Politicos Set Stage For Race

Texas politicians set the stage on Monday, the filing deadline, for light ballots in the May 2 party primaries.

Democrats in all statewide races combined totaled only slightly more than the 24 Democrats who battled for only four key offices in 1962.

14 GOPS FILE

Fourteen Republicans have filed for statewide races to provide only two contested GOP races-Governor and U.S. Senate.

GOV. JOHN Connally and Houston attorney Don Yarborough will have only the second two-man Democratic gubernatorial primary in 46 years.

Republicans are making a different type of party history with a new high of three candidates seeking a statewide race, the U.S. Senate seat.

Connally and U. S. Rep. Joe Kilgore added drama for Democrats on the final day of filing.

CONNALLY HESTITATED

Connally filed for re-election after saying he had considered dropping out of the race, and Kilgore dashed conservative Democrats' hopes by declining to oppose U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough.

REPUBLICANS, meanwhile, quietly accepted the filings of four more candidates for statewide offices.

GOP leaders hope to create more interest in their primary with a Presidential preferential primary. The proposal will be considered at a March 9 meeting.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr, Treasurer Jesse James, Comptroller Robert S. Calvert, Railroad Commissioner Ben Ramsey, Supreme Court Associate Justices Ruel Walker and Robert W. Hamilton and Court of Criminal Appeals Judge K. K. Woodley are unopposed in the Democratic primary. FACE GOP MEN

All but Ramsey, Woodley and Hamilton must face Republicans in the November general election.

Sen Yarborough will meet John Van Cronkhite, a former campaign organizer for former Gov. Allan Shivers, in a primary race which many conservative Democrats had hoped would include an experienced candidate such as Kilgore.

The winner will meet either George Bush, Houston oil man, Dr. Milton Davis, Dallas surgeon, or Robert Morris, former counsel of the Senate internal security subcommittee, all running for the GOP nomination to the Senate post.

The University of Texas Interfraternity Council announced Friday that Negroes would be admitted to the fraternity rush for the first time this spring, according to a United Press International release.

The actual selection of the members will be by the fraternities and none will be required to accept Negroes.

Tommy Drew Cauthorn, interfraternity council president said,

The only limitations for individuals participating in fraternity rush are the scholastic requirements and the probationary standings imposed by the university."

According to Cauthorn, no Negro has filed for rush so far. The only Negro fraternity on campus, Alpha Phi Alpha, is not a member of the interfraternity council.

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
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
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

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Foster Ties 60-Yard Record

Billy Foster, speedster from Southern Methodist, tied the existing world record in the 60-yard dash with a 6.0 flat time in the Monday.

In the same meet, Olympian Ralph Boston from Tennesssee won both the 60-yard high hurdles and the broad jump event to take high point honors. Boston's distance in the jumping event set a new Lubbock mark. His 25-7 effort eclipsed the old record set in 1962 by 14 inches.

Another sensation of the meet was the freshman shotputting master from Texas A&M, Randy Matson. Matson set a new Texas indoor track record with a toss of 60-34. All three top finishers in the event went past the old Lubbock mark of 56-2 set last year.

The university two mile relay proved to be the most exciting race of the night, with a strong Oklahoma team edging past a group from the University of Texas and barely nipping them at the wire. All three first places in the event again broke the old Lubbock record of 7:56.9. Oklahoma's time in the event was 7:53.4, with Texas a bare tenth of a point behind and third place Baylor finishing in 7:56.8.

In the races for the women, Janice Rinehart of the Texas Track Club defeated the defending champion in the event, Sue Schexnayder, in record-tying time. Miss Rinehart flashed over the 60-yard distance in 7.1 seconds with Miss Schexnayder close behind with a 7.3 time.

For the Tech tracksters entered in the meet, it was a disappointing night.



Hurdler Ronnie Biffle garnered a third-place medal for his 7.3 time in the 60-yard obstacle race, Noel Carter finished a disappointing third in the 500-yard dash after event in the third annual Lubbock leading most of the way, and Wal-Invitational Track and Field Meet ter Cunningham managed a fourth place effort in the record-pacing 60-yard dash.

Turner hit 18 points for the Frogs in the loss to SMU, and McKinley hit 14 in the same game. Coach Gene Gibson will go with

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
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

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
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
