

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# Statistical Leaders Not Changed

Texas Tech's Red Raiders will be headed by the same statistical leaders in their game with Oklahoma A&M here Saturday as they had for their win over Arizona last week.

Only change among leaders was the addition of quarterback Don Williams of Graham to the top scoring spot. He made seven in Tech's 21-7 victory over Arizona to share the scoring leadership with Buddy Hill of Lubbock with 15 apiece. Hill was held out at Tucson to protect a knee injury.

Otherwise, the leaders remain: rushing—fullback Doug Duncan of Wellington, 139 yards on 33 tries; punting—Hill, 38.3-yard average on 15 kicks; passing—Hill, 18 completions of 38 passes for 219 yards; pass interceptions—guard Ray Howard of Childress, 3 for 71 yards return; pass receiving—end Ken Vakey of San Antonio, 7 for 94 yards; kickoff returns—halfback Ronnie Herr of Muenster, 24.5-yard average on 4, and punt return average considerably, but a 67-yard return was called back for clipping.

Although three Raiders—Duncan, fullback Gene Bentley of Panhandle, and halfback Hugh Fewin of Burkburnett—gained more than 50 yards each, the Arizona game was more of a defensive triumph.

Art Luppino, twice the nation's leading rusher, was held to 33 yards on 10 carries. Third in total offense, quarterback Ralph Hunsaker made only 39 yards for the night. Arizona, ranked 11th nationally on team total offense with 353 yards a contest, was held to 80 yards rushing and 65 passing for a 145-yard return, and bear and punt returnal properties.




