## Goodwin Talks Against Plans In Legislature

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas Tech President Dr. Ro- bert C. Goodwin told legislative budget writers Thursday the Legislature should not regroup state colleges as proposed by Gov. John Connally.

"The allocation of the institutions of higher learning of the state among systems of colleges and universities should be a function of the Commission on Higher Education or it replacement," Goodwin tod the Howe Appropprations Commitece

However, Goodwin did support Connally's recommendation for a strong college coordinating board.

## Tech Opposed

Connally told reporters Wednesday he felt Tech opposed his plan, as well as the University of Houston, but that he believed a majority of the Legislature and colleges consider his plan the best solution.

Connally proposed putting Tech under a system headed by Texas A\&M. The University of Texas would head another system, and a third would be composed mostly of small colleges. Goodwin said a distribution of schools into systems should be made only after a careful and deliberate study of the problems involved.
"A basic principle of the establishment of these systems should be that within each complex of institutions opportunity should exist for students to obtain instruction under any program and at all levels."

Retain Autonomy
Goodwin also said college governing boards should "retain as much autonomy as possible." Under Connally's proposals, all but A\&M and Texas governing boards would be abolished.

Asked about Connally's proposal for a strong college coordinating board, Goodwin said:
"Closer coordination between institutions is necessary to attain a more economic and effective higher education system. Although some progress has been made by the institutions, other and stronger measures are needed.

## Bill Gives 'Bit Of Hope'

TTHE "FOUR UNIVERSITY SYSTEM" bill introduced into the Legislature Wednesday gives us the first opportunity in more than a week to feel a bit optimistic about Texas Tech's future.

Gov. John Connally's attack on the bill, however, indicates we cannot be confident that Tech's multi-purpose university status is not now in danger of being destroyed.

The significance of the bill introduced by Sens. H. J. Blanchard, Lubbock, and Dorsey Hardeman, San Angelo, is that it assures a debate in the legislature over Tech's status.

We hope from this debate Tech's multi-purpose university status will become known

The "four system" bill follows closely along the lines of the suggestions made by the Governor's Committee of Twenty-Five. Under the proposal four systems of undergraduates and graduate education will orient the schools geographical rather than functional lines.

Although both the Governor's proposal and the four system plans will have to be studied carefully by the legislature and the people of Texas to determine what is best for higher education in Texas, we must continue work to place Texas Tech in the system to which it rightfully belongs.

Because Sens. Blanchard and Hardeman have emphasized Tech's nature as a multi-purpose state univerCommittee Could Help
TEXAS TECH CERTAINLY will benefit greatly if the suggestion of several Lubbock businessmen is put into action.

This week initial plans were made to form a Lubbock citizens committee to work for Tech by opposing Gov. Connally's plan to place us in a technological grouping.

Such a committee could not only help Tech in this respect but could help improve the school's image and create an awareness of its importance in the Lubbock community.

The committee would unite Lubbock citizens with students, faculty and administrators in building a greater university here.

 Presidential assistant McGeorge Bundy began a round of fact-finding conferences with U.S. officials Thursday amid speculation in some Vietnamese quarters that a U. S.Soviet deal on Viet Nam was in he making.Bundy's arrival happened to coincide with the departure of Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin rom Moscow for talks in Hanoi, capital of Communist North Viet Nam. Bundy denied his trip was in visit any way to the Kocy-
Bundy's arrival statement reiterated American pledges to conCommunist struggle But the statement contained the diplomatic hint that Viet Nam was ex pected to do its part.
"The record of the last 25 years all around the world," Bundy said, "shows that those who stand confident of the strong and untiring support of the United States." The phrase was greeted with a certain amount of cynicism from some Vietnamese officials.
"This could be a hook by which America could disengage itself, on grounds that our government is torn by divisions and upheavals firm therefore not able to stana Vien its own freedom, one Vietnamese official said.
