# New Type Tramps Set All Red Day

The new concept of a "semideferred" rush system headlined discussion at Wednesday's meeting of the Interfraternity Council.

IFC President Gary Lawrence introduced the measure as a possible substitute for Tech's current pre-rush procedures.

### PLEDGE IN NOVEMBER

If the new plan is approved by Tech's 11-member fraternity system, rush will start at the opening of the fall semester, and rushees will be pledged sometime, in November.

UNDER THE plan, a pledge's fall semester grades will not be included in his initiation requirements, and his spring semester grades will determine his standing. Therefore, a person pledging in the fall will be under control of his chosen fraternity for approximately one year, or at least one full semester.

According to Lawrence, "... this method will allow the fraternities to look over prospective members and see if they will work out. Also, it gives the student time to adapt to college work and learn how to get his work done," Lawrence added.

### ADOPTED BY COUNCIL

The motion was adopted by the IFC for the purpose of presenting the idea to the individual fraternity chapters for discussion and evaluation. More work will be done on this particular rush idea at upcoming IFC meetings.

OTHER RUSH news discussed at the meeting included the matter of semester grade slips for prospective pledges.

For the first time this year, those interested in going through rush must pick up their grade slips in the registrars office and turn them in to the fraternity advisor's office before 5 p.m. Friday.

Spring rush officially begins at 1 a.m. Saturday and will run through Saturday, Feb. 29.

The Texas Tech Journalism Department is currently sponsoring a campus news program Monday through Friday on Lubbock radio station KLBK (1340).

The five-minute broadcasts, which began Monday, are presented at 6 p.m. and feature only campus news. News reports are prepared in the newsroom of the Daily Toreador.

# Noted Author Donates Book To Collection

Col. Wilfred McCormick, nationally known author from Albuquerque, N.M., has made a significant contribution to the Southwest Collection. He has donated materials depicting the evolution of his book "The Five Man Break." The book is a Rocky McCune basketball story.

The materials include: original rough draft, finished copy as sent to the publisher, original galley proofs, original page proofs, copy of the hard-cover book, and a copy of the paper-back book.

Col. McCormick is a former professional baseball player, and has been a full-time author since 1929. He has written more than 500 short stories and has had about 20 books published.

He served as Lt. Colonel in the U.S. Army during World War II. A former president of the Albuquerque Rotary Club, the colonel has made over 1,000 lectures.

Mr. Sylvan Dunn, director of the Southwest Collection said, "We are proud to have these materials from one of the top Southwestern writers."

Both off-campus and at-large ballots will be in all the above designated voting locals. Dorm ballots will be in the respective residence halls from 11:30 a.m. to 12:45 p.m. and 5:30 to 6:30 p.m.

Only off-campus freshmen may vote for off-campus representatives, but all freshman may vote in their respective schools for corresponding Student Council vacancies.







Losses have been to Colorado State University, University of Kansas, Oklahoma, Southern Methodist, Eastern New Mexico, New Mexico and Texas:




