

LBJ Texas Tour 'May' Include City

President Lyndon Johnson's scheduled stop in Lubbock Tuesday is still on the campaign agenda according to the local Democratic Headquarters Friday evening.

"As far as we know, Johnson still plans a stop in Lubbock," said Bobby Brown, executive director of the 19th Congressional District,

"but these plans are still tentative." **Still Working**

It will be easier to cancel preparations for the President's stop-over rather than start making plans at the last minute, Brown added. Local Democrats are still considering the Lubbock trip "on" and will do so until notified otherwise.

Earlier, the Texas Johnson-Humphrey Headquarters told the Associated Press that President Johnson's sudden cancellation of appearances Sunday in Laredo and Corpus Christi does not alter his other Texas campaign plans for Sunday and Monday.

Schedule Remains

William Hunter McLean, state director of the President's campaign, issued a statement that Johnson's schedule still calls for trips Monday to San Antonio, Fort Worth, Houston and Dallas.

Also, McLean said, there is no change in plans for the statewide fund-raising dinner honoring the President in Dallas Monday night.

The campaign chairman said the Sunday barbeque at the LBJ Ranch for Texas campaign leaders is still scheduled. A source at the headquarters said the barbeque, originally set for noon, probably will be re-scheduled for mid or late afternoon.

Regret Cancellation

"We regret that the President was forced to cancel his trip to the two South Texas cities Sunday," McLean said. "But I am sure that the people of Corpus Christi and Laredo will understand that the sudden international developments made it imperative that our President remain in Washington."

The meeting is open to all groups intending to have an entry in the parade.

The runoff for the queen will be Nov. 13, and all Tech students will participate in the vote.

More Organizations Join Name-Change Bandwagon

Nine more campus organizations have jumped on the bandwagon to support the Joint Name-Change Committee's battle against the proposed name of Texas Tech University.

According to Dr. Kline Nall, English professor and vice chairman of the committee, the organizations adding their names to the list of endorsees include the Faculty Advisory Committee; Mortar Board, senior women's honorary service organization; Sachems, men's faculty organization; the American Assn. of University Professors; Kappa Kappa Gamma so-

cial sorority, Sigma Delta Chi men's professional journalistic society; Sigma Chi social fraternity; and the Faculty Wives' Club.

Others Considering

Several other clubs are in the process of considering backing the committee's stand, Nall said.

Further plans for a name-change campaign will be discussed at a meeting of the Joint Name-Change Committee at 12:05 p.m. Tuesday and each first and third Tuesday through Dec. 1, at the Episcopal Student Center, Seaman Hall, 2407 16th St.

The joint committee claims the

support of citizens from all interested groups who have organized for joint action. It includes ex-students, parents, area educators, community leaders, faculty and students.

Bean Heads Committee

Russell Bean, Lubbock farmer and investor, a 1933 graduate of Tech and a Tech parent, heads the committee.

The stated purpose of the committee is to "... inform Tech's Board of Directors and Tech supporters of the true position of ex-students and other groups in opposition to the proposed misnomer 'Texas Tech University' and to persuade the Board to submit to the next legislature in lieu of that proposal an appropriate university name which interested groups generally agree will best advance the university."

Convocation Set Thursday

Gen. Bernard A. Schrieber, commander of the Air Force Systems Command, will speak to an all-school convocation here Thursday at 11 a.m., according to Ronnie Botkin, Student Council president.

Gen. Schrieber, born in Germany and reared in Texas, received a bachelor of science degree from Texas A&M in 1931 and accepted a reserve appointment with the field artillery.

He received his master of science degree from Stanford University in 1942 and graduated from the National War College in 1950.

He assumed his present command in 1961. He is in charge of contracts with more than 5,000 civilian contractors.

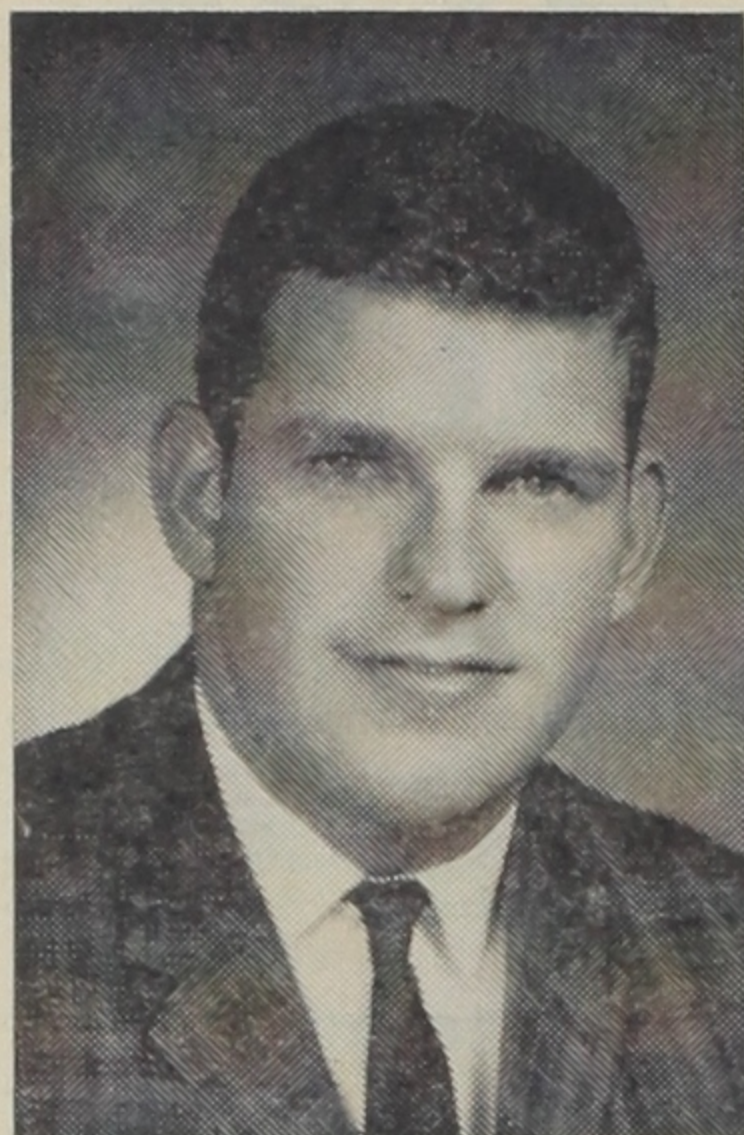
Ag Council Picks 'Ag Of Month'

He will receive his degree in June and will do graduate work at Tech in range management.



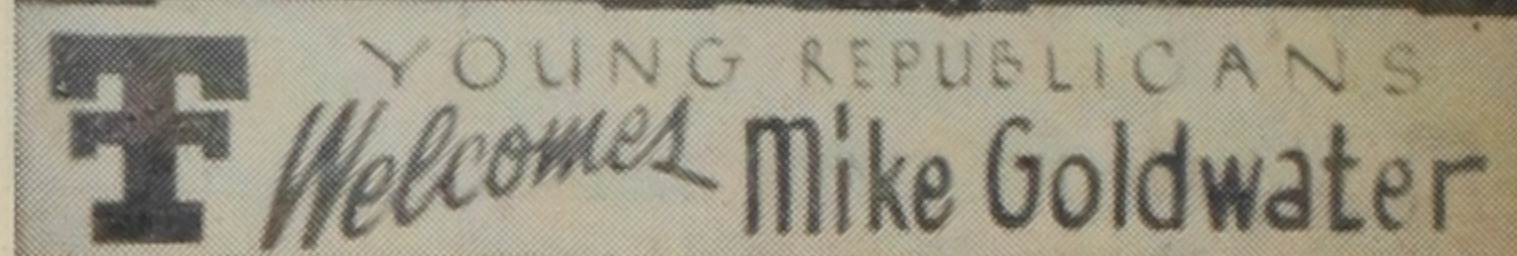
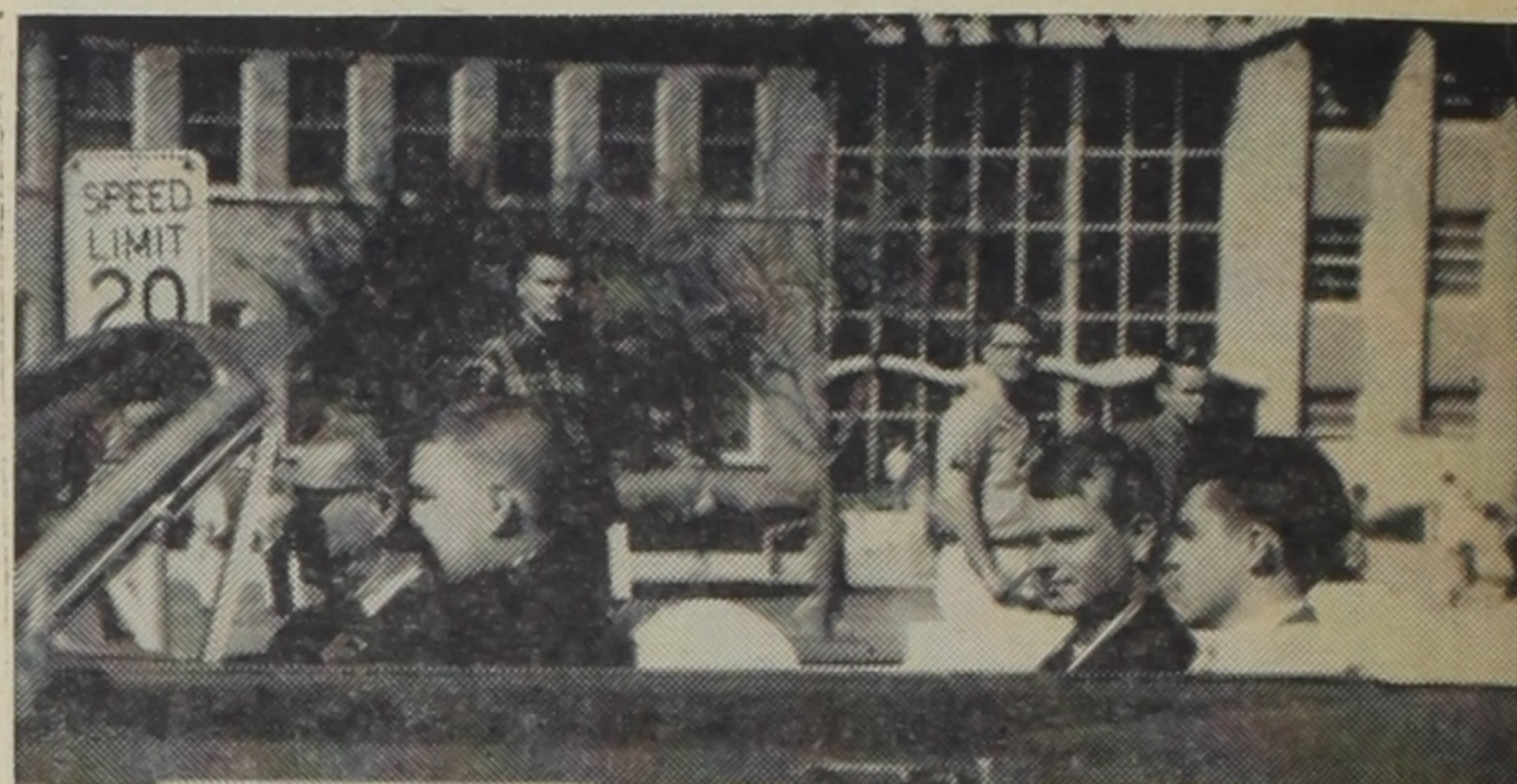

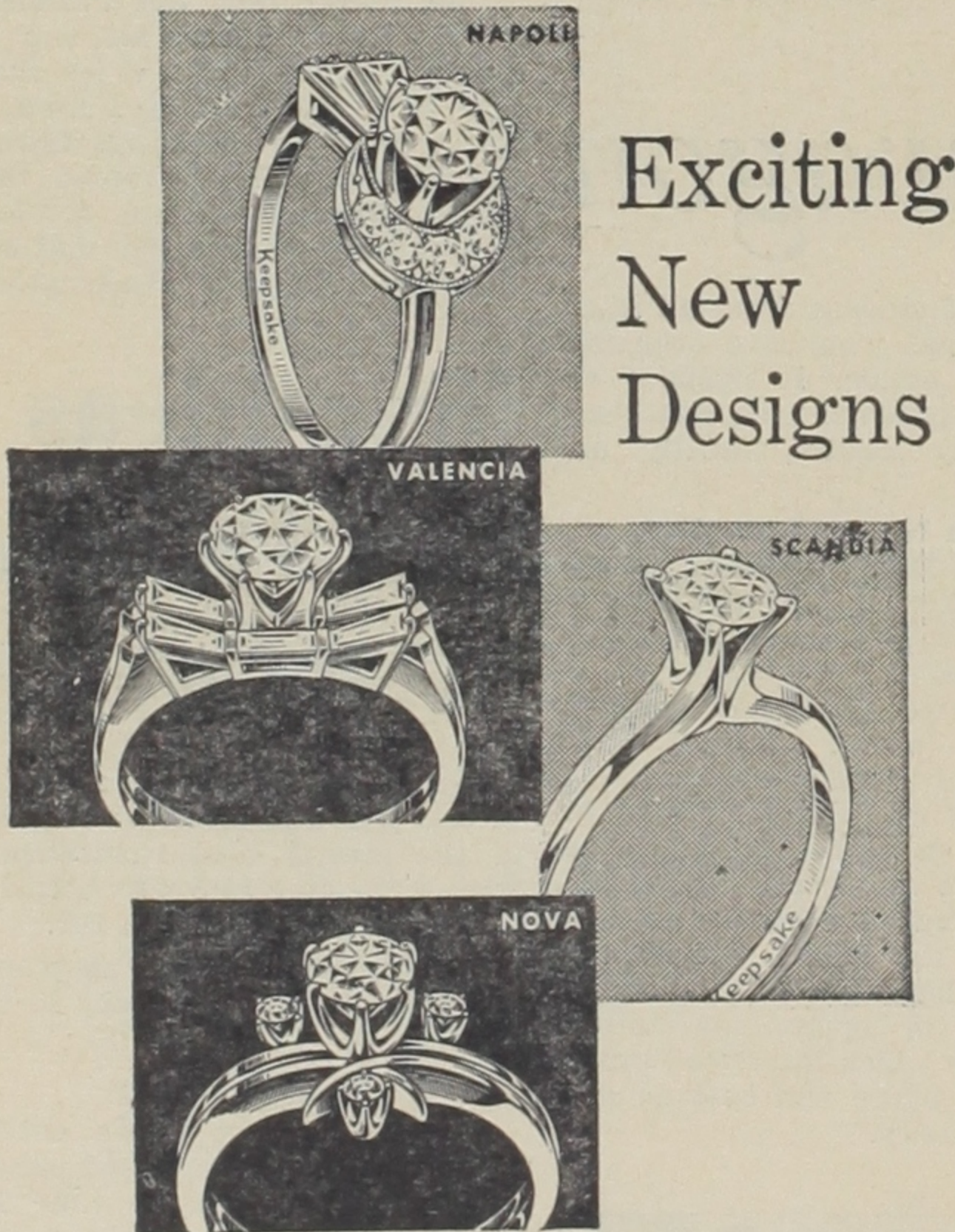
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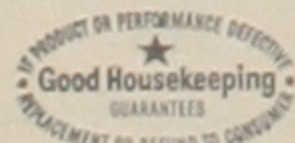
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Music Instructor Appears In Voice Recital Tuesday

Charles Roe, new faculty member in the Music Dept., will perform in voice recital Tuesday.

The young baritone will present a program of selected music, including "Poeme d'un Jour" by

Faure, "Six Songs from 'A Shropshire Lad'" by Butterworth and other songs by Rosa, Cesti, Mozart, Listz and Schumann. Gertrude Post, also a member of the music faculty, will play his piano accompaniments.

Roe, a graduate of Baldwin-Wallace College, received his master of music degree from University of Illinois in August, 1964. Critics have praised both his performances with the Cleveland Summer Pops Orchestra and his roles in musical comedy, opera and oratorio.

The Cleveland Press remarked of him, "... he has a rich baritone voice that made him stand out even in the ensemble singing."

The Cleveland Plain Dealer wrote, "... in the three-character Pergolesi Opera ('The Maid as Mistress') Charlets Roe again displayed a fine baritone voice and a real talent for acting ..."

Reviewers in Illinois observed that "Charles Roe as Don Giovanni ... proved what an excellent singing-actor he is ... as Billie Bigelow (in 'Carousel') he thrilled the audience with a magnificent baritone voice and a dramatic performance that left nothing to be desired ..."

Roe's recital is scheduled for 8 p.m. Tuesday in the Museum Auditorium. Admission is free.

Off The Deep End

A delightful little musical called "The Fantasticks" will be featured on "The Hallmark Hall of Fame" television show at 8 p.m. Sunday.

"The Fantasticks" has enjoyed an astounding successful off-Broadway run. For anyone who believes in love, or who used to or would like to believe in love, the show is a must.

The musical, written by a couple of Texans named Harvey Schmidt and Tom Jones, boasts a charming plot, a fairytale simplicity and sparkling music.

The plot deals with a pair of young lovers who must arrange secret meetings over their backyard fence because their fathers are feuding. The fathers, however, are overjoyed, since their feud was trumped up in order to cause a romance between their offspring in the first place.

The Narrator is a Mexican bandit who is also the prince of love. With sardonic wisdom he guides the young lovers from the agonizing pangs of their adolescent crush to disillusionment and, finally, to a happy ending. At the end he says, "I had to hurt them to show them what was true. And in doing so, I hurt myself a little bit, too."

The show is warm, whimsical and buoyed by a Never-Never Land sort of atmosphere. Props and characters pop out of a stage trunk. There is bright confetti for joy and a big blue tinfoil moon for night. The setting and simple staging demand the viewer to use his imagination, but it's well worth the effort.

Susan Watson will appear in the

part of the charming young girl. John Davidson will play the boy, Matt. Two well-known comedians, Bert Lahr and Stanley Holloway, will portray the feuding fathers, and Ricardo Montalban will play the Narrator.

In addition to its light-hearted humor and its dreamlike staging, the musical has a pleasing array of tunes, both happy and sad.

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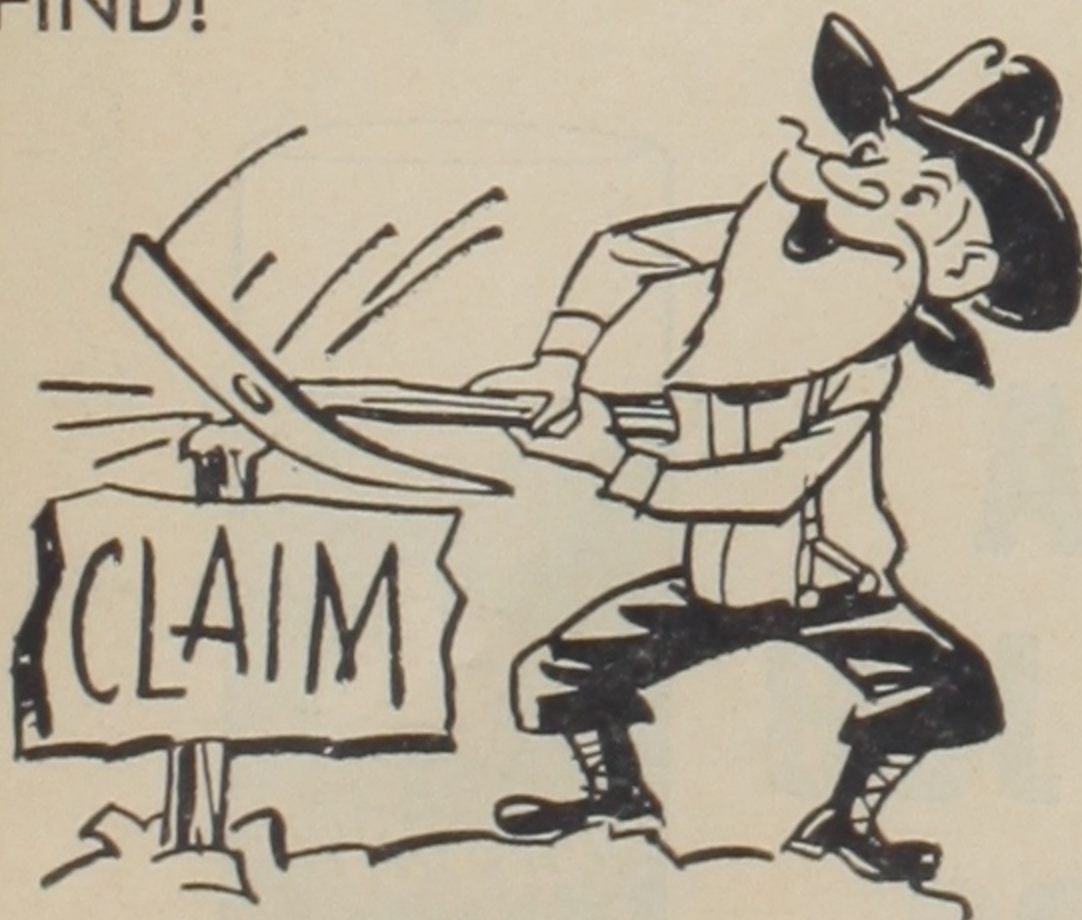


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Tech Looking For Fourth Win

Raiders, Bears Clash In Waco

It's do or die for both Texas Tech and Baylor tonight at 8 p.m. when they clash at Baylor Stadium in Waco.

Both have lost one conference game and another loss would mean virtual elimination from the Southwest Conference title picture.

Tech's freshman footballers will open their '64 season today, meeting the Arkansas Shoats in Little Rock at 2 p.m. The Shoats have one win, 6-0 over SMU. Picador coach Burl Huffman will start Gary Roman at quarterback, Kenny Baker at tailback, Bob Bearden at wingback and Andrew Reed at full.

Tech carries a 3-1 season record into the contest as compared to Baylor's 0-3 standard. The Bears, however, will probably rate a slight favorite to take their first victory of the year.

Being the underdog is nothing new for the Red Raiders, though. Coach J T King's charges have entered a game as favorites only once this year, and still they have claimed three victories.

Tech will be looking for their first victory at Waco. They have played eight games there and dropped them all. Baylor owns a decided 16-5-1 edge in the series and a two-game winning streak over Tech.

The Red Raiders appear to be in fairly good shape for the game, with only guard Ronnie Pack expected to miss the game. End Terry McWhorter and tackle Billy Adams should see their first action since the Texas game. Several Raiders are still banged up from the rugged TCU game, but all should see action tonight.

The Bears, on the other hand, were missing six defensive starters at the first of the week, including top-flight linebacker Bobby Maples. Three are doubtful starters Saturday night.

Texas Tech has been concentrating on its passing game in workouts this week. King has been particularly pleased with the throwing of quarterback Tommy Wilson.

Also due to start in the backfield are touted Donny Anderson and Johnny Agan at halfbacks, and either Jim Zanios or Leo Lowery at fullback.

Up front will be Jerry Don Balch and Charles Gladson, ends; John Porter and Chester Goward, tackles; Ray Garrett and James Cecil, guards; and Reg Scarborough, center.

Halfback Clint Mitchell and fullback Gwinn Corley round out the Bear backfield.

Safety man Teddy Roberts will be out to duplicate last week's three interceptions by pilfering Southall's passes. He now leads the nation in interceptions and returns.

Anderson will be hard-pressed to keep up his torrid rushing pace. The 200-pound junior has gained 293 yards personally in the past two games, and ranks seventh in the nation in total offense.

Defensive starters for Tech in addition to Roberts will include ends Joe Hurley and Sam Cornelius; tackles Ronnie Reeger and John Carroll; guards Doug Young and Marc Bryant; linebackers C. C. Willis and Kenneth Gill; and halfbacks Robert Yancer and David Baugh.

Tech's game strategy is expected to be ball control in an effort to keep the ball away from passer Southall. The Raiders have relied principally on their ground game so far this season, although they may be forced to pass more than usual due to a beefed-up Baylor defensive line.

Texas Tech will return to Jones Stadium for the first time in a month following the Baylor game. They will meet SMU. The Bear's next foe will be Texas A&M.

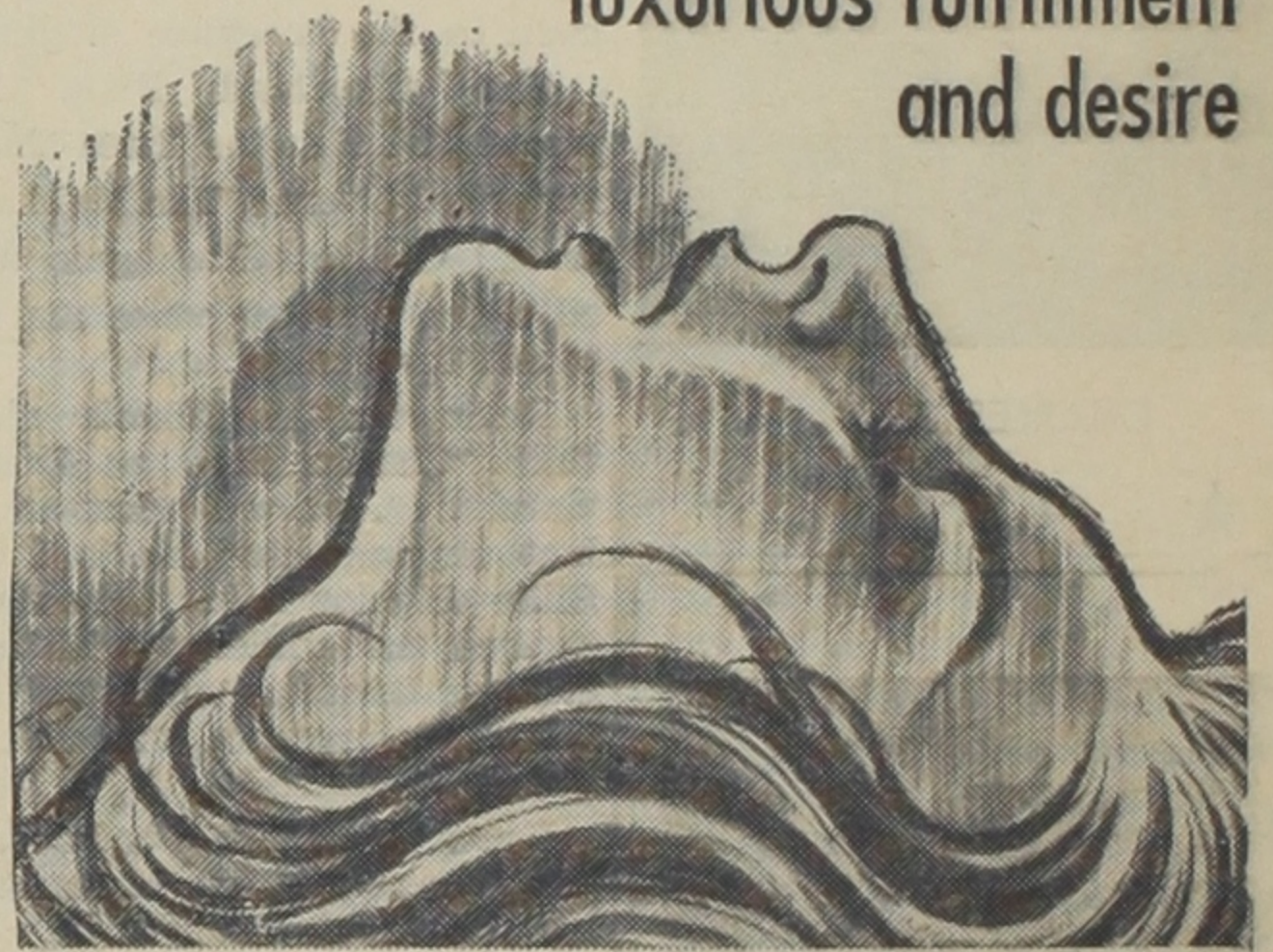
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
