Homestead exemptions would remain on their present basis if the proposed college building amendament becomes law, Attorney General Price Daniel ruled last, week, The request for a ruling was made by John M. Steele, Lubbock county attorney.

Of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads, \$3,000 is exempt by constitutional provision from all taxation for state purposes. Daniel's ruling said that no conflict exists between the provisions of the Constitution which relate to homestead exemption.
