





## Men-In-Red Set For Oklahoma Ag Game

### Raiders Journey To Stillwater Today

**All-American Fenimore Will Spark Farmers**

Texas Tech's Red Raiders, rough and ready, are journeying north this week-end to meet the Cowboys of Oklahoma A&M, on their home grounds at Stillwater.

The Cowboys, probably the toughest Tech has faced this year, will be sparked by All-American Bob Fenimore. Behind Fenimore will be such line-busters as Cecil Hankins and Jim Reynolds, while the forward wall includes Glenn Moore, Bert Cole, and Jake Colhouer. The Ags, with 16 straight victories over college opponents, and a win over Tulsa last week to clinch the Missouri Valley title, smell a bowl game in the offing, and are going to be out for blood tomorrow.

Oklahoma A&M is one of the six unbeaten or untied teams in this year's college lineup, and their team this year is the highest scoring eleven in A&M's 45 years of college competition.

However, on the other side of the ledger, Texas Tech has a team that has never been known to say die. Dell Morgan's boys have long been famous for surprising strong and unwary foes. The Raiders had a taste of blood last week, and rumor has it that they liked it.

The coming fracas will mark the fourth bowl game that Tech has played this year. Tech opened the season with a 7-0 victory over the last Sun Bowl victor, Southwestern. They then dropped an 18-7 game to the Orange Bowl champs, Tulsa. Next came a 12-0 win over TCU, who bowed before the mighty Oklahoma A&M in the Cotton Bowl last year. Two down, one up, and one to go.

Coach Dell Morgan is confident that if his boys play as they did against TCU, they will stop Bob Fenimore far better than many of the others have done. Tech's potential All-American, Walter Schlinkman, still has a bad shoulder, but is expected to turn in his usual bang-up ballgame. Only minor other injuries were apparent after the TCU encounter. Otis Turner is in excellent shape, as are R. W. Moyers, Floyd Lawhorn, Doug McSwane, and Russ Birdwell, who are all ready to go to work on the Cowboys.

Morgan has been drilling his charges on the Cowboy plays this week and ended with a light workout yesterday. The Raiders have worked on a passing attack as well. It was stated that the Hardey to Kelley combination is really clicking.

The boys were in high hopes when they entrained by bus for Stillwater this A. M.

### Raiders Lead In Oklahoma A&M Grid Contests

Past football history has seen the Raiders and Aggies meet eight times with the Aggies holding the lower hand. The Raiders first met the Aggies in 1935 and took honors with a score of 14 to 0. They again met in '36 and '37 winning both games with scores of 12 to 0 and 14 to 6. In 1940, three years later, the two teams met once again and received a tie of 6 to 6. The Raider team at this time was under the mighty coaching of Pete Cawthon.

In 1941 the "Men-in-Red" came under the tutelage of Coach Dell Morgan, the greatest line coach in the Southwest. Morgan arranged for the Raiders to return against the Aggies that same year. The two teams met in Taft Stadium and the Raiders again defeated the Aggies 15 to 6.

In 1942 the Aggies turned the tide for the first time in history with a score of 9 to 6. The Raiders quite upset over the defeat left for Oklahoma the following year, 1943, and again defeated the Aggies 21 to 13. The Aggies came to Lubbock in '44 and defeated the Raiders 14 to 7. The total scores by both teams to date are: Raiders, 88 and Aggies, 62. The "Men in Red" have won five, tied one, and lost two.

Texas Tech's Red Raiders rose to their greatest heights last Saturday when they defeated the Horned Frogs of TCU. Dell Morgan's Men-in-Red threw up a defense that proved the downfall of the mighty Christians. The entire Raider team played inspired ball, yet most of the credit goes to the coaching staff for their brilliant defense and will-to-win they put into the Raiders.

Walter Schlinkman, backbone of the Red Raiders, played his last game on Tech's Field against TCU last week. Walter turned in a performance that will long be remembered. In fact, as long as there are Red Raiders from Tech, Walter will be remembered, for his spirit will be with them. Turning down many wonderful offers from pro clubs, Schlinkman chose to remain at Tech for one more year and shoulder the burden of the Red Raiders. It was Walter who scored the first and last touchdowns made by a college team on Tech's field, a fitting honor for a great man. Schlinkman should be rated All-American this year by the sports scribes. Walter, however, isn't playing on an undefeated football team, and most sports writers consider the team record before looking at individual performance. But to those of us who have had the pleasure of knowing the likeable man from Dumas, he has always been All-American.
