

All Men Enrolled At Tech Eligible For ROTC Training

Classes In Chinese Enrolls 100 During Past Year Course Is Added To Language List For First Time

Increasing Demand Causes Action Here By Faculty Heads

Approximately 100 persons have taken Chinese since classes were organized by Dr. B. C. Ling in May, 1942. This fall for the first time in the history of Texas Technological college the study of Chinese was incorporated into the foreign language department. It was added because of the increasing demand for knowledge of an Oriental language and the prospect of world wide reconstruction, according to Dr. C. B. Qualla, head professor of foreign languages, and Dr. Ling. In the days when Chinese classes were conducted privately, most of the men enrolled were in some branch of military service, stationed at Lubbock. The women enrolled besides regular college students have been those that work in town and are taking college work at night. It has been necessary to schedule most of the Chinese courses at night in order to accommodate all who desired to take it.

Two Chinese courses have been offered this year, each with three hours elective college credit. Chinese 131 is a basic language course. Three hours credit will be given for Chinese 133, known as Contemporary China, if it is taken in conjunction with Chinese 131. However, the 133 course may be taken without credit if it is impossible for one to take 131.

Last week two sections of men from the ASTP unit stationed on the campus started Chinese classes, meeting them once a week for an hour and a half. Since it is possible that these men may be in the Orient, it was considered wise for them to receive fundamentals of the language while in school. This language course is not compulsory for ASTP students, but is available to those who wish to take it. The basic Chinese language courses are designed to give a practical knowledge of speaking and reading the language, and can be learned as easily as any of the other foreign languages, as the old time literary manner of learning Chinese is no longer in practice, according to Dr. Ling. The lesser course of Contemporary Chinese is designed to acquaint one with the condition of China today, she added.

Prescott To Aid Chorus Tonight In First Concert

Members of the college chorus will present a program of Christmas carols with Lt. Charles E. Prescott and Dr. Julien Paul Bliz as featured soloists. This, the first in a series of Victory concerts will be held in the Lubbock high school auditorium Friday night at 8 o'clock. Lt. Prescott will sing "Holy Night" by Adams. A cellist solo entitled "Devotion" will be played by Dr. Bliz. The soloists and chorus will be accompanied by Mrs. Bliz. The invocation and descriptive matter will be given by Dr. Jack Lewis, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Lubbock. "The concert will be very short, probably lasting only about 40 minutes because of the many other activities at this time," said Dr. Bliz. "We appreciate the fact that many students will be sacrificing their recreational time for the concert."

The price of admission will be the purchase of anything from a war stamp to a war bond. All visiting band directors who are participating in the band clinic being held by the Texas Music Educators association here will attend the concert in a body.

Fellowship Fund Established For Husbandry Aggies

A fellowship fund amounting to \$2,500 has been started by Mrs. Jean Chappell, New London, Conn., in memory of her father, the late W. L. Ellwood, according to information released from the office of President Clifford B. Jones. This work will involve some phase of cattle production important to this section of Texas.

The late W. L. Ellwood was the son of Col. Isaac L. Ellwood, who established the Spade ranch in 1881. The original holdings of the ranch were 128,000 acres, that extended twenty-five miles in length and eight miles wide over Lamb, Hockley, Hale, and Lubbock counties. Other lands were purchased in 1906, and the ranch contained 285,000 acres that extended fifty-four miles long and eight to twelve miles wide.

W. L. Ellwood was appointed manager of the Texas holdings by his father. After the death of his father he was made executor and continued in these capacities until his death on Dec. 28, 1933.

No Provisions Made By Board For Collegians

No special provisions can be made by the college rationing board for additional gasoline during the Christmas holidays, according to Dr. T. William Davis, chairman of the board and college coordinator of the air crew detachment on the campus. The college rationing board was set up April 28, 1943, at the request of the OPA. President Clifford B. Jones appointed Dr. Davis, George Lang of the purchasing office, and Marshall Benton Harrison, associate professor of agricultural economics and farm management, as a special panel of the gasoline rationing board. Their duty is to consider requests for additional gasoline among the faculty members and employees of the college. Any request for additional gasoline must go through the college board. The three members of the board usually meet once a week to consider these applications.

"Our object is to try to treat everyone fairly and equally," said Dr. Davis. "We would like for the people to get in their applications early and not wait until they run out of gasoline before making requests," he added. "The most typical cases according to Dr. Davis, are faculty members who need a little extra gasoline to get to and from work since A coupons have been reduced in value. As a general rule they are only allowed to make a small allotment in such cases."

Extension C Largest In Percentage B Than At Most Universities

TEXAS Technological college is one of the 76 American universities and colleges offering correspondence courses to service men in cooperation with the United States Armed Forces institute. Of the 9,619 soldiers enrolled in the various colleges, 311 are taking courses from Tech, states J. H. Millikin, acting director of the extension department. Courses in the following subjects are being offered to service men through Texas Tech's extension office: astronomy, biology, accounting, business administration, economics, English, French, geography, German, government, history, journalism, mathematics, philosophy, Portuguese, psychology, sociology, and Spanish. High school courses are also offered in economics, sociology, English, Spanish, history, civics, mathematics, and science.

Journalism is the most frequently asked for subject with accounting and mathematics next, according to Millikin. "However, service men are enrolled in almost every subject offered," he said. Students pay one-half the cost of the course, and the government pays the rest of the cost for enrollment and textbooks. Texas Tech has reduced the cost by one-third of the regular fee for service men, and instructors in charge of the courses give their services at two-thirds the regular rate. Pederson Resigns Position As Ag Professor Here

Will Join Price's As Dairy Manager; Duties Are Varied

Prof. Mart G. Pederson of the department of dairy manufactures is resigning at the close of the present semester to begin work with Price's, incorporated, of El Paso. This company is a subsidiary of Creameries of America and also has plants at Carlsbad, Hobbs, Roswell, Postales, Deming, Hot Springs, Silver City, and Las Cruces, N. M.

Pederson will be production manager of the company with headquarters in El Paso. His other duties will include procurement. During the summer of 1942 he did special work for Price's. Coming to Tech in the fall of 1929-30 as a transfer from Clifton Junior college, Pederson was active in student affairs, especially in intramural athletics. In 1932 he graduated with a B.S. degree in agriculture and a major in dairy manufactures. Then he began work as an instructor in the division and later became a professor. He received his M.S. degree in Kansas State Agricultural college in 1935.

Tech Junior Dairy Products Judging teams were coached by Pederson for five years. Four times the teams were winners, and the other year tied for high place. His college activities include membership in the Faculty Advisory committee, sponsor of the Aggie club, member of the Tech Alumni and Ex-student association, of which he was president at one time. He is an Alpha Chi. Pederson's research at Tech has had to do with a milk sediment tester adapted to Northwest Texas water and conditions. He also aided with originating Sediment Standard for the dairy industry. Mrs. Pederson, the former Mary Evelyn Gordon is also a Tech graduate. She was in the class of 1933 in the department of education. The Pedersons have one son, Gordon.

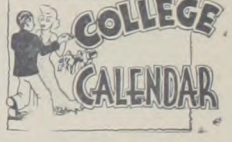
Women's Dormitory Holds Annual Christmas Party

West Texas Museum Has Rare Skeletons

WEST TEXAS Museum has recently acquired four complete skeletons of the small gazelle camel, *Stenomylus*. These camels, which stood about three feet high at the shoulder, once lived in great herds in the middle west, but have been extinct for millions of years. They are to be found at one place only—buried deep in a sandstone hill six miles east of Agate, Nebraska. Not difficult to remove. However, the slope of the hill is great and the amount of overburden that must be removed to get down to the bone layer is constantly increased as the face of the hill is worked back. It took six weeks to collect the skeletons for the museum. This is only the first phase of the work. It will take an experienced preparator more than as many months to get them ready for mounting and a similar length of time to mount them. The skeletons are now on display in the museum in slabs, just as they were found. They will be worked out and mounted soon.

An interesting pamphlet describing the habitat and the collection of the *Stenomylus* has been released by the museum. It was prepared by Dr. Meade. Randolph-Macon Woman's college is opening an evening nutrition course open to all students except freshmen, faculty, and townspeople. The course will be completed after ten weeks.
