Some Tech students believe bumpy roads and tilting sidewalks on campus are due to the negligence of maintenance crews; this may not be

Heavy rains, heavy traffic and lack of funds account for the deterioration of Tech streets and roads, said Dr. James Kitchen, director of grounds main-

"There is a need for minor and major repairs on the campus," Kitchen said, "but all we are really equipped or budgeted for are minor repairs."

When traffic runs on the streets during or after a hard rain, water penetrates the asphalt and destroys it, Kitchen said.

Tech streets were not designed originally to withstand heavy buses. Therefore, the bus routes have done the most damage.

Buses running close to the sidewalks compress the asphalt and push it under the curb; then the curbs and sidewalks tilt up. This can be observed by the street running past the Agriculture Building. Heavy trucks carrying construction materials for the construction on campus

IN PREVIOUS YEARS the winner of the contest was named Miss Mademoiselle, but when the yearbook, La Ventana, changed their women's magazine section from Mademoiselle to Vogue, Sigma Delta Chi officers decided to change the name of the contest.

Calling the winner Miss Texas Tech will accord a more campus-wide connotation to the pageant, Boyett said.

Ten to 15 preliminary jugdes will choose 25 girls to go before final judges at 8:30 p.m. Nov. 6.

Miss Playmate will be announced on the night of the pageant. She will be chosen from photographs on the basis of photogenic appeal in a swimsuit by a staff of professional photographers.

Miss Texas Tech and the next five runners-up will be pictured in La Ventana, according to Tom Scott, co-editor. The reigning Miss New Mexico, Janis Jones, will perform the soft shoe dance she did at the Miss America pageant earlier this month.

Dr. Granberry is mayor of Lubbock and has judged the Miss Lubbock pageant.

Lisman has been a judge at the Miss New Mexico pageant three times.

Mrs. Tankersley is a modeling instructor at the Robert Spence School and is a local television personality. Anderson is president of the Tech

Student Association. The girls will be judged in three competitions: swimsuit, evening gown, and personality, said Larry Gallagher, SDX president.

Senior girls are ineligible for the contest, because the reign of Miss Texas Tech will extend over into next year, Gallagher said.

Symposium makes report

The symposium, which was held last January, was the third such event to be held here. The theme of it was "From Surrealism to the Absurd."

The symposium was dedicated to Samuel Beckett, winner of the 1969 Nobel Prize for literature. Beckett was invited to the symposium, but declined to attend. Two of Beckett's letters are reproduced in facsimile at the beginning of the report along with his portrait.

The 200 page report contains six lectures presented at the symposium and

Egypt grieves Nasser whether it contributes to more tension

CAIRO (AP) — Egyptians poured out their grief for Gamal Abdel Nasser on Tuesday as world capitals wondered what his passing may portend for peace in the Middle East.

Many feared that the Egyptian president's death may mean a new setback for the already stalled peace talks between Israel and its Arab neigh-

President Nixon, however, said it was too early to know how Nasser's death may affect the troubled Mideast. He told newsmenaccompanying him to the U.S. 6th Fleet in the Mediterranean:

"It will contribute a new situation, but

whom his successor will be or whether it might be some kind of collective leadership." Some diplomats at the United Nations said Nasser's death might spell the end of the U.S. initiative that laid the groundwork for the talks with a 90-day ceasefire between Israel on one side and Egypt

Although Tech has liberalized its womens' dorm hours to something resembling the twentieth century, there still is the argument, pro and con, as to whether there should be any hours at all for even freshmen.

I have heard the point stated very often that the freshmen women need to get used to the rigors of college life before they are permitted to roam the wild and untamed world outside anytime after hours.

This argument in itself is ridiculous. In most cases it is an upperclass woman that is spouting this sort of garbage in the first place. 




