'Romeo, Juliet' To Open

Shakespeare's famous story of star-crossed lovers, "Romeo and Juliet," will bring up the curtain Friday for the first time in Tech's new University Theater.

Marking the 400th anniversary of the birth of William Shakespeare, the play will begin at 8:15

p.m. Students must make reservations for the performances, even though there is no admission charge. They will be admitted by showing I. D.'s.

EXHIBIT FEATURED

Tech's library is having an exhibit this week of loaned Shakespeare prints in connection with the production.

"**ROMEO AND JULIET**," the 75th major production by the speech department, will be directed by Ronald Shultz.

The play runs each night through Wednesday, April 22, except Sunday.

Elyse Soape and Charles Benton will play the leading roles.

The play is costumed by Edgar Webb, who designed the costumes as his project for his master's thesis.

TIME IMPOSED LIMIT

The head of the costume crew, Paula Creitz, commented, "Our biggest problem was trying to make such elegant costumes for a cast of 46 in three months. Everyone on the very small costume crew worked on them only in their free time. There were no members of the crew who weren't students."

SHULTZ commented on the University Theater, "The building is a joy. It's a great privilege to have so fine a building to work in."

The setting for the play is a modified Elizabethan playhouse. Dr. Clifford Ashby, technical director of the play, said that Mosher Steel in Lubbock made structural steel especially for the set and loaned it to Tech. Ashby said that he had to call in a civil engineer to plan the steel structure for the set.

Hearty campaigning came to an end Wednesday as Techsans elected the three girl cheerleaders in a runoff election from a field of six candidates.

A runoff was called after a close race Friday in a field of eight candidates.

Re-elected for the 1964-65 school year were Camella Moore, Midland junior who polled 1,704 votes and Kathy Osthoff, Dallas junior who received 1,540 votes. Betty Newby, a junior from Borger, won the other cheerleader position with 1,572 votes.

Other candidates in the race were Anita Edmiston, Weatherford junior who received 1,501 votes, Sondra Stargel, a sophomore from Memphis who polled 1,472 votes and Karen Schroeder, an Albuquerque, N.M., sophomore who had 1,095 votes.

Techsans cast a total of 3,810 ballots in IBM voting.

AN ARTICLE IN "La Revue Moderne," of Paris, France said: "The name of Amy Freeman Lee is known throughout the United

states not only in printing but also in literature. Through many exhibitions and intellectual activities in the U. S. and in France she has conquered a place of first rank."

Prizes she has won include Elizabeth Arden Purchase Prize, 31st annual Local Artists' Exhibition in 1961; Purchase Prize, Burch-Wademan Gallery Opening Juried Exhibition, 1963; and Purchase Prize, 1st Juried Exhibition, Hertzberg Gallery, 1963.

SHE WAS ELECTED "The Artist of the Year" by citizens of San Antonio in the annual "Ten Outstanding Women of the Year Poll" sponsored by the San Antonio Express-News in 1958. She received the Headliner Award for outstanding achievements in fine arts from Theta Sigma Phi, national journalism fraternity, 1958.

Mrs. Lee was chosen for inclusion in the "Dictionary of International Biography" because of her "record of contemporary achievement" in 1962. She was designated an "Old Master" by Purdue University, Lafayette, Indiana in 1963. In 1963, she was also chosen by the University of Kentucky, Lexington, Kentucky, to be included in the University Library's permanent collection of poetry manuscripts and in the university's exhibition of "Manuscripts by Outstanding Modern Poets."

-Tech Morals- 'I Dare You' May Lead To Off Campus Thefts

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article is the fourth in a ten-part series on Tech mores and morals.)

"I dare you to."

That may be the common expression which leads to a number of minor thefts off campus involving Tech students.

Lubbock police officials report most of the thefts committed by Tech students in Lubbock businesses are cases of shoplifting of small items.

"Most of the shoplifting has taken place in the large department stores in downtown Lubbock and in the shopping centers," Lt. Claude Keaton of the police department, has said.

CHRISTMAS 'PEAK' PERIOD

The "peak" period for case of thefts is during the Christmas season when upwards to two dozen students might find themselves in trouble with the law.

This past Christmas six students were picked up by the Lubbock police for stealing Christmas trees and eight others were charged with shoplifting.

When the students who are caught have been asked why they stole, they are reported to reply:

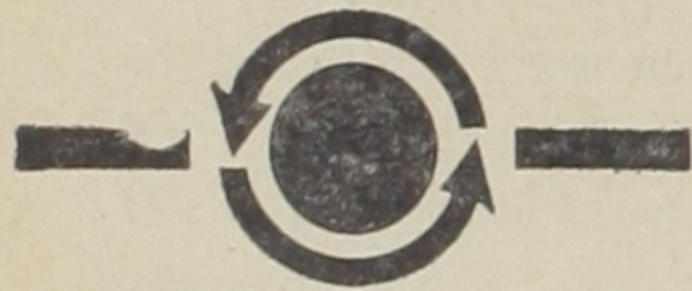
"I wanted to get gifts for Christmas, but I didn't feel that I had the money to spend." Or they will say, "I don't know. I didn't really need it . . . I just thought it would be fun, I guess."

ORDINARY OFFENDERS

Students who are involved in thefts off campus are treated as ordinary offenders. They are charged, arrested and sometimes placed in jail if the theft is a serious, major crime.

However, Lubbock police officials report all thefts involving Tech students to the college administration—the Dean of Men or Women's office.

These reports are kept secret, but the college officials go over them to determine if the student's offense warrants disciplinary action. Normally students who are involved in theft cases and are found guilty are subject to expulsion from school.



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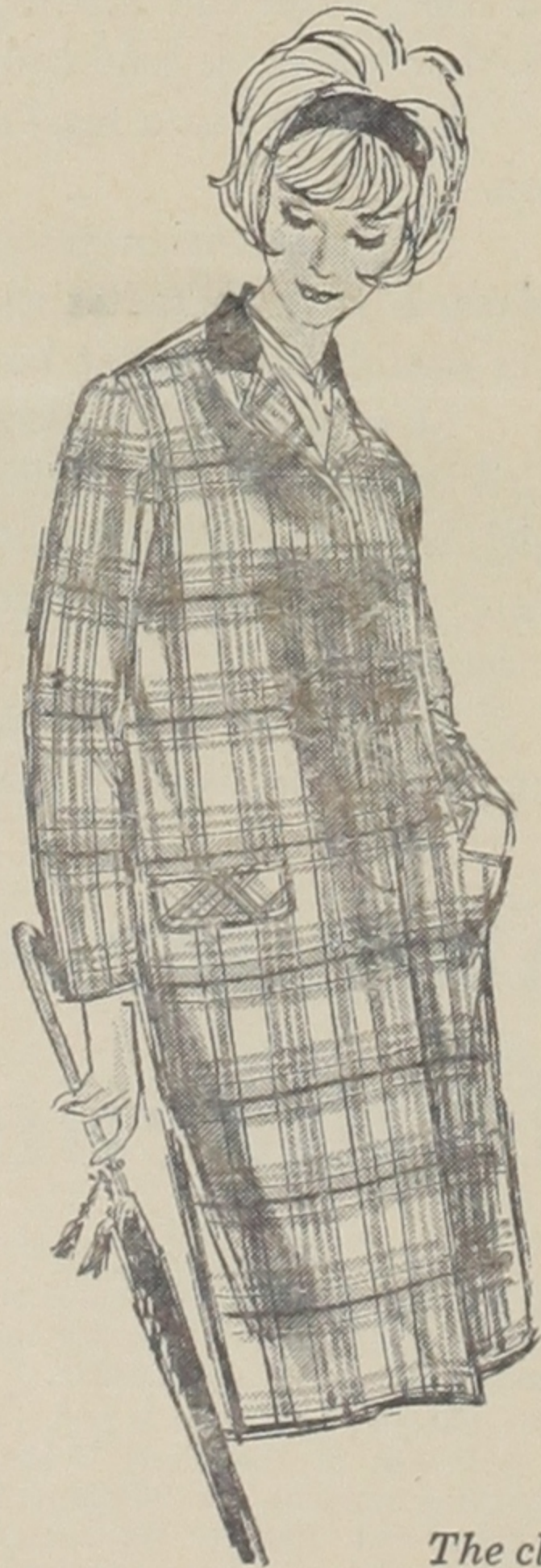
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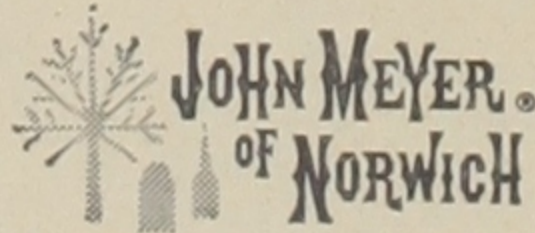
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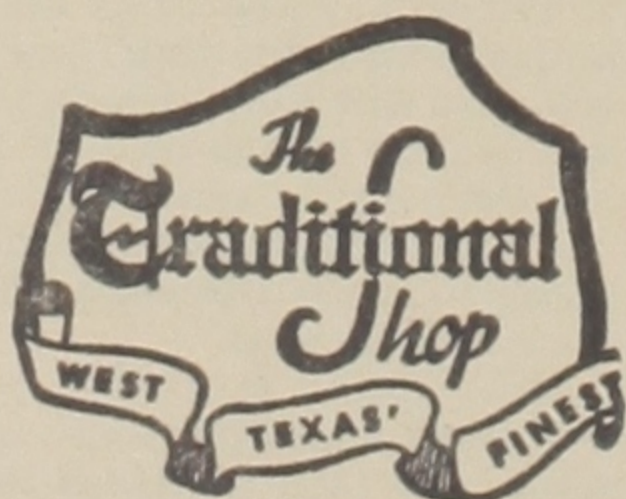


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Air Force Plans Ball

Bingo Nite Set By Tech Union

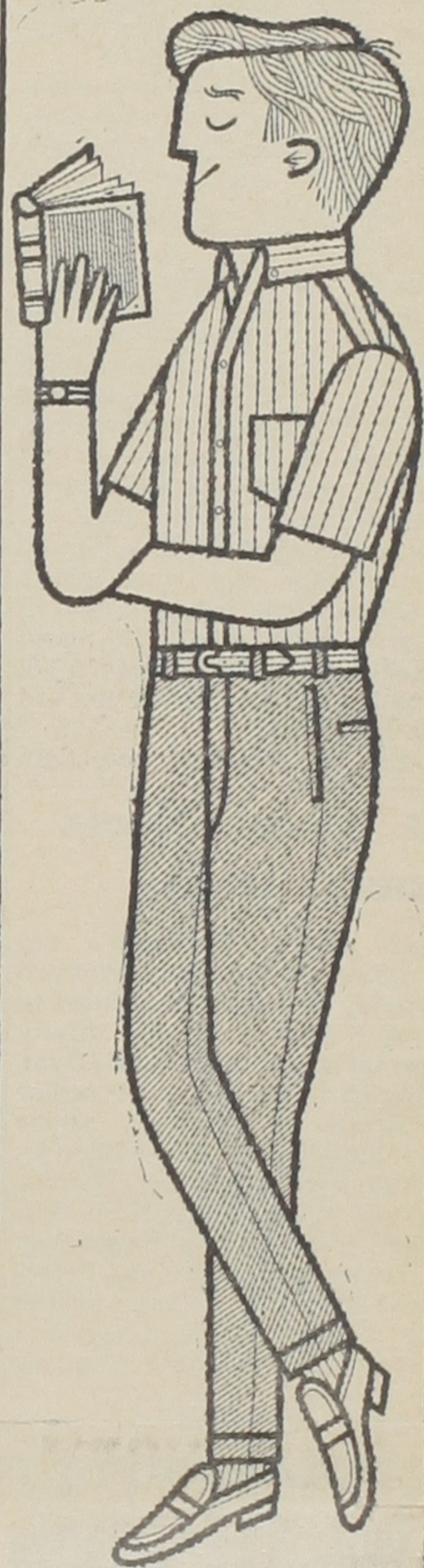
Bingo Nite is scheduled Saturday at 7 p.m. in the Tech Union Ballroom. The sponsor is the Tech Union Program Council.

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Golfers Battle A & M Friday; Seek To Stay In S W C Lead

Tech's Red Raider golf team takes on defending Southwest Conference Texas A&M Friday, holding on to a narrow first place perch over A&M and Texas.

Only one point separates pace-setting Tech from third place Texas. After three matches, the Raiders are 13-5, a half-point ahead of Texas A&M's 12½-5½, and a point better than Texas' 12-6.

Tech can stay in front with anything better than a 3-3 split with A&M. Such a deadlock would boost Texas into a share of the lead with Tech, since the Raiders would then be 16-8, with the same .667 percentage figure as the Longhorns. It would give A&M a 15½-8½ record, still a half-point off the pace.

The Aggies need a 4-2 victory or better to take over first place. Such an outcome would result in the Aggies having a 16½-7½ mark, a shade better than Texas 12-6, and would send the Raiders to third with a 15-9 mark.

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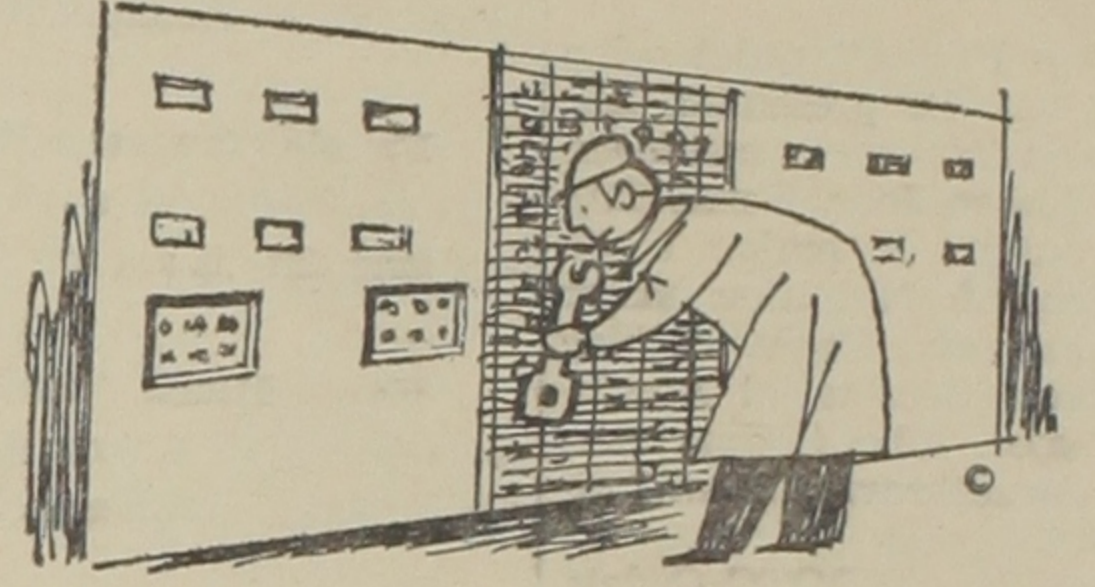
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Posey, Independents Win
