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McMurry Indians Here To Open Home Basketball Season Monday

Raider Quintet Play In Double-T Gym Monday Night

Texas Tech sports fans will get their first glance at the 1946 Raider basketball team Monday night as Coach Earl Huffman's squad meets McMurry college in the local gym.

The Raiders return from two games with Oklahoma teams this week (see story, page 1) and will tee off against their opening Border conference foe when they meet Arizona State at Tempe, Ariz., Dec. 14.

The 1946-47 schedule calls for 16 games with Border loop teams. Eight will be played on the home courts and eight out-of-town games.

Highlight of the opening portion of the season will be the Houston Post Invitational tournament to be held at Houston Dec. 20 and 21. Coach Huffman states that several Southwest conference teams will attend as well as other sectional teams from other parts of the Southwest.

Arrangements are pending for several games to be played during the schedule lapse from Dec. 16 to Jan. 9 with teams and dates announced later.

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Cowboys Upset Raiders 21-6

Those undefeated, untied Hardin-Simmons Cowboys STILL are undefeated and untied.

In their regular, closing game of the season, they required two quarters of play to rope, hog-tie and brand the Red Raiders before a stadium packed with Abilene and Lubbock fans in the Fair Park Stadium, Abilene.

While the Red Raiders were all set for the ground tactics of the nation's leading ground gainer, Little Doc Mobley, they were un-

able to cope with the Johnson to Cook passing combination that connected for two of the Cowboy scores in the first half of the ball game.

Taking the Raider kickoff on his own goal line Little Doc scampered to the Cowboy 30. Bullet Cook moved the ball upfield 15 yards through the left side of the Raider line. On the next play Alvin Johnson hit Cook with an aerial for 30 yards to place the Cowboys in scoring position. Mobley was held to ten yards in four tries when Johnson again connected with his running mate in the end zone for the opening score without losing the ball.

Still in the opening minutes of play, Robnett fumbled on the Tech 40 yard line where the Cowboys recovered. Tuffy Nabors, who played a great game for the Lubbock aggregation, intercepted a Johnson pass two plays later on the Tech 14. Robnett fumbled again and the Cowboys took three plays to push their second score across from the 23.

As the second quarter grew into its closing minutes, Johnson again found Cook with a 25 yard pass and the latter was tackled by Roger Smith as he fell across the goal line. Tony Poulos kicked all three of the extra points for the Cowboys.

The Red Raiders returned to action in the second half to battle the Cowboys on even terms as their ground attack opened up and the forward wall held the Baptists down to kicking operations.

The lone Raider tally came in the third stanza as Roger Smith returned one of Johnson's kicks 40 yards to the H-SU 30. Robnett, Hawkins and Smith alternately moved the ball to the Cowboy five yard marker where Smith skirted right end to score. His attempt to convert was wide to the left.

Three times the Raiders drove into scoring position in the fourth quarter but failed to push the necessary yardage for scores.

FINAL FOOTBALL CURTAIN FALLS AS

Eight Raiders Complete Grid Careers At Texas Tech

The final curtain fell on the collegiate football careers of eight Texas Tech players last Saturday at Abilene. Perhaps no other group of departing Tech players have taken with them so many years of football experience. Those completing eligibility are James Reed and Roger Smith, Co-captains; Russell Birdwell, Warren Cudd, Ed Robnett, Maxey McKnight and Vernon Ray. Roy Williams has one year of eligibility left but has indicated he will not return next season. Included in the group are two guards, one tackle, two ends and three backs. All are veterans of World War II with the exception of Robnett.

The guards, James Reed and Russell Birdwell played football while in the service. Reed with N.T.A.C. in 1943 and Birdwell with Great Lakes in 1944. Reed lettered at Tech in 1942 and was in the army from 1943 to 1946. He spent 13 months in the Pacific and was discharged.

The Raider passing attack failed to make any of the needed yardage.

Tech fumbled the ball seven times, losing it to their opponent twice. Outstanding feature of the game was lack of penalties assessed both teams. Both Hardin-Simmons and Tech lost 15 yards each on offside penalties.

A glance at the game's statistics show that the Raider ground attack nosed out that of the Cowboys by 19 yards. Roger Smith and Leece Jackson both gained more ground yardage than the famed Mobley. The little H-SU back picked up 44 yards while Smith romped 68 yards and Jackson 52.

as a 1st Lieutenant Birdwell lettered at guard for Tech in 1945, having previously lettered at full back in 1941 and 1942 with Marion Institute of Alabama. He was Louisiana state boxing champion in high school. He served in the Navy from 1942 to 1944.

Both Vernon Ray and Roy Williams lettered at end in 1942 at Tech. Ray entered the Army Dec. 1942 and was discharged in Jan. 1946, spending two years in the Pacific. He played baseball and basketball but no football in the Army. Roy "Red" Williams lettered in basketball in 1942-43 before joining the Navy in 1943. He played football with Pittsburg, Kansas, spent two years in the Pacific and China. He was discharged June 1946, a Lieutenant, JG.

Warren Cudd played tackle for Tech in 1940 and 1941, lettering the last year. He entered the Army in June 1942, spent 23 months in Europe, has the Bronze star and five battle stars.

Three veteran backfield stars, Maxey McKnight, Ed Robnett, and Roger Smith have amassed a total of nine football letters previous to this season. Robnett lettered at guard in 1938 and 1939 at Texas A. & M. and at halfback at Tech in 1945. McKnight lettered at Tech in 1940-41-42, served in the Marines from Aug. 1942 to Nov. 1945, sixteen months of which were in the Pacific. Roger Smith lettered at Tech in 1938, 1940 and 1941. He entered the Army in June 1942, played service football with Lubbock Army Air Field in 1942 and 1943, Randolph Field in 1944 and Nashville A.T.C. in 1945. He was picked on the service All-American team in 1943.
