It prompts me to wonder if they ever read the U.D. editorials, or possibly when they do, the complaints are put aside as adolescent delusions.

HOWEVER, THE item of major concern is the fact that when one desires to escape the horrible realities of dorm life, he must inevitably wade through an ocean of red tape, the Office's literary barbed wire. Thusly, the prospective off-campus resident finds himself bombarded with what seems like a million pages of questions, some of which are absurd and others that are clearly a breach of the student's

The student must virtually sign his life away before he can escape his on-campus imprisonment. Futhermore, he must swear on his Scout's honor that he did not tell a lie.

Each application for off-campus residency begins with a page of instructions with a couple of excerpts from the Code of Student Affairs thrown in for good measure. Within these paragraphs the words "IMMEDIATE SUSPENSION" leer out at the student as a reminder not to lie. One would think that this was a major crime.
