to face the Raiders. Kendall Rhine, 6-9 all-America candidate, at center, Larry Phillips and Eli Spradling, both 6-5, at forwards and Barry Rodrigue and Herb Steinkamp at guards. Rhine has scored at a rate

of 23.2 over the season to lead both teams in scoring.

Over the years, Tech has held a series edge over the Owls at 10 wins and six losses. The Blue and Gray Rice team is in second place in SWC standings with a 4-2 record, while the Raiders share the third spot with a record of 3-3.

Tech fans were treated to an excellent show of basketball Saturday night as the Raiders outplayed a game Arkansas Razorback crew, 80-75.

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Brock Enters 'Rogers' Mile

Tech's outstanding miler, Jerry Brock of Fort Worth Arlington Heights, returns to his hometown tonight to compete in his specialty in the Will Rogers Indoor Games.

Brock won the freshman mile last year in the Southwest Conference. He ran on the boards last week at the Lubbock Indoor Meet and failed to place, however, his time of 4:32 was only a second and a half below the winner, John Baker of New Mexico.

Other Tech runners will be Ronny Biffle, 60 yard high hurdles;

Walt Cunningham, 60 yard dash; Eldon Mongold, 600 yard run; Gary Don Bowe, 1000 yard run; Noel Carter, 600 yard run and Norman Donelson, who will team with Cunningham Carter and Bowe in the mile relay.

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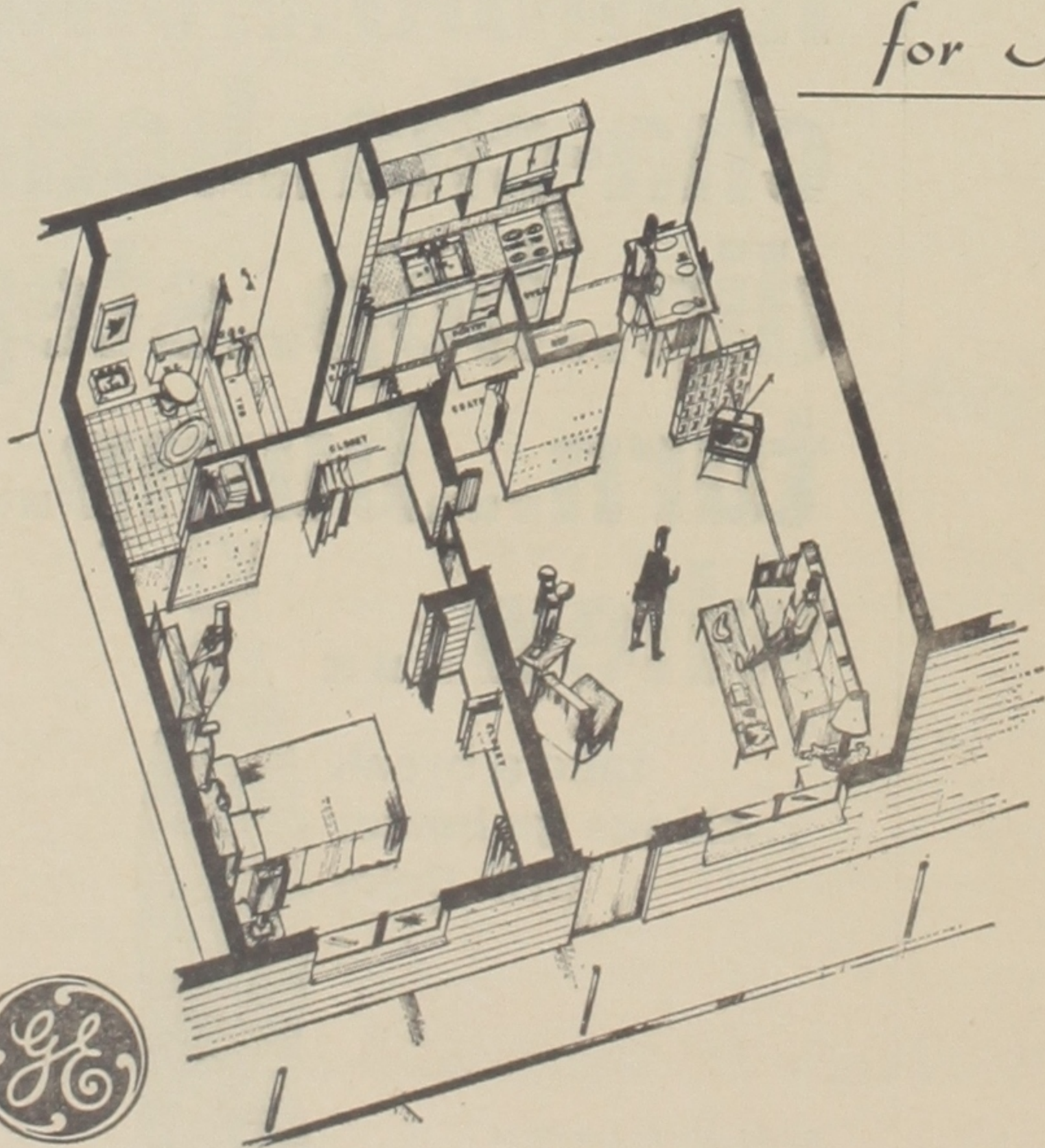
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
