Texas Tech's Board of Directors has undertaken a program which has been the nemesis of numerous groups and their planning during the life of the college. To fulfill their mission, the directors will need the assistance of everyone connected with

directors will need the assistance of everyone connected with Tech.

A long-range plan to beautify the campus was initiated at the recent meeting of the board. No one of the directors expects the task to be an easy one, and they have attacked the problem in a manner which should have been launched 20 years ago. A 10-year plan was set up, and a Campus Beautification sub-committee was appointed.

Headed by Charles Wooldridge with Leon Ince and O. B. Ratliff as other members, the committee is logically investigating every angle which should be considered. A query has already been sent to college officials asking for data on water supply; location of water mains; trees, shrubbery and grass best suited for the campus; where initial action should be taken; and other pertinent questions.

But the Board of Directors can back the plan only with the weapons it commands—foresight, money and management. It is up to us, students at Tech, to help the program and not hinder it; to attend our duties and not ignore them; to acclaim our benefactors and not deride them.

On the shoulders of us who are here today and the students who will succeed us rests the daily responsibility of maintaining that program which will be pushed forward by the Board of Directors. Our part in carrying beautification forward is a series of seemingly insignificant measures—stay off the grass and don't mark sidewalks and do put waste in waste receptacles.

We can start immediately in doing our part, and until the complete 10-year plan is announced, we wish to express our appreciation for this:

The Texas Tech Red Raiders will meet their arch rivals, the West Texas State Buffaloes of Canyon at 8 p. m. Tuesday in the Tech gym. The tussle climaxes a three-game tour for both teams in which each has met New Mexico university, New Mexico A&M and Texas School of Mines.

West Texas ranks among Tech's toughest competition for the season idespite the Raiders' second place standing in the Border conference through Tuesday as opposed to the fourth place held by the Buffs. The height-carrying West Texas cagers have moved from last up to fourth

#### Grove Sets Pace For Tech Cagers

Don Grove, Tech's tall center, has compiled an impressive scoring record for the Raider basket-ball team while leading his teammates through 20 games of the 26 game schedule. The 6-foot-5-inch center has tossed in 101 field goals and 46 free throws for 248 points; an average of over 12 points per

game.

If Grove can keep up this scoring pace for the remaining six games, he will be one of the few Raiders ever to top 300 points during one season of play. The stellar center has the best single game records up to the present with 26 points scored against Arizona; nine field goals scored against Rice; 10 free throws made against Arizona; and 12 free throws attempted

Texas Tech will be host next weekend to district Class B basketball winners in region 1 of the Texas, Interschaptly, league


