After three evenings of rehearsals in the Lubbock Municipal Auditorium, the climatic moment will flower tonight in a single performance of the popular masterpiece at 7:30 p.m.

The performance is offered free of charge to the campus community, and to city and area patrons. No tickets are required. A synopsis of the story of the opera is available to interested individuals or groups at the Tech music department office. The performance will be in English.

A 42 -piece orchestra, drawn from the ranks of the Tech Symphony, will perform the score in its or iginal form, in contrast to reduced instrumentations often used by touring companies carrying from 15 to 20 players. Tech's two-manual, five-pedal harpsichord will be utilized for recitative accompaniment, as was done in Mozart's time

The student cast will be headed by Harlan Reddell and Beverly Brandon as the Count and Countess of Almaviva, and Paul Benningfield and Lynda Sudduth as Figaro and Sussanna. Barbara Raney will sing the mezzo-soprano role of the page boy, Cherubino.

Carolyn Pendleton, Leasel Richardson, Bettye Lowder, and Dwayne Hood complete the student cast. Faculty members Kent Hill and John Gilbert will be heard as the judge, Don Gurzio, and Dr. Bartolo. A 20 -voice chorus, including soloists Janyne Maddox and Dolores McKee, and three dancers, Linda Eberly, Margaret Cribbs, and Carolyn Tubbs, will also participate. Choreography is by Suzanne Aker, direc tor of the Tech Modern Dancers.
