

# Gigantic Election Rally Tonight In Union Ballroom

A gigantic election rally will get underway at 7 p.m. today in the Union ballroom. Candidates for student association executive offices, Student Council and cheer-

leading posts will be presented at the meeting.

Executive office candidates will be allowed six minutes each to present their platforms, the time

being divided between candidates and campaign managers, according to Huda Hassen, present Association secretary and election committee chairman.

Students running for division representative posts will be introduced individually, but will not speak, she said. Cheerleader candidates will lead two yells each.

Members of the Tech Band are to play for the rally.

"I hope that all the students will make a real effort to attend the rally and support the candidates," said Miss Hassen. "It will be the only opportunity for everyone to meet all the candidates and hear their platforms."

Polls will open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. tomorrow. First results of the election will be posted in the Union after 6:15 p.m. tomorrow, and final results will appear on the Student Council bulletin board in the Administration building.

Runoff elections, if needed, will be held next Wednesday, April 18, said Miss Hassen this morning.

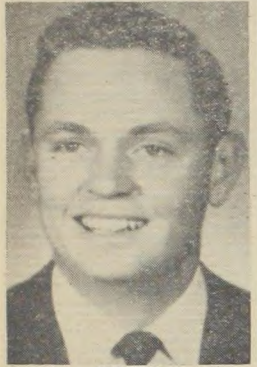

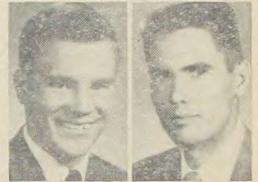

Tech students will elect five cheerleaders, two girls and three boys, from 12 candidates in an all-college election tomorrow.

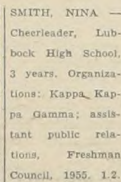

## 8 Constitutional Changes On Ballot

Eight minor changes to the Student Association Constitution will be found on the election ballot Wednesday, according to Huda Hassen, chairman of the elections committee.

Majority of the changes will involve only omission to some section of an article and will not change the meaning of any of the sections, Miss Hassen said. Final ratification of the amendments must be made by a majority of Student Association members — all Tech students.

In Article V, Section 500, the words "publication officers" will be omitted. The amendment will then read, "There shall be a general election on the second Wednesday in April each spring semester for the purpose of electing all Student Association officers and representatives and cheerleaders."

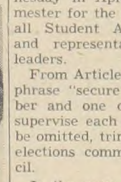
From Article V, Section 504, the phrase "secure one faculty member and one council member to supervise each election box;" will be omitted, trimming duties of the elections committee of the council.

In the same article, section 507, two phrases, "publications officer" and "at least two weeks before the general election" will be taken out. The sentence in which the two omissions are made will read, "Any person desiring to be nominated as a Student Association officer or representative, or yell leader, shall present a petition to the President announcing his intention to run for office."

A similar "two-week" time rule will be taken from Section 507-A. See CONSTITUTION, Page 2.

## Newcomer Thrills First-Night 'Girl Crazy' Audience

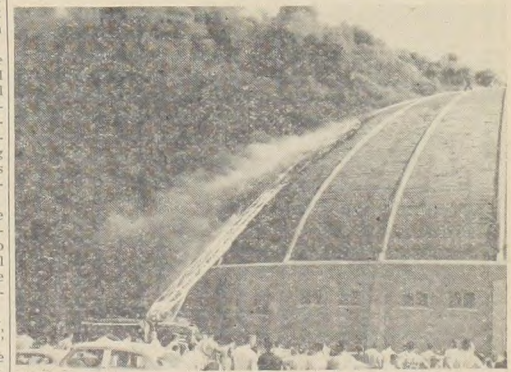

A newcomer to Tech musicals, quiet Sylvia Dietering, last night captivated the small audience viewing the opening run of "Girl Crazy," College Varsity Show playing nightly through Wednesday at Tom S. Lubbock High School Auditorium.

Miss Dietering, in the role of Frisco Kate, a boisterous lady long on words and short on reputation, gave amazing warmth and comedy to the George and Ira Gershwin musical.

A perennial favorite in the Tech entertainment field — David Pool — played opposite Miss Dietering as her fun-loving, gambling husband, Slick. Pool, his usual exuberant self, was a perfect

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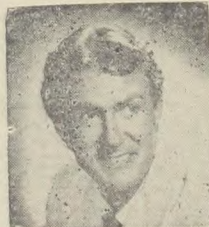

partner for the surprising Miss Dietering.

Another hilarious part was turned in by Don Armstrong, carrying the part of weak, witty, taxi-driver-turned sheriff Gieber. All three showed a keen understanding of their particular characterizations.

Ross Cass, another old timer in the College musical and dramatic field, and lovely Kay Adkins capably handled the leads in the western musical, and were particularly noteworthy in displays of their vocal talents.

The three-hour show got off to a bad start with an overture that sounded as if each member of the orchestra was playing from a different page in the score. The apparently unheated orchestra continued to be the really weak link throughout the production, occasionally showing sparkle and then lapsing again into discord and mistiming that threw singers and dancers off cue on more than one occasion.

The large dancing chorus, trained by the able choreographer Virginia Carr, showed a hesitancy in some numbers that seemed to indicate too few complete rehearsals. However, other numbers notably "Barbary Coast" and "Land of the Gay Caballero," showed real sparkle. Dance solos by Miss Carr, Marianna Wilson, Janelle Hamill and Linda Hefley were excellent — in spite of the orchestra, which quit on Miss Hefley, leaving her hanging — literally — in mid-air.

An act two song and dance routine by Miss Dietering and Pool, "Boy! What Love Has Done To Me!" was one of the high points of the show. Another was a duet, "Embraceable You," by romantic leads Cass and Miss Adkins.

Very good minor performances were turned in by Buck Johnson as Lank, Lyle Dewitt as Pete and Dan Creson as Jake. Other cast members included Janet Wright, Bob Lapham, Billie Sue Gregory, Bobby Dean Smith, Clay Cummins, Bob Ford and Carolyn Tapp.

Costumes by Averil Brinkman were excellent. Sets for the eight-scene production were expertly produced by Dennis Atkins. Smaller, more portable sets, however, might have been the answer to the extreme wait necessary for scene changes (in some cases longer than some of the shorter acts).

Jack Pruitt directed the production.

Last night's show had many outstanding individual performances, but seemed to lack the unity necessary to put an audience at ease. This was particularly true in Act I. However, Act II was a great improvement, and by tonight, with first-night wrinkles ironed out, efforts of the talent-laden cast should result in an extremely satisfying show. Curtain time tonight and Wednesday is 8:15 p.m. Tickets are on sale at the door at \$1.

leaving the section to read, "Any person desiring to be nominated as a Student Association executive officer or cheerleader, shall present a petition to the President announcing his intention to run for the office."

"At least two weeks before the General Election" will be omitted from Section 507-B, leaving it to read, "Any person desiring to be nominated as a representative to the Council shall present a petition to the President announcing his intention to run for the office."

In naming the officers, their oath, and length of term in Section 510, the word judges will be stricken from usages leaving only mention of executive offices and representatives.

## "I take a job from scratch"

The Air Force introduced Forrest I. Hurst to communications. In 1953 he was Communications Officer at Lowry Air Force Base near Denver, Colorado. He has written over 100 magazine articles dealing primarily with various areas of art, a chapter in a college art textbook, and an illustrated series of texts for Indian children in Alaska.

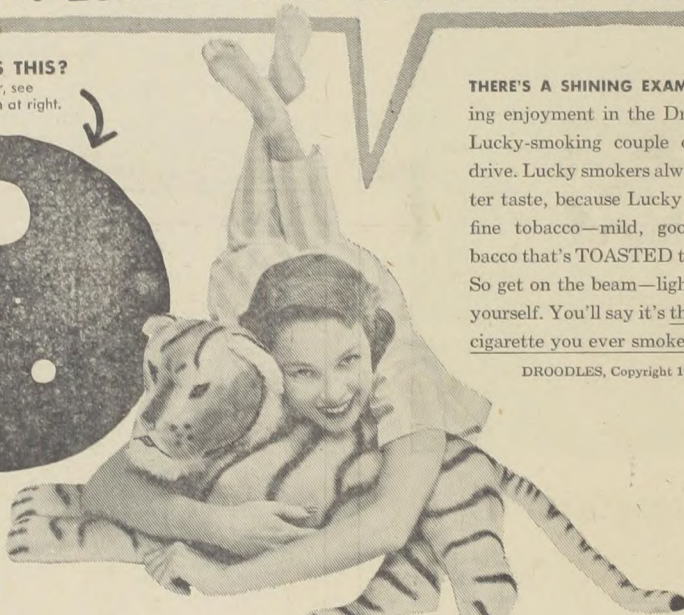
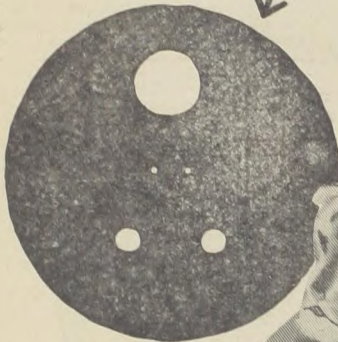
## Cosmopolitan Club Opens Door To Americans

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
