## SEATTLE, Wash. (IP) -Washington college students are a mobil

 group. According to statistics released by Dr. Frederic T. Giles, co-ordinator of college relations at Washington University, over 4,000 ordinator of college relations at Washington University, over 4,000
students transferred to colleges out of the state.
"We used to think of college as a non-stop train," he commented.
A student got on as a freshman and got off as a graduate. Now we
find we have to think in terms of a "local' train, with side trips and find we have to think in
stop-overs along the way.

Approximately 40 per cent of all undergraduates enrolled at the University are transfer students and about half of the students who In. 1963, more than 1,750 undergraduates transferred to
In. 1963, more than 1,750 undergraduates transferred to the University from other colleges, as compared with about 1,000 five years ago. Most of these students transferred from other colleges within
the state. the state.
The
The University received 27 per cent of all students who moved
from one school to another within the state. This is a substantial increase over the 21 per cent in 1962.
An important factor contributing to the increase in transfer stu-
dents is the growing number of two-year colleges in the state community colleges contributed approximately 630 students to the community colleges contributed approximately 630 students to the
University in 1963, an increase of nearly 80 per cent since 1958. This

equires special planning, Dr. Giles said.
"We must provide a more flexible curriculum that will meet the needs of students entering the University directly from high school, as
well as the variety and quality of offerings required by transfer stuwell as the variety and quality of offerings required by transfer stu-
dents," he explained. "Because many transfer students have completed much of their basic course work, they have more specialized academic needs. The cost of this education is greater than for entering freshmen. volves the application of credits for previous work. This need not be a problem, however, if the student takes advantage of the Cooperative
Transfer Program which has been instituted with community colleges of the state to assist students in choosing courses that qualify for
transfer credit. A special faculty committee at the University also conducts a con-
tinuing study of the needs of these students.

## Honors Council Checks Work

Once a student has entered the Honors Program, his academic The is periodically checked and reviewed by the Honors Council, whether or not the student should continue studies in the program.

The Honors Council looks beyond the achieved grade point aver age. They also search for persistent evidence of high intellectual curiosity and perceptiveness.

Graduation under the program hinges upon the completion of the normal course load for the degree, plus the inclusion of a certain number of honors classes, plus the gaining of the required grade point
Successful completion of the program means graduation with

In the School of Arts and Sciences, the specific requirements which must be met by the student require perseverance and dilligent application of even the superior honors student
petitively, and requires a 3.5 average in the soph. This is done com petitively, and requires a 3.5 average in the sophomore year any time such a section is offered for a course he elects.

## Enters As Freshman

If he enters the program as a freshman, the student must take a least 40 hours of honors courses for graduation. If he enteis as a sophomore, he must take at least 30 hours of such courses.
